#### **RESOLUTIONS: (7)**

1. Authorizing a dedication by rider for lead based paint inspection revenue

The CFO recommends obtaining permission from the Director of the Division of Local Government Services for approval by a dedication by rider for any lead-based paint inspection revenue which is received to be used solely toward the implementation and enforcement of the State requirement.

2. Authorizing participation in the LEAP Implementation Grant

The State has appropriated \$7.5 million for grants to assist local units with the implementation of shared services. The Business Administrator recommends applying for a \$100,000 grant to fund a new Fire Prevention vehicle and software to help support the agreement with the Township of Allamuchy.

3. Approving the re-appointment of Andrew Tatarenko as Business Administrator/Qualified Purchasing Agent and authorizing the execution of an employment agreement

The Mayor has re-appointed the Business Administrator/QPA for a two-year term with the consent of Council and a new contract has been negotiated.

4. Authorizing the purchase of goods and services via New Jersey State Contracts and Cooperative Purchasing Agreements

The Township is allowed, by resolution and without advertising for bids, purchase any goods or services under a State Contract and/or Cooperative Purchasing agreement. The Township has a need to purchase various goods or services from the attached list of approved contracts.

## 5. Authorizing the use of competitive contracting for a six-week summer recreation program

The Local Public Contracts law permits municipalities to use competitive contracting in lieu of public bidding for the procurement of specialized goods and services which will exceed the bid threshold. The Recreation Department would like to offer a sixweek summer recreation program which meets the requirements.

6. Authorizing the award of a professional services agreement for Engineering and Construction Administration Services - Pinecrest Water System (Van Cleef Engineering Associates) \*REVISED - Re-allocating funds

The Township previously awarded a contract to Van Cleef Engineering Associates for engineering services associated with the Pinecreast Water System. The contract needs to be revised to re-allocate funds to different account numbers. There is no increase in cost.

7. Authorizing the award of a non-fair and open professional services agreement to RJH Law Enforcement Consultants to provide hearing officer services (January 1, 2024 - December 31, 2024)

The Township has a need for a hearing officer to assist with disciplinary matters. RJH Law Enforcement Consultants has submitted a proposal not to exceed \$17,500 for the calendar year 2024 which can be awarded as a non-fair and open contract in accordance with the pay to play laws.

Rates for off-duty police officers need to be re-established for the year 2024 - 2029 to coincide with the salaries which have been previously negotiated. Rates for off-duty police officers are paid for directly by the

vendor requesting service.

Ord.#3-2024 An Ordinance of the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris, State of New Jersey, Amending Chapter 81, "Recreation", Specifically Article II "Fees for Recreation Department Programs" Establishing Recreation Fees

for Various Township-Sponsored Recreational Activities
The recreation fees have not been updated since 2018. Due to increases in supplies, instructors, services, program providers and events, the Recreation Director recommends slightly increasing the range of fees in order to continue to offer quality programs and events. The ordinance change also reflects changes in the description of the programs/services being offered.

WHEREAS, Robert has shown his dedication to the businesses in Mount Olive Township, specifically by traveling to sister city Carpegna, Italy to strengthen relations with Fratelli Beretta, a Mount Olive Township based business, as well participating in numerous grand openings; and

**Re:** Health Benefits Coverage Waiver Policy

With the change in health benefit programs from the State Health Benefits Program (SHBP) to the North Jersey Municipal Employee Benefit Fund Insurance Fund (HIF), a new health benefits coverage waiver policy should be adopted. The purpose of the waiver is to reduce costs to the Township and to encourage employees who have other sources of coverage to drop the coverage that would otherwise be paid by the Township.

Currently, in accordance with State statute, the waiver coverage is limited to 25% or \$5,000, whichever is less, of the amount saved by the Township for both active and retired employees. The only individuals not eligible, in accordance with the provisions, is if their other coverage is with the SHBP.

There are currently 12 employees who waive the benefits and receive the waiver payment and 5 employees who waive payment and do not receive a waiver payment.

Moving forward, with the implementation of the HIF Program, I recommend implementing a similar health benefit coverage waiver policy, regardless of where the other coverage is with, to continue to encourage employees to drop Mount Olive Township coverage. While this change will afford more employees to receive the waiver payment benefit, it will reduce the potential increase cost if they decided to start Township coverage.

#### RESOLUTION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE AUTHORIZING A DEDICATION BY RIDER FOR LEAD BASED PAINT INSPECTION REVENUE

WHEREAS, permission is required of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services for approval as a dedication by rider of revenues received by a municipality when the revenue is not subject to reasonable accurate estimate in advance; and

WHEREAS, PL 2021, c 182 provides for receipt of lead-based paint inspection revenue by the municipality to provide for the operating costs to administer this act; and

WHEREAS, NJSA 52:27D-437.16 requires inspection fees charged by a municipality be dedicated towards implementing and enforcing the inspection requirement;

WHEREAS, NJSA 40A:4-39 provides the dedicated revenue anticipated from the Township of Mount Olive lead based paint trust fund are hereby anticipated as revenue and are hereby appropriated for the purpose to which said revenue is dedicated by statute or other legal requirement.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris as follows:

- 1. The Governing Body does hereby request permission of the Director of the Division of Local Government to pay expenditures of the Township of Mount Olive lead-based paint trust fund.
- 2. The Township Clerk of the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris, is hereby directed to forward two certified copies of this resolution to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services.

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey has appropriated \$7.5 million for Shared Services and School District Consolidation Study and Implementation Grants to assist local units with the study, development and implementation of new shared and regional services; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Community Affairs, Division of Local Government Services (DLGS) is tasked with administering these grant funds through the Local Efficiency Achievement Program (LEAP); and

WHEREAS, LEAP Implementation Grants exist to support costs associated with shared service implementation to ensure that meaningful, efficiency generating initiatives are not hindered by short term transitional expenses; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Mount Olive and Township of Allamuchy have entered into a shared services agreement, but face certain expenses associated with implementation that present a burden to the local units; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this shared services agreement is to provide fire prevention services, which will benefit the residents of both participating local units; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Mount Olive is the lead agency in this program and will submit the application to DLGS on behalf of all participating units; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, that the Township of Mount Olive will apply for a LEAP Implementation Grant in the amount of \$100,000 to support implementation of this shared service.

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE AMENDING ORDINANCE #38-2023 WHICH ESTABLISHED SALARIES FOR THE MAYOR, COUNCIL, DEPARTMENT HEADS AND OTHER EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Faulkner Act, under which the Township of Mount Olive operates, the Township Council is required to adopt, pursuant to NJSA 40a:9-165, an ordinance annually to establish the salaries for all employees; and

WHEREAS, under the Faulkner form of government the Mayor has the right to establish the salaries for those who are designated as exempt employees and, therefore, this ordinance memorializes the salaries for exempt employees as specified by the Mayor:

WHEREAS, the Township Council wishes to establish equitable salaries, subject of course to the discretion of the Township Council to establish salaries to be paid in any given year, to those municipal employees.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris, as follows:

#### Section 1:

There is hereby established the following salaries for the positions listed below for the year 2024 effective 1/1/2024:

Mayor	\$20,000 - \$24,000
Council President	\$11,000 - \$13,200
Council Members	\$10,000 - \$12,000
Township Administrator/QPA	\$150,000 - \$225,000
Purchasing Director	\$90,000 - \$115,000

#### Section 2:

The salaries set forth in this ordinance have been arrived at after careful consideration and have been selected for those individuals who presently hold the specific positions listed. The Township Council reserves the right to fix the salary for replacement personnel or new hires in the following positions: Department Heads, Township Clerk and Statutory Employees.

#### Section 3:

This ordinance shall supersede all prior ordinances which have been adopted by the Township Council establishing salaries and salary ranges for exempt employees.

#### Section 4:

All employees covered by this ordinance enrolled in the insurance plan offered by the Township will be required to make a medical contribution. Effective January 1, 2024, the health insurance contribution shall be calculated depending on the NJ State Health Benefits Plan/NJ HIF chosen by the employee. The NJ Direct 2030/Aetna 2030 plans will require an employee contribution of 1.5% of their base salary. If an employee chooses a NJ Direct Horizon plan other than the NJ Direct Horizon 2030/Aetna 2030

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE, COUNTY OF MORRIS, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING CHAPTER 81, "RECREATION", SPECIFICALLY ARTICLE II "FEES FOR RECREATION DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS" ESTABLISHING RECREATION FEES FOR VARIOUS TOWNSHIP-SPONSORED RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES

**WHEREAS,** Chapter 81-5, establishes a fee schedule for various Recreation Department Programs; and

WHEREAS, the fee schedule has not been revised since 2018; and

**WHEREAS,** the Mayor and Council wish to amend Chapter 81, Article II, Section 5 to establish new recreation fees.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

**SECTION 1.** Section 81-5, Fee Schedule, is hereby amended to establish a new Program/Activity and replaced with the following schedule:

**SECTION 2.** If any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 3**. This Ordinance may be renumbered for purposes of codification.

**SECTION 4.** This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days following final passage, approval, and publication as required by law.

### Commissioners' Corner

he 250th anniversary of the United States will be officially celebrated on July 4, 2026, marking the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. However, the anniversary actually covers the entire war from the Battles of Lexington and Concord on April 19, 1775, to the signing of the Treaty of Paris on September 3, 1783. Events running up to the start of the war are also important. Massachusetts will be marking the 250th anniversary of the Boston Tea Party this year on December 16.

New Jersey is called the Crossroads of the Revolution, and Morris County is arguably the center of those crossroads. Although not the site of major battles, Washington twice made Morristown his winter head-quarters, with nearby encampments for the continental troops. The topography made it nearly impossible for the enemy to attack. The mines, mills, and farms provided ammunition and supplies for the army.

By 1753, Morris County had the boundaries that it has today. It had only five official townships: Pequannock, Hanover, Morris, Mendham, and Roxbury, covering many small villages and hamlets. To quote the *History of Morris County* 1739-1882 published by W. W. Munsell & Co. in 1882:

In the thirty-five years between 1740 and 1775 the face of the county had greatly changed. Instead of a few villages (at Pompton, Whippany, Morristown, German Valley, Chester, Dover and Rockaway) the whole county had been opened up by actual settlers. Furnaces and a slitting mill had been built. Forges, grist mills and saw-mills were on all the streams, and every considerable fall of water turned a wheel of some kind....They were an independent, self-sustaining people, raising their own bread, and manufacturing all that their wants required. No county in the State was better prepared to be thrown upon its own resources, and it was owing quite as much to the character of the people as to its situation and natural defenses that during the eight years' struggle which was to follow no force of the enemy entered its bounds except as prisoners of war.

The state is now gearing up for the celebration through Crossroads of the American Revolution/RevolutionNJ. Their website at revolutionarynj.org offers development resources, resources for New Jersey Revolutionary War sites, grant opportunities, upcoming events, and 250th updates.

In Morristown on August 28, a panel discussion, "Preparing for America's 250th Anniversary," with Senator Corey Booker and Congresswoman Mikie Sherrill, was held at Washington's Headquarters. Representatives from more than 30 organizations attended, including the Morris County Heritage Commission. Many of the organizations are eager to exchange ideas and work together.

It is important to remember that the Revolutionary War impacted everyone. Even though no battles were fought within Morris County, how ordinary people lived is also part of history: the families left at home and those following the troops, Loyalists and Patriots, people providing for the needs of the encampments, and those who lost relatives to wounds or disease.

The 250th Site Assessment Project Roster from Crossroads of New Jersey lists sites across the state by county. Only six sites are listed for Morris County: the Shephard Kollock Newspaper Site in Chatham, the Jacob Morrell House in Chatham, the Henry Doremus House in Montville, the Morristown National Historical Park, the Schuyler-Hamilton House in Morristown, and the Livingston-Benedict House in Parsippany. There are many, many more historic sites in the county. A more complete list is needed so local citizens and visitors alike can appreciate the County's Revolutionary history.

Research by historical societies, museums, and historical sites can start by visiting the Morris County Office of Planning and Preservation online. Select "Story Maps & Online Tools" to see the American Revolution Story Map and the Cultural Resource Inventory for Morris County. Also select the "Cultural Resources Survey" for Morris County's American Revolution Veterans Document. \*

### An Explosive Past, Part I By Marty Kane

If not the center of America's explosive industry, Morris County certainly was a significant source of such products from the late 19th century through the first half of the 20th century. Because the area had many iron mines, explosives were needed to cost-effectively mine the ore. Sparsely populated areas of Morris County located between mountains provided perfect locations to set up factories to produce such products as dynamite and nitroglycerin. Three major explosive operations - American Forcite Powder and Hercules Powder, both in Roxbury Township, and Picatinny Arsenal in Rockaway Township – would collectively play major roles in the two World Wars as well

as greatly influence the development of Morris County.

In the course of the next few issues, we will look at each of these operations starting with the least known of these sites, the American Forcite Powder Company, which was located on the shores of Lake Hopatcong in the Landing section of Roxbury Township. In the early 1880s, before tourists began arriving in large numbers at Lake Hopatcong, the area around the lake was considered quite remote. This isolation was one of the

reasons that American Forcite Powder Manufacturing Company decided to build here on four hundred acres of nearly empty land. The property chosen contained only the remains of a few old iron mines and fronted on the lake, allowing easy access to the Morris Canal. The Dover Iron Era of December 23, 1883, described American Forcite's facility as "about 33 buildings" situated in a semicircle around the lake and "separated from the powder line by a high hill.... Further back on the nitroglycerine hill may be obtained a good view of the factory and Lake Hopatcong. On this hill is an immense ice house used to cool the water in the nitroglycerine house. All the buildings where explosives are handled are set back into the hill, forming a natural fortification in case of explosion." Eventually, the manufacturing plant encompassed over one hundred buildings spread over the site.

American Forcite's main product was the first commercially available gelatin dynamite in the United States. Being water resistant and relatively free of fumes, this dynamite was particularly suited for tunnel and hard-rock blasting. It was widely used in the iron mines of northern New Jersey. The plant's Landing location placed it very close to two important customers - the Army's Powder Depot at Picatinny Arsenal and the Hercules plant in Kenvil.

American Forcite was responsible for bringing one of Lake Hopatcong's most famous residents here. In 1899, it was acquired by Eastern Dynamite Company, which soon became part of the DuPont Company. As a consultant to

DuPont, Hudson Maxim was sent to the lake to assist at the American Forcite facility. He soon bought lakefront property, eventually owning a major portion of the Borough of Hopatcong's land. His arrival caught the attention of the *Lake Hopatcong Breeze*, which reported in the July 26, 1902, edition that Maxim, "the inventor of Maximite and other high-explosives, occupies Briarwood Cottage in the Styx. At present he is conducting experiments in his laboratory at the Forcite Powder Works, probably devising some new and mighty explosives that will blow everything and everybody into smithereens."


By 1903, DuPont controlled more than 75 percent of the American explosives industry. This led to antitrust action and a 1912 agreement which split DuPont's explosives business into Hercules Powder and Atlas Powder. American Forcite became part of, and changed its name to, Atlas Powder Company in 1913.

American Forcite, and later Atlas Powder, had a turbulent relationship with the local community. Explosives manufacturing facilities of the era had terrible safety records and this plant was no exception. The first major explosion occurred in 1886 and leveled the facility. During its history the site saw at least 15 major explosions. Most resulted in loss of life and several were so large that the blasts were heard or felt as far away as Morristown and Paterson. After a major explosion in 1916, Hudson Maxim tried to mute some of the criticism of the manufacturing facility. The following excerpt is taken from an article Maxim wrote for the July 1, 1916, edition of the *Breeze*:

The recent explosion of a quantity of dynamite in process of manufacture at the works of the Atlas Powder Company on Lake Hopatcong, has thrown a false fear into the hearts of some persons, and they imagine that travel, along the highway past the works is dangerous, and that nearby cottagers are in peril of seeing their houses blown down about their heads. During the entire existence of these works on Lake Hopatcong, a period of more than thirty years, not a single person outside of the immediate works has ever been injured by any explosion, and no building seriously damaged. The only ones that have been killed or injured have been those engaged in the immediate vicinity of an explosion. Such explosions are absolutely unavoidable. No greater care is possible than is already taken.

The powder manufacturing facility also had a poor relationship with local fishermen, who blamed the plant for fish kills caused by its dumping of sulfuric acid waste, a by-product of the manufacture of gelatin dynamite, into the lake. The anglers demonstrated by placing live fish in crates at the dump sites. The fish quickly died. Parts of the community were outraged and litigation followed in 1890. Eventually, the jobs provided by the explosives factory outweighed environmental concerns and, after promises

by American Forcite to do better, the plant was allowed to continue its operations.

In 1897 the Lackawanna Railroad built a short freight spur, known as the Hopatcong Railroad, which connected the explosives plant to the Lackawanna at Landing. This freight spur proved very important during World War I, when large quantities of sulfuric and nitric acids, necessary for production of explosives, were

Four thousand pounds of dynamite and glycerina let go, killing five men and injuring fifteen; several of whom were hurried to hospitals in Dover and Morristown in the hope of saving their lives.

manufactured and shipped from here for the war effort. To avoid interfering with Atlas Powder's production, the Morris County Traction Company trolley to the amusement park on Bertrand Island had to be suspended for the duration of the war because it shared some of the same rail line. Following the war, the plant produced dynamite, nitroglycerin, and nitric and sulfuric acids.


The era of explosives manufacturing at Lake Hopatcong ended in 1932. The once-isolated facility now bordered on a large summer community. Facing high land values and high taxation, Atlas management decided to dismantle the plant and move operations to eastern Pennsylvania.

Redevelopment of the site was delayed due to the Depression and World War II. Plans were unveiled during the Depression to turn the old powder plant site into a state park and legislation was introduced in the New Jersey Legislature in 1936, but did not advance. It was not until 1947 that Shore Hills Estates was built on the site, located in today's municipalities of Mount Arlington and Roxbury. Developments such as Shore Hills skyrocketed during the post-war baby-boom years as Americans sought family-friendly vacation spots. The development's original summer cottages are now almost completely yearround homes. Residents occasionally still find reinforced concrete in various locations on their properties, and Atlas Road runs through the development. These reminders are vestiges of a long-forgotten part of Morris County's unique and varied past. 🌣

### Remembering a Morristown Physician, Soldier, and Community Leader

uring the year there are a number of special occasions to remember those who served our country. In many cases, they gave of themselves more than we as a community have given them. So often, their names and deeds are lost to history. In 2023, after years of research, the members of the Morristown Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, have sought to remind the local history community of the legacy of one of its early residents, Dr. Jabez Campfield, who served the Morristown and nearby communities as a physician,

served in the Revolutionary War, was the founder of community organizations, and served as an appointed county official.

Dr. Campfield was born in Newark on Christmas Eve 1737 to Benjamin and Mehitabel Foster Campfield. They were members of a close-knit Puritan family from Connecticut who had settled in New Jersey. Jabez's father died while he was an infant. His father's cousin lived next door and became a father figure to him. Educated at the College of New Jersey, he studied the classics and earned Bachelor's and Master's Degrees. One of his classmates was James Caldwell, nicknamed the "fighting parson" of the Revolutionary War. After college, Jabez returned to Newark and studied medicine under Dr. William Burnet.

Following his apprenticeship with Dr. Burnet, Jabez married Sara Ward in 1765 and moved to Morristown. He purchased a house on the old King's Highway (now Morris Street) and opened his medical practice. It is believed that Dr. Campfield was the first doctor to set up a medical practice in Morristown. He treated patients, performed surgeries, inoculated Morristown residents during the smallpox epidemic, and took several young men into his practice and trained them to be physicians. Because of his dedication to medicine, he was granted an honorary doctorate from Queen's College (now Rutgers) during ceremonies for the first graduating class of their medical college in 1792.

When the Revolutionary War broke out, Dr. Campfield was quick to become involved. He served on the local Committee of Safety and joined the army with the rank of surgeon. He was attached to Colonel Jacob Ford's local militia during the Battle of Springfield. He was part of the attachment that guarded the rear flank of the Continental Army as they marched in the "mud rounds" across New Jersey. After Washington crossed the Delaware and the successful battles of Trenton and Princeton, Dr. Campfield joined the Continental Army in one of the new regiments organized to hold the swelling ranks of enlistees. This regiment was commanded by Colonel Oliver Spencer and was known as Spencer's Additional Continental Regiment. Dr. Campfield served in Spencer's Regiment for four years, until it was disbanded in 1781, during which time he treated smallpox patients and inoculated soldiers during Washington's first Morristown encampment in 1777.

During Washington's second winter encampment of 1779-1780 in Morristown, Surgeon General Dr. John Cochran was billeted to stay at Dr. Campfield's house. The house continued to serve as a medical dispensary and storehouse and was also a meeting place for the army's medical staff.

One of Washington's attachés, Alexander Hamilton, found another reason to visit the Campfield house. Dr. Cochran's niece, Elizabeth Schuyler, daughter of General Philip Schuyler, had joined her uncle at the house. An understanding developed and grew between Elizabeth and ambitious young officer Hamilton.

After his service during the war, Dr. Campfield had not finished serving in the military. In 1798 he joined the Morris County Cavalry as a captain and served until 1807. He finally retired fully from military service when he was 70 years old. His diary, which recounts his military service, is held at the New Jersey Historical Society in Newark.

After the war, Dr. Campfield returned to his medical practice in Morristown, but he gradually turned over the practice to his son William and focused on civic leadership. He was the first Morris County Surrogate not appointed by the Crown, serving in that role from 1785 to 1803. His 18-year tenure was the longest in this role until the record was broken in 2014.

Dr. Campfield also served in several other civic roles, including Justice of the Peace, Town Committee member, Judge of Elections, and Tax Collector. In 1791 he, along with colleagues, founded the Morris Academy, a prestigious private school on South Street that attracted students from across the East Coast, and twice served as the school's president.


In the early nineteenth century, Dr. Campfield and friends started a small lending library of horticulture and gardening books. This small lending library merged with a recently-formed Morris Library Association. When the two libraries merged in 1812, he served as the first librarian of the combined library. Today's Morristown and Morris County Libraries can trace their roots to this early library.

While busy serving his community as County Surrogate, Tax Collector, and Librarian, Dr. Campfield was active in other areas of civic service. As part of the church building committee, he oversaw the construction of the First Presbyterian Church's second edifice in the 1790s.

As an original member of the Society of the Cincinnati in the State of New Jersey, formed by George Washington and officers of the Continental Army, a member of the Free and Accepted Masons, and a founding member of the Medical Society of New Jersey, he continued to serve the needs of his community.

Dr. Campfield died at the age of 83 on May 20, 1821, and was laid to rest in the burial ground behind the Morristown First Presbyterian Church. For more than a century, his final resting place was unmarked.

After years of research to locate that final resting place, the Morristown Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, held a ceremony over Memorial Day weekend to honor Dr. Campfield's service to his country and community. A Veterans Administration headstone and bronze DAR plaque detailing some of his accomplishments and legacy to Morristown and Morris County were placed. Dr. Campfield's descendants, members of the DAR from the Morristown Chapter and from Texas and California chapters, members of the Sons of the American Revolution, members of the Society of the

Cincinnati, and re-enactors from the units associated with Dr. Campfield were in attendance. Also in attendance were the clergy and members of the Morristown First Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Campfield's house has been owned and operated by the Morristown Chapter – NSDAR since 1923.
Renamed the Schuyler-Hamilton House, it is located at 5 Olyphant Place and welcomes guests on Sunday afternoons. \*

### Commission Dedicates New Historic Site Markers

he Morris County Heritage Commission continues to expand upon one of its most noticeable programs, which involves working with history-related organizations and museums to install historic site markers throughout the county. Most recently, the Commission has installed two new markers: one replacing a dated and damaged marker for the Great Charlotteburg Furnace Tract in Kinnelon, and a second at the Phoenix House in Mendham Borough.

Originally erected in 1978 by the Heritage Commission, the marker head for the Great Charlotte-burg Furnace Tract had become damaged and was forced to be removed. Upon removal, Commissioners and staff found that the original historical text for the marker had become outdated and not consistent

with the current writing style for Heritage Commission markers. Thus, after long hours of research and editing, new text was finalized for the marker, which was replaced during the summer of 2023.

Another marker was erected for the Phoenix House in June 2023. A brand-

new historical marker can now be seen at the corner of West Main Street and Hilltop Road in Mendham Borough, showcasing the great historical significance of the 1800s classic Federal-style building.

#### Well Decommissioning

Special thanks to Sheriff Gannon and Prosecutor Carroll for the stellar coordination with local police departments to ensure security for our residents at these joyous celebrations," said Morris County Board of County Commissioners Director John Krickus.

The County Commissioners, Sheriff James Gannon, Prosecutor Robert Carroll and other county leaders have attended at least 17 public events, including prayer sessions, educational programs and menorah lightings since Hamas' barbarism left 1,400 people dead, more than 200 taken hostage and spurred an ongoing war in Gaza.

The County Commissioners, Sheriff James Gannon, Prosecutor Robert Carroll and other county leaders have attended at least 17 public events, including prayer sessions, educational programs and menorah lightings since Hamas' barbarism left 1,400 people dead, more than 200 taken hostage and spurred an ongoing war in Gaza.

The diverse range of activities in the area has strengthened community bonds in Morris County and developed public awareness of rising acts of antisemitism not witnessed since the Holocaust.

The County Commissioners publicly declared their support for Israel during an October 11 Commissioner Public Meeting.

During a subsequent meeting on Dec. 6, Commissioner Deborah Smith also shared the details of the "<u>Stand Against Jewish Hate Blue Light Campaign</u>," a movement intended to spread understanding and stand against to the growing threat of antisemitism around the world.

"As the light of the menorah goes out, our prayers go out to Israel and all our Jewish friends and loved ones," said Commissioner Deborah Smith.

who has volunteered to improve the community and who has been a leader and inspiration to other women in the county.

## Morris County 2024 Seeds of Change Award Nomination Page

The "Seeds of Change" Volunteer Award was inspired by the late State Sen. Leanna Brown, who passed in 2016. This honor is intended to highlight and celebrate women who build up other women, and that includes those who volunteer at the grassroot levels in the community.

**Ms. Brown** served on the Chatham Borough Council from 1969 to 1972. She was the first woman elected to the Morris County Board of Chosen Freeholders (now the Board of County Commissioners), becoming the Director in 1976. In 1978, she was named president of the New Jersey Association of Counties.

In 1983, Ms. Brown was also the first Republican woman elected to the New Jersey Senate. She was a champion of women's causes and mentor to many women who sought to join the political and electoral process. Ms. Brown also was the driving force behind the county's creation of the Morris County Advisory Committee on Women.

The award was first issued in April 2018 and has been bestowed only two other times because of an interruption in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The "Seeds of Change" Volunteer Award resumed in 2022.

## Morris County Commissioners Present 2024 Capital Spending Plan

Key Investments Include Infrastructure, Education and Public Safety

The Morris County Board of County Commissioners tonight unveiled a comprehensive capital spending plan for 2024 that prioritizes their commitment to education, public safety, health and the needs of our veterans and vulnerable residents, while continuing to invest in county roads, bridges and infrastructure.

The board's Capital Budget Committee, which includes Commissioners Tayfun Selen, Stephen H. Shaw and Deborah Smith, outlined the plan during a public meeting in Morristown. The 2024 Capital Spending Plan, minus state grants and ongoing legacy commitments, invests nearly \$35 million into educational facilities, human services support, public safety, health, county parks and upgrades to roads, intersections and bridges.

"The capital budget process began several months ago with the administration getting requests and back-up from the various County departments. We like to get our capital plan completed early so we can be among the first public entities to send projects out to bid," said Commissioner Shaw, chairman of the county budget committee.

"The inventory of County assets is not only extensive but very diverse as well. In addition to traditional infrastructure like our 287 miles of roads, 1,000 bridges and 3.4 million square feet of buildings, we have over 20,000 acres of parkland, right-of-way trees and three freight railroads," Shaw added.

The plan also continues a strategy of offsetting the county's future borrowing needs for necessary capital projects with federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds.

"We will continue to lead the state in bridge upgrades with the addition of \$5.4 million to our 2024 Capital Plan. Bridges in Dover, Mount Olive and Parsippany are among those targeted for improvement in 2024. By the end of next year, we will have replaced 43 bridges and rehabilitated six others over the past eight years," said Commissioner Selen.

He also noted the 2024 Capital Plan anticipates resurfacing 30 miles of county roadways next year, bringing the total to 220.8 miles of roads since 2016, an average of nearly 28 miles per year.

Public Invited to Attend Event In Person and Online

The Morris County Board of County Commissioners will hold its annual reorganization meeting for 2024 on Friday, Jan. 5, at 6 p.m. at the county's Administration and Records Building, 10 Court Street, Morristown. The meeting will be held in person and may be viewed online via WebEx.

Commissioner Tayfun Selen, who was reelected in November to a three-year term, will take his oath of office. A former mayor of Chatham, he was selected to serve an unexpired term on the board in 2020 and was elected later that year to serve a full three-year term.

Also to be sworn in is Morris County Clerk Ann F. Grossi, who was reelected in November to serve her third, five-year term.

Commissioner John Krickus, who served as Director in 2023, will turn over the gavel to Commissioner Christine Myers, who served as Deputy Director last year. Stephen H. Shaw will serve as Deputy Director for 2024. The commissioners elect the director and deputy director from among themselves.

Rounding out the Board of Commissioners are Douglas R. Cabana, Thomas J. Mastrangelo and Deborah Smith.

#### About County Government

Morris County's seven-member commissioner board is elected at-large to serve staggered three-year terms. The board sets policies for the operation of all county services, including six county government departments and their divisions. While the commissioners appoint and approve members and budgets of authorities, commissions, boards, and study committees, these groups may act independently of the Board of County Commissioners.

The actual day-to-day operation of the county government departments -- Employee Resources, Finance, Human Services, Law & Public Safety, Public Works and Information Technology -- is supervised by the county administrator, Deena Leary. Each of the seven commissioners serves as a liaison to at least one of those departments and to other areas of county government.

The essential services provided by county government are those that either cannot appropriately be provided by the state or are beyond the scope or ability of local governments.

County government responsibilities are divided into two distinct types:

- functions the county must perform as mandated by the state
- permissive functions the county may carry out in compliance with state law

#### The mandatory areas of responsibility are:

- court facilities (State runs court operations)
- law enforcement and the operation of a county jail
- general assistance or welfare
- education
- the construction and maintenance of county roads and bridges
- conducting elections

In addition to required services, Morris County government provides a variety of programs and services which benefit the entire county. County-level management and delivery of these services provides significant cost savings and efficiencies over duplicative services from municipality to municipality. This saves taxpayer dollars, while enhancing the quality of life for those living and working here.

- Morris County Park System
- Morris County Library
- Training for police, fire and other emergency services personnel

- Solid waste management and recycling
- Mosquito control
- Job training and re-training
- MAPS paratransit system
- A transportation program for senior citizens and people with disabilities

- An office of veterans services
- A <u>nutrition program</u> for senior citizens.





# Morris Academy Ranks Number One in the State

The Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering Gets an Overall A+

The Morris County Vocational School District (MCVSD) Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering ranked as New Jersey's best public high school, according to a <u>Niche.com ranking</u>. Overall, the school rated an A+.

The four-year academy has 180 students in grades 9-12 who attend the rigorous, highly focused program for those with career interests in engineering. They score highly on state tests, including 90 percent of students ranking at least 90 percent proficient in both math and reading.

The academy nationally ranks 3rd for STEM out of 9,676 schools and 15th best public high school out of 20,446. Additional national rankings:

- #3 best public high school teachers in America
- #8 best magnet high school in America
- #39 Best college prep public high school in America

One of six satellite academies administered by MCVSD, the Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering is located at Morris Hills High School in Rockaway. Five other satellite campuses are spread around the county, with ten academies located on the Morris County Vocational School District's Denville campus.

MCVSD, with the support of the Morris County Board of County Commissioners, is also expanding its educational opportunities. A groundbreaking ceremony took place this past September for MCVSD's new Career Training Center that will be located on campus at the County College of Morris (CCM).

"The vo-tech career training center will expand the district by 30 percent, providing 500 career-focused and college-bound high school students access to specialized training and skills to prepare them for indemand careers," said Commissioner Director Christine Myers, liaison to the Board of School Estimate for CCM and MCSVD.

The two-story, 45,940 square-foot building will cost \$24.8 million, with Morris County contributing \$6.2 million of funding and the state providing \$18.6 million under the Securing Our Children's Future (SOCF) Bond Act. Commissioner John Krickus added that the county will also cover increased operating expenses once the facility is constructed.

The Academies provide high school students who share similar interests and aptitudes with a challenging and exciting curriculum designed to prepare them for the rigors of college, post-secondary technical training or entry-level employment.

Students interested in applying to a four-year academy should submit applications in the fall of their 8th grade year. Applications are closed for this year.

Applications are now open for 15 Share Time and Technical Education Programs, including carpentry, auto body, allied heath, advanced manufacturing, exercise science, cosmetology, plumbing and electrical trades. Visit <u>MCVSD's website</u> for more information.

The Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering Gets an Overall A+

The Morris County Vocational School District (MCVSD) Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering ranked as New Jersey's best public high school, according to a Niche.com ranking. Overall, the school rated an A+.

The four-year academy has 180 students in grades 9-12 who attend the rigorous, highly focused program for those with career interests in engineering. They score highly on state tests, including 90 percent of students ranking at least 90 percent proficient in both math and reading.

The academy nationally ranks 3rd for STEM out of 9,676 schools and 15th best public high school out of 20,446. Additional national rankings:

- #3 best public high school teachers in America
- #8 best magnet high school in America
- #39 Best college prep public high school in America

One of six satellite academies administered by MCVSD, the Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering is located at Morris Hills High School in Rockaway. Five other satellite campuses are spread around the county, with ten academies located on the Morris County Vocational School District's Denville campus.

Commissioner John Krickus added that the county will also cover increased operating expenses once the facility is constructed.

The Academies provide high school students who share similar interests and aptitudes with a challenging and exciting curriculum designed to prepare them for the rigors of college, post-secondary technical training or entry-level employment.


Students interested in applying to a four-year academy should submit applications in the fall of their 8<sup>th</sup> grade year. Applications are closed for this year.
