OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT ANNOUNCEMENT

ROLLCALL

Resolutions: (28)

- 1. Authorizing an agreement with Verizon to resolve billing discrepancies related to police radio lines**
Verizon previously installed radio tie lines as part of a radio system upgrade which did not function properly which led to technical modifications resulting in a different billing system. The original lines were never removed from the bill which resulted in a billing discrepancy in the amount of \$53,016.96. Verizon has agreed to resolve the matter by crediting the account and removing the line item from the bill.
- 2. Authorizing a grant application to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection to address harmful algae blooms at Budd Lake**
The NJ DEP has made grant money available to help communities that have experienced the Harmful Algae Bloom. An application will be submitted to improve the water quality by implementing a more aggressive form of aquatic herbicide and weed harvesting program to manage the invasive species and remove vegetative growth. The grant requires a 33% match. The total project cost will not exceed \$545,000 with \$180,000 match from the Open Space Trust over the next three (3) years.
- 3. Creating a Sesquicentennial ad hoc committee**
In 2021 Mount Olive Township will be turning 150 years old as an Incorporated Municipality. An Ad Hoc Committee will be created to work with the Recreation Department to develop and plan Sesquicentennial Celebrations throughout the year. Seven (7) members will make up the committee comprised of employees, business owners and residents of Mount Olive.
- 4. Appointing Robert Delpizzo to the Musconetcong River Management Council for 2020**
Participating members of the Musconetcong River Management Council are entitled to appoint a member.
- 5. Authorizing the Mount Olive Police Department to participate in the Defense Logistics Agency, Law Enforcement Support Office "1033 Program" to procure excess Department of Defense equipment**
The Police Chief requests authorization to participate in the 1033 Program to procure excess military defense equipment, specifically (5) M16 rifles.

- 6. Cancelling taxes on Block 5000, Lot 46 for disabled veteran declared 100% totally & permanently disabled by the tax assessor**
The Tax Collector and Assessor recommend canceling the 2019 taxes in the amount of \$313.81 for a resident who has been granted a full exemption from property taxes as a result of being a disabled veteran.
- 7. Approving a 'Non-Fair and Open' vendor service contract pursuant to the 'Pay-to-Play' law (FCR Morris, LLC)**
As per the local public contracts law, the Township needs to acquire recycling commodity services. The maximum annual dollar value of the contract should not exceed \$120,000. A non-fair and open contract will be awarded to FCR Morris, LLC (ReCommunity).
- 8. Awarding a contract to Elvada Supply, LLC for Bid #26-2018 Woodchip and Vegetative Debris Pick-Up Service (2018-2020) *Revising Contract Amount***
As per the local public contracts law, a multi-year contract was awarded to Elvada Supply LLC for Woodchip & Vegetative Debris services. The contract amount needs to be revised to include additional funding of \$35,000 for 2020.
- 9. Awarding a contract to Harrington Construction Co. Inc. for Rebid #20-2018 Snowplowing Services (2018-2020) *Revising Contract Amount***
As per the local public contracts law, a multi-year contract was awarded to Harrington Construction Co. Inc. for snowplowing services. The contract amount needs to be revised to include additional funding of \$130,000 for 2020.

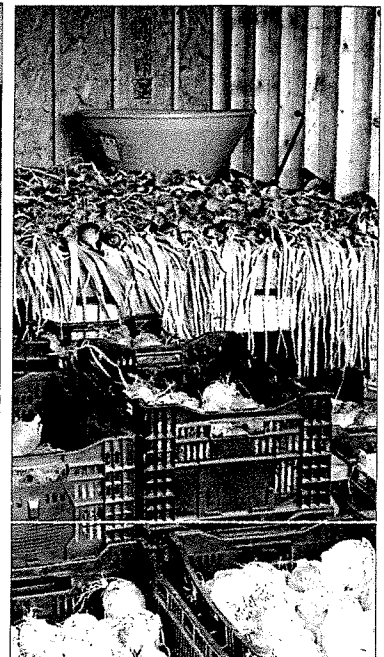
27,000 POUNDS OF PRODUCE GROWN AT CITY GREEN FARMS

The partnership between The Land Conservancy and City Green was established in 2018. City Green Farms at South Branch Preserve is celebrating an amazing first season with over 27,000 pounds of food grown and harvested! Prior to this year's harvest, City Green prepared for cultivation with cover crops to suppress weeds and bring nutrients back to the soil.

This year, the 12-acre farm grew turnips, carrots, cabbage, winter squash, watermelon, cantaloupe, corn, potatoes, sweet potatoes, garlic, onions, broccoli, and more. In keeping with their mandate, City Green Inc., a non-profit based in Clifton, has been offering equitable access to healthy food while supporting and promoting environmental stewardship and ecologically sustainable communities since 2004. City Green operates farm stands and offers an incentive program for people enrolled in food assistance programs and accepts food stamps at double their value through their "Good Food Bucks" program.

When selecting crops to plant, many factors were taken into consideration, including the cuisines and preferences of local consumers, and their familiarity and cooking knowledge of these products. Looking forward, the farm hopes to plant an apple orchard and cultivate blueberries, making use of a sloped area on the property that's not currently planted.

Along with providing access to fresh vegetables, City Green also focuses on education, teaching regenerative farming practices to local farmers, as well as taking on summer interns from local high schools to provide paid summer employment and youth

development programming. All in all, the 2019 growing year has been a successful one and The Land Conservancy looks forward to what 2020 has in store for this exciting partnership at the South Branch Preserve!

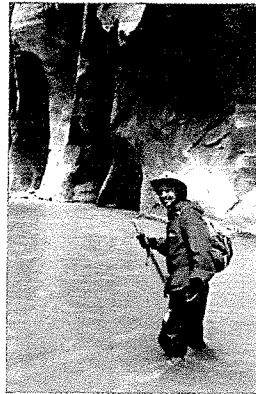

FROM THE PRESIDENT



When I began work with Morris Parks and Land Conservancy 25 years ago, I had no way of knowing the many changes that lay ahead. I was the first (and only!) staff person and was borrowing a single computer with 256 kb of memory. Today we have 13 staff members, a dozen volunteers, another dozen interns and 23 computers – each of which has 8000 times as much memory. Our first office had three rooms in Morristown - we have since

moved three times, changed our name twice and expanded the area we work from Morris County to the entire state.

It took three years to hire our first intern (110 have since followed) and the intern's first suggestion was to create a Conservancy website. I was opposed, but fortunately lost the argument. Just a few months later an Australian intern, who found us through our new website, created our computer based mapping system which today is still the basis for all of our land preservation and planning work.

Preserving land was always my goal and while our Board of Trustees supported that concept, initially we had absolutely no resources to make this happen. When I outlined what resources we would need, one of our Trustees donated \$100 and our Land Preservation Fund was born. Today that Fund totals \$1.8 million. It took four years to preserve our first property. Today we preserve one or more properties each month and have completed 455 transactions preserving 27,800 acres of magnificent land.

When I began, Green Acres was funded with bond referendums that were only renewed after the state ran out of money, sometimes going years without funds. Today, there is a permanent stream of state funds for open space, farmland and historic preservation, thanks to the 2014 referendum dedicating a portion of the Corporate Business Tax. The Land Conservancy of New Jersey was a leader in that effort, raising \$1.5 million to educate the public about the importance of approving this referendum. These state funds are now matched by Open Space Trust Funds in all 21 counties and more than 200 local towns – something that was virtually non-existent in 1994.

I have enjoyed my time with The Land Conservancy immensely because, through all of these remarkable changes, one thing has remained the same – my unwavering focus to preserve more of the beautiful land that makes New Jersey such a great place to live.

35-ACRE WHITE TOWNSHIP FARM PRESERVED



Hensler Farm, White Township

The Land Conservancy is pleased to announce the preservation of Hensler Farm, a family-owned, sustainable farming operation located in scenic White Township. This 35-acre working farm features rolling landscapes, stunning views of the Delaware Water Gap and is adjacent to three preserved farm parcels, making a wonderful new addition to the farm belt in this portion of the Township. For this easement, The Land Conservancy has partnered with the Warren County Agriculture Development Board, who will own and protect the easement in perpetuity.

Over the years, Hensler Farm has grown from selling its sweet corn at roadside tables into a thriving farm, market and greenhouse business. The farm hosts Community Supported Agriculture programs where locals can buy shares of varying sizes that provide produce for 20 weeks, with up to 16 different types of produce per week. The Hensler Farmer's Market and Greenhouse also offers prepared goods, organic raw-milk cheese and flowers and plants of all kinds throughout the seasons.

"We're thrilled that The Land Conservancy and the Warren CADB were able to step in and help preserve our family farm," said Alfred Hensler. "It's been a labor of love for us to grow from a small operation into a community hub of sorts for Warren County residents, and we're glad this work will be able to continue," he added.



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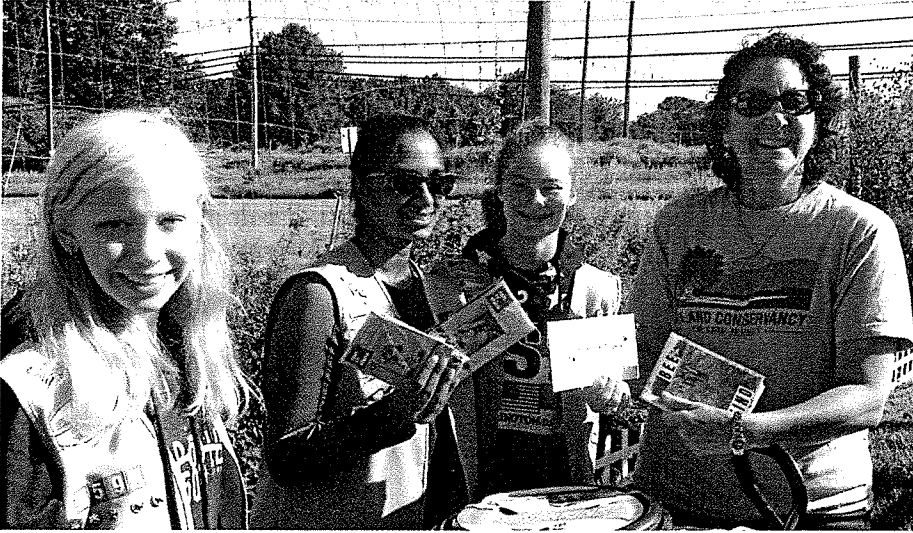


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SCOUTS EARN SILVER AWARD WITH COMMUNITY GARDEN

Three students from the Girl Scouts Troop 94594 in Mt. Olive have completed their Silver Award, the second-highest award a cadette can earn, by completing a project at our South Branch Preserve. To earn a Silver Award, the Girl Scouts identified an issue they care about; explored their community and identified a project to address, created a project plan; executed the plan; and shared the experience.

For their project, Cadette Olivia Walker, Vaibhavi Borra, and Zoe Gregory wanted to raise awareness about the importance of pollinators and their important role in our food supply. They recognized the Community Garden at South Branch Preserve as an ideal location to create a habitat to attract bees and butterflies and got in touch with Community Garden Manager Barbara McCloskey

to kickstart their project. The scouts presented their project to the community at the “Rainbow Rocks” rock painting event, held at the Mt. Olive Public Library. Starting in early summer, the Scouts selected two spots—a 10’ x 10’ plot and a 3’ x 30’ strip along the Community Garden fence—where they interspersed the painted rocks among the native plants. Through their collaboration with the Pollinator Garden Program, the Scouts received pollinator garden mix containing milkweed, wildflower, and perennial seeds.

After planting the seeds at the selected plots, they grew into a wonderful assortment of pollinator plants, attracting many butterflies and bees over the season. Finally, the Scouts created a Pollinator Project website to share their goals, key learnings, and experiences with their fellow Girl Scouts and the Mt. Olive community.

TJALMA FARM PRESERVED IN HARMONY TOWNSHIP

The Land Conservancy is pleased to announce the successful preservation of the second Tjalma Farm in Harmony Township in June. This is the second of two Tjalma farming tracts totalling 278 acres that have been preserved, allowing for their active farming operation to continue.

The two farms currently grow corn and soy on a rotational basis and the land preservation will allow for an easy expansion of agricultural operations. The first Tjalma farm was purchased in 2007 as part of an agricultural easement

project led by the Township and The Land Conservancy and was the first project to be completed as part of the town’s Planning Incentive Grant with the State Agricultural Development Committee. Across the street from the Delaware River, the picturesque Tjalma farms are also adjacent to the preserved Burke and Dinsmore Farms, within a half mile buffer of a large amount of state owned open space and features beautiful views of the surrounding landscape.

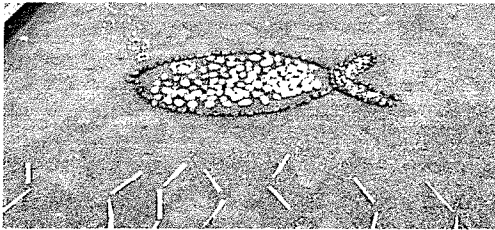
THE LAND CONSERVANCY OF NEW JERSEY HONORS FORMER BOARD CHAIR NANCY CONGER

TRUMAN FIELD EXPANSION UPDATE

Following the devastating flooding from Hurricane Irene, Oakland Borough and The Land Conservancy initiated the Truman Field Expansion project to purchase and remove homes along the Ramapo River. Homes damaged from the flooding have been purchased to create a continuous buffer along the Ramapo River for Truman Field Park. With 12

homes purchased, eight that have been demolished, the project is now in Phase III (on nearby Lenape Lane) and we have applied for grant funding for five homes to purchase and demolish. The Borough is exploring many different uses for this new park, including river access for fishing, a walking path, native vegetation, and rain gardens.

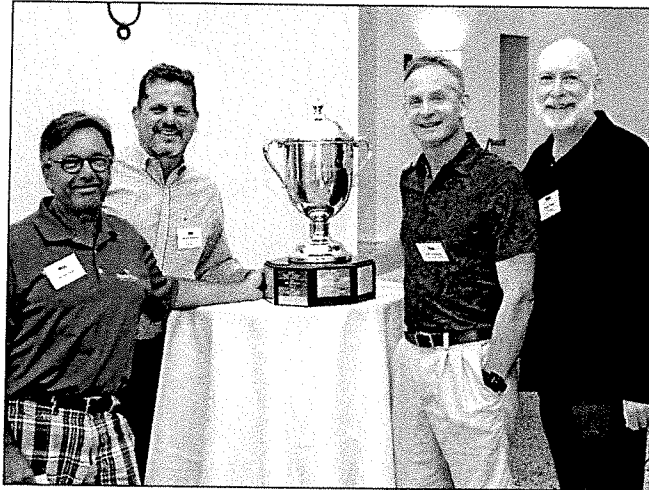

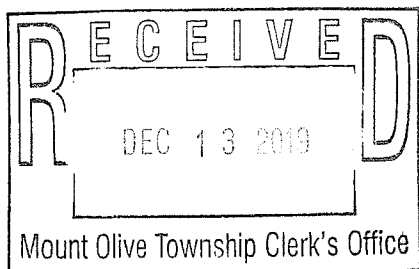

- If you are on the cusp of itemizing, time your gifts: As a result of tax reform, the standard deduction will be larger than your itemized deductions combined. In that case, you could carefully time your charitable gifts to allow you to itemize one year and take the standard deduction the next, preserving much of the tax savings.

- Give appreciated assets, the best way to give whether or not you itemize: Cash is always welcome - and simple. However, from a tax standpoint, it is often better to give appreciated property that you have owned more than one year. If you itemize and give an appreciated asset, such as securities, you receive a double tax benefit: a charitable deduction for the market value of the securities and no tax on the capital gain. If you take the standard deduction, you still receive the benefit of untaxed capital gain.

- If you are 70 ½ or older: A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from your IRA can be an easy and convenient way to make a gift from one of your major assets, it can be excluded from your gross income: a tax-free rollover, and count toward your required minimum distribution.

The Garden State Preservation Trust has approved and recommended to the New Jersey State Legislature nearly \$87 million in funding for projects to develop or update parks, playgrounds and fields, including \$1 million for Vista Park in the City of Paterson, to help enhance quality of life statewide, Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe announced today. The Vista Park site in Paterson – one of many in the state that benefit from the grants -- would add 40,000 square feet of green space, among other amenities. 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GILDED-ERA DECORATIONS AT RINGWOOD MANOR AND DRUMTHWACKET AMONG HIGHLIGHTS OF ANNUAL CHRISTMAS ACTIVITIES AT STATE PARKS

(19/P96) TRENTON – An annual slate of activities harkening back to the Christmases of past will be offered at multiple state parks, forests and historic sites this holiday season, the Department of Environmental Protection announced.

Numerous events are planned, from elegant decorations of the Gilded Age on display at Ringwood Manor in Ringwood State Park, to The Holidays at Drumthwacket, a series of open house events at the Governor's official residence in Princeton, and the very popular annual re-enactment at Washington Crossing State Park of General George Washington and his troops crossing the Delaware River.



"The holiday season in New Jersey is extra special because of our state's rich history, dating to the birth of our nation as a result of heroic and strategic efforts in Princeton and Trenton," Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe said. "Whether watching General Washington cross the Delaware or seeing Gilded Age holiday decorations, there are many wonderful opportunities for families and friends to gather and enjoy the spirit of Christmas."

"Come celebrate the holidays by visiting the many activities or themed events at our parks, forests and historic sites," Parks and Forestry Director Olivia Glenn said. "There really is something for just about every age group and interest. Visitors can step back into New Jersey's rich history at some exhibits or simply enjoy the spirit of the season by listening to carolers or visiting with Santa."

The holiday season is under way at Drumthwacket and Ringwood Manor, both of which invite the public to enjoy festive decorations at both properties.

Nine garden clubs representing eight New Jersey counties have decorated rooms at Drumthwacket using fresh arrangements and greenery to complement the mansion's architecture and décor with decorations celebrating Hanukkah and Christmas.

Drumthwacket docents will be available to answer questions and offer historical information about the property. Visitors may do tours from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays, Dec. 7 and 21; Sunday, Dec. 8; Tuesday, Dec. 17 and Thursday, Dec. 19. Admission and parking are free. Ringwood Manor, a 19th-century home listed on the National Register of Historic Places, is decorated for its annual Victorian Christmas event.

The stunning house that was home to well-known ironmasters in the 19th and 20th centuries sits on a low hill that overlooks a rustic landscape, making it a beautiful location to visit during the holidays and winter.

Visitors may do self-guided tours of the home between 10 a. m. and 4 p.m. Saturdays Dec. 7 and 14, or Sundays, Dec. 8 and 15. Reservations are not required, and tickets may be purchased at the door. Admission is \$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors and students, and \$5 for children ages 5 to 12. Group tours for a minimum of 10 people will be offered only on Wednesday, Dec. 11.



The Women's Club of West Milford decorates the first floor of the home each year. In addition to viewing the decorations, visitors may purchase items from crafters on site, and children may participate in an indoor scavenger hunt at the house.

Ringwood Manor will also host Victorian Christmas concerts from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Friday Dec. 13 and Saturday, Dec. 14 in the manor's Great Hall. The concerts are limited to 50 people per performance. Tickets are \$35 each and must be purchased in advance.

Victorian Christmas is an annual fundraiser of The Women's Club of West Milford, the North Jersey Highlands Historical Society, the Ringwood Manor Association of the Arts and Ringwood Manor. For more information, call (973) 962-2240. For group tour information, call (973) 853-7258.

Elsewhere around the state:

The Historic Village at Allaire within Allaire State Park in Wall Township, Monmouth County, is offering guided lantern tours and interactive Christmas activities for all ages.

Visitors can tour the Historic Village at Allaire by lantern light and learn about Christmas in New Jersey during the 1800s. Tours leave every 15 minutes from 5 to 8 p.m. on Saturdays, Dec. 7, 14 and 21.

The 90-minute, outdoor guided tours are \$20 per person. Tickets must be purchased in advance.

Strollers are not permitted in the historic buildings.

Christmas at The Historic Village at Allaire will offer interactive programs from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sundays, Dec. 8, 15 and 22.

Activities include music, storytelling, hearth cooking, crafts and a visit from Santa Claus. Admission is \$8. Children younger than 2 years of age will be admitted free.



The annual Soldiers Christmas event at Fort Mott State Park, recalling how troops spent the holiday in New Jersey during wartime, is scheduled from 5 to 9 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 14 in Pennsville. Re-enactors will portray soldiers from the Roman era to the Cold War, and military-themed exhibits will be on display. Admission is free.

On Christmas Day, visitors to Washington Crossing State Park can commemorate the 243rd anniversary of the pivotal crossing of the Delaware River on Dec. 25, 1776, during the War for Independence.

The crossing led to strategic victories the next day in Trenton, followed by victories at Assunpink Creek on Jan. 2, 1777 and at Princeton on Jan. 3, 1777. These victories helped establish Washington's Continental Army as a viable fighting force that could challenge the British Army and its Hessian mercenaries.

Prior to the crossing and the ensuing battles of Trenton and Princeton, the American Revolution was thought to be lost. But those victories turned the war around and led to the eventual defeat of the British in 1783.

Visitors are encouraged to arrive by noon to have time to park and find a good viewing location. A history narration of the event will begin at 12:30 p.m. along the riverbank and the crossing will start at 1 p.m. from the Pennsylvania side of the river.

The re-enactment is free and will be held weather-permitting. For more information, call (609) 737-0623.

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DEP HONORS LEADERS DURING ANNUAL GOVERNOR'S ENVIRONMENTAL EXCELLENCE AWARDS CEREMONY

(19/P97) TRENTON – Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe today presented Governor's Environmental Excellence Awards to those who have spearheaded efforts to help protect and enhance New Jersey's environment.



The 20th Annual Governor's Environmental Excellence Awards, held at the New Jersey State Museum, recognized efforts by schools, businesses and nonprofits that protect water and air quality, support sustainability and protect natural resources.

Commissioner McCabe also announced that former Governors Thomas H. Kean and James J. Florio, noted for their leadership of the state during pivotal periods in environmental protection, were honored with Richard J. Sullivan awards. The award, named for the first DEP Commissioner, will be formally presented to Kean and Florio in April, as part of DEP's 50th birthday celebration and the 50th anniversary of America's first Earth Day.

"It is truly an honor to recognize these environmental leaders who are shining examples for all of us to follow," Commissioner McCabe said. "Their commitment and dedication provide proof that the spirit of environmentalism remains strong in New Jersey. We congratulate them on their outstanding achievements and thank them for helping to improve the health of our environment – and our quality of life. We are particularly pleased to honor former Governors Kean and Florio, pioneers in protecting the environment who today remain stalwart advocates on environmental issues, including climate change."

Among the honorees recognized are two businesses that adapted green practices to combat climate change and promote sustainability; two nonprofits with statewide reach that facilitate local environmental decisions and actions; two comprehensive projects that harness the collaboration of numerous partners and volunteers to protect natural resources; and two efforts that engage students in designing and caring for rain gardens and green infrastructure.

The Governor's Environmental Excellence Award is New Jersey's premier environmental award. The program has recognized 188 winners since 2000.

The DEP, New Jersey Infrastructure Bank, and the New Jersey Corporation for Advanced Technology, in partnership with the New Jersey State League of Municipalities and the DEP's Environmental Stewardship Initiative, sponsor the program.

The DEP received more than 50 applications for this year's awards. A panel of judges reviewed and scored the nominations on criteria including documented environmental benefit, contributions to meeting the state's environment needs, replicability by others, leadership and innovation, and education and outreach undertaken as part of the effort. 2019 GOVERNOR'S ENVIRONMENTAL EXCELLENCE AWARD WINNERS

Richard J. Sullivan Award

Thomas H. Kean

Kean served as Governor from January 1982 through January 1990. He served in the New Jersey Assembly beginning in 1967 and became the youngest Assembly Speaker in 1971, at the age of 36. As Assembly Speaker, he helped usher passage of the Coastal Facility Review Act, regulating coastal development. His environmental record as an elected official included pushing for legislation protecting freshwater wetlands and dealing with the state's legacy of toxic waste dumping, contamination of the Passaic River from chemicals used to produce Agent Orange, and ocean pollution. He signed the Worker Community Right to Know Act in 1983, signed an executive order to protect the public from radon, signed the law that made New Jersey the first state to require recycling. He also worked to end ocean waste dumping in 1991. Additionally, he signed a law to stop the discharge of raw sewage into the ocean and worked on efforts to upgrade wastewater treatment plants and track medical waste. He later served as president of Drew University and remains active on environmental issues, serving, along with Florio, as honorary co-chair of the New Jersey Climate Change Alliance at Rutgers University.

James J. Florio

Florio served as Governor from January 1990 until January 1994. Before his election as Governor, he served in the state Assembly and then in the U.S. House of Representatives, representing the First District. As a member of Congress, he authored the Comprehensive Response Compensation and Liability Act, known commonly as the Superfund law, which prioritized remediation of the nation's most contaminated sites. He also wrote and steered passage of an amendment to the National Parks and Recreation Act, creating New Jersey's Pinelands National Reserve. As Governor, he signed the state's Clean Water Enforcement Act, one of the strongest laws of its type in the nation and model for reauthorization of the nation's Clean Water Enforcement Act. During his tenure as Governor, the State Development and Redevelopment Plan was adopted. He remains a passionate speaker and advocate on protecting the environment. Along with Kean, he serves as honorary co-chair of the New Jersey Climate Change Alliance. He received the prestigious Profile in Courage Award from the John F. Kennedy Foundation in 1993.

Climate Change & Clean Air

Domain Computer Services

Domain Computer Services, a Cranbury technology solutions company, is working to reduce its environmental impact by using and promoting electric vehicles. The company's commitment to going green began in 2012, when Domain founder and CEO Rashaad Bajwa introduced electric cars to its fleet. Today, the company has 10 electric vehicles – and employees are encouraged to use them not only for business, but in their daily lives, to promote a cleaner environment. Domain also has five electric vehicle chargers at its offices and participates in New Jersey's It Pay\$ to Plug In, a charging station grants program. The company estimates that it has reduced its carbon dioxide emissions by 348,000 pounds since replacing its gasoline-powered fleet with electric vehicles.

Water Resources

Garden Magic LLC

How your garden grows – in an environmentally friendly way – may depend on whose advice you're following. Garden Magic LLC, of Mountain Lakes, provides practical, in-the-garden assistance to homeowners, master gardeners, community organizations and landscaping groups. Company principals Susan and Brian Marshall specialize in water resources engineering and native plant horticulture, which they use to create rain gardens and other watershed protection projects, including a state-of-the-art rain garden installed at historic St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Mountain Lakes. The rain garden collects stormwater from the church and rectory roofs, the rectory driveway, surrounding lawn and gardens, and two adjacent properties. It is expected to capture more than 200,000 gallons of runoff each year.

Healthy Ecosystems & Habitats

reTURN the Favor New Jersey

From sunset to sunrise, they roam Delaware Bay beaches in search of stranded horseshoe crabs. Volunteers with reTURN the Favor New Jersey visit these beaches from April through July, during the spawning season, and gently turn the horseshoe crabs onto their legs, pointing the creatures toward the water. The program assists the DEP's Division of Fish and Wildlife by reducing the loss of spawning horseshoe crabs, increasing public awareness of conservation needs, and collecting data on horseshoe crabs and their habitat. Volunteers also identify stranding hazards and make observations that inform conservation, research and habitat restoration. Since 2013, volunteers have rescued more than 500,000 horseshoe crabs. Partners include Citizens United for the Maurice River and its Tributaries, Conserve Wildlife Foundation of New Jersey, Friends of Cape May National Wildlife Refuge, M. Wren Consulting, New Jersey Audubon, Rutgers University, The Nature Conservancy, The Wetlands Institute and Executive Office of Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network.

Land Conservation

New Jersey Conservation Blueprint

Everyone knows that New Jersey is the most densely populated state in the nation. So how do we figure out how to most effectively work toward conserving the most critical remaining lands? The New Jersey Conservation Blueprint – a data-driven, interactive mapping tool – is meant to help with determining those answers. More than 140 data sets are available, including regional analysis, landowner contacts and funding collaborations, with information as detailed as the parcel level. And all of it is free, accessible with the click of a computer mouse. The Blueprint was established by a partnership of The Nature Conservancy, Rowan University, the New Jersey

Conservation Foundation and 22 other conservation leaders from government and the nonprofit sectors.

Healthy & Sustainable Businesses

La Belle Vie Salon

“The beautiful life” is what La Belle Vie Salon strives to provide – in every way. The Gloucester County hair salon not only offers hair and beauty services, but also is committed to reducing its ecological footprint. Since 2017, about 90 percent of the salon’s waste has been recycled or repurposed, thanks to its partnership with Green Circle Salons, an environmental company devoted to helping salons become sustainable. At La Belle Vie, excess color waste is separated so that the color can be repurposed and the wastewater used for landscaping. Chemicals are removed from canisters and metal products, and disposed of properly, while the canisters are recycled. Hair is recovered and used in materials to help clean up oil spills. The salon also has energy-efficient appliances and LED lighting, and shampoo bowl shower heads that conserve water, reducing water and energy use by 65 percent.



Healthy & Sustainable Communities

Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions

When everyone else is looking at the big picture, the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions narrows its focus to this: local environment matters. The nonprofit organization has spent 50 years providing leadership, education and support to New Jersey’s environmental commissions, as well as local planning boards and public officials. From educational resources to networking opportunities, the association aims to prepare its members to address challenges ranging from hazardous spills to climate change. The association also has partnered with local, county and state organizations to advocate for strong state and regional environmental policies. But the heart of the association’s work is to ensure that every commission understands its local, regional and statewide responsibilities to assure responsible and sustainable use of New Jersey’s natural resources and to protect environmental health.

Healthy & Sustainable Communities

New Jersey School Boards Association

The writing on the blackboard should read: *Sustainable practices do not have to cost the district a lot of money.* That is the thinking behind the New Jersey School Boards Association’s effort to get the state’s public schools focused on advancing environmentally friendly practices in their facilities. The Association represents more than 5,000 members of the state’s 581 local boards of education and charter school boards of trustees, which govern the operation of New Jersey’s public schools. Since 2011, the organization has not only helped school board members and administrators to learn about sustainability and sustainable practices, but it also works with school teams to create sustainability plans tailored to meet a district’s needs, reduce operational costs, improve indoor environmental quality, and infuse sustainability throughout curriculum. The Association offers a New Jersey Sustainable Schools Guidebook, which is a resource for school and district leaders aiming to “green” their facilities.

Environmental Education (Educator-led)

Wallkill River Watershed Management Group

Remember when summer camp meant days swimming and splashing around in a lake? For students taking part in Stormwater Summer Camp, activities still involve water – but have a “green” goal. The third annual camp, funded by NJ Future and held in July at Marian E. McKeown Elementary School in Hampton, saw students building water filters, getting their hands dirty in the school’s 3,865-square-foot rain garden and observing the installation of porous asphalt in the school parking lot. The camp, conducted by the Wallkill River Watershed Management Group (part of the Sussex County Municipal Utilities Authority), included stormwater-themed STEM activities and off-campus field trips to teach the campers about water pollution and conservation, project planning and design, and stormwater management using nature-based solutions. The efforts at the Sussex County school help to capture stormwater from its facilities so that polluted runoff won’t flow into the Paulins Kill River directly across the street.

Environmental Education (Student-Led)

Bridgewater-Raritan High School Students

They call them the Green Ambassadors. Five students at Bridgewater-Raritan High School discovered that flooding from rainwater near one of their school buildings was sending polluted runoff into the Raritan River and decided to do something about it. Digging in to find a solution, the teens – Ritika Thomas, Aneesh Nagalkar, Amogh Jupalli, Sujay Edavalapati and Pravar Jain – determined the best remedy would be a rain garden. Working with environmental experts from Rutgers University and the Raritan Headwaters Association, they created a plan.

The students researched native plants, gathered necessary materials and selected a planting date in mid-July. Accompanied by volunteers from the local elementary, middle and high schools, they dug, mulched, weeded and filled the rain garden with low-maintenance plants. They followed up with a schedule for watering and nurturing the garden’s plantings into the school year. The young team also has launched a Green Infrastructure Club at school to educate others about the environment and water quality. The rain garden will serve as a science laboratory for soil, plant and pollutant testing by science classes. The students also want to add a weather station and fencing, and plan to build another rain garden on the school grounds next year to alleviate a similar flooding problem.

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DEP PRESENTS NEW STUDY PREDICTING DRAMATIC INCREASE IN SEA-LEVEL RISE ALONG JERSEY SHORE BY 2050; REPORT INTRODUCED AT FIRST MEETING OF INTERAGENCY COUNCIL ON CLIMATE CHANGE

(19/P98) TRENTON – The Department of Environmental Protection today released a new study projecting dramatic sea-level rise in New Jersey. According to the report, sea-level in New Jersey could rise from 2000 levels by up to 1.1 feet by 2030, 2.1 feet by 2050, and 6.3 feet by 2100, underscoring the urgency of the Murphy Administration’s adaptation work to make the state more resilient to the effects of climate change. The report also shows that New Jersey has already been disproportionately affected by climate change—sea-level rise projections in New Jersey are more than two times the global average.

The Rising Seas and Changing Coastal Storms study, commissioned by DEP and prepared by Rutgers University and leading climate change experts, was released today during the first meeting of the newly formed Interagency Council on Climate Resilience. The Council, comprised of representatives from 17 state agencies and chaired by the Governor’s office, was formed by Governor Murphy’s recent Executive Order 89, which commits the state to developing and implementing a Statewide Climate Resilience Strategy. The meeting was held at DEP headquarters in Trenton. The Council will serve to facilitate a whole-of-government response to the climate crisis.

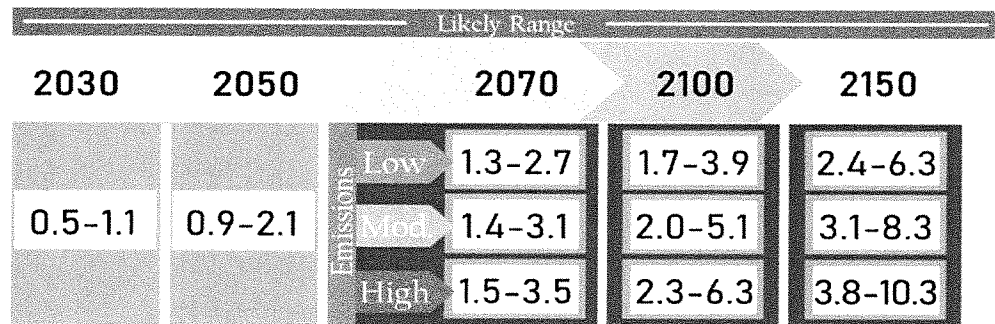
“New Jersey is extremely vulnerable to the impacts of climate change and we must work together to be more resilient against a rising sea and future storms,” said Governor Phil Murphy. “The data presented in this report will not only guide the Interagency Council’s decisions, but will also advise future generations of leaders on how to best mitigate the devastating effects of climate change.”

“New Jersey has much to lose if we do not act quickly and decisively to adapt to the realities of climate change,” DEP Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe said. “This study illustrates the sobering reality that our coastal landscape will change drastically, and we must act with urgency to ensure the long-term viability of our coastal and waterfront communities. These projections now serve as important baselines for developing policy directions, including changes to land use regulation, that New Jersey must adopt to address these challenges.”

“Sea-level rise drives some of the greatest hazards New Jersey faces from climate change. Building upon three years of on-the-ground experience since the release of Rutgers’ first Science and Technical Advisory Panel sea level assessment, which was conducted for the New Jersey Climate Change Alliance, this report presents the state of the scientific understanding of sea level

rise and changing coastal storms in a form designed to support state and local efforts to protect New Jersey's coastal communities,” said lead author Robert Kopp, a climate scientist and director of the Rutgers Institute of Earth, Ocean, and Atmospheric Sciences. “As the State University of New Jersey, Rutgers is proud to bring our expertise to bear to advance climate action in our state.”

Report Findings: Sea-Level Rise Scenarios*



***New Jersey Sea-Level Rise above year 2000 baseline in feet. Adapted from STAP**

Sea-level rise projections for New Jersey from 2000 to 2150 under the low, moderate, and high emissions scenarios. The likely range represents the range of projections between which there is a 66% chance that sea-level rise will occur. This figure is adopted from values presented in Table 1 of the STAP Report. (Kopp et al. 2019).

The report available at <https://www.nj.gov/dep/climatechange/> examines a variety of scenarios based on differing greenhouse-gas emission rates. The likely sea-level rise under a high greenhouse gas emissions scenario – consistent with current global greenhouse gas emissions trends – projects sea-level rise to range from 2.3 feet to as much as 6.3 feet by 2100.

A moderate scenario, if current policy objectives around the globe are successfully implemented, ranges from 2 feet to 5.1 feet. A low emissions scenario, if temperature targets in the 2015 Paris Climate Treaty were met, projects sea-level rise ranging from 1.7 feet to 3.9 feet.

While the frequency of tropical and extratropical cyclones (i.e. nor’easters) may not change drastically, the report notes that wind speeds and precipitation rates from these storms are likely to increase, although this issue needs more study. The study also suggests that storm tracks may change as global warming intensifies.

Over the last 40 years, sea-level rose an average of 0.2 inch per year along the state’s coast, compared to a global average of 0.1 inch per year. The study also notes that the frequency of routine tidal flooding not associated with specific storms has increased, from an average of less than one event in Atlantic City between 1950 and 1960 to an average of eight events per year between 2007 and 2016 – and a high of 18 events in 2009. By 2100, high-tide cycle flooding could become a regular occurrence, at 240 days per year.

As part of its evaluation, Rutgers determined that sea-level from 1911 (the beginning of tide-gauge record-keeping) at Atlantic City has risen 17.6 inches, compared to 7.6 inches globally. Moreover, sea-level has risen 8.2 inches over the past 40 years at Atlantic City, compared to an average 4.3 inches globally.

New Jersey's Leadership on Climate Change

The Murphy Administration has made addressing climate change a priority for the state. Governor Murphy joined the US Climate Alliance, a bipartisan coalition of states committed to the Paris Climate Treaty goals in the absence of federal leadership and precipitated by the Trump Administration's decision to remove the U.S. from the international Paris accord.

In October, on the 7th anniversary of Superstorm Sandy, Governor Murphy signed Executive Order 89, which directs the state, through the DEP, to develop a Statewide Climate Change Strategy to guide decisions and policies across state government.

The executive order also formed a Climate and Flood Resilience Program within the DEP and created the Interagency Council on Climate Resilience to promote the long-term mitigation, adaptation and resilience of New Jersey's economy, communities, infrastructure and natural resources.

Further demonstrating the Governor's commitment to addressing climate change, New Jersey has re-entered the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative, which works to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases from the energy sector. The state also is working on initiatives to reduce emissions from vehicles, which account for more than 40 percent of New Jersey's greenhouse gas emission. In addition, the Administration has launched various initiatives to make coastal and urban areas more resilient to flooding and sea-level rise and has been providing planning tools to assist local governments.



Global warming is caused by emissions of excessive greenhouse gases, primarily carbon dioxide, building up in the atmosphere and preventing the escape of heat from the sun. Sea-level rise results primarily from the thermal expansion of ocean water resulting from warmer temperatures and the melting of glaciers, ice caps and ice sheets. Scientists concur that global warming is related to human activities, such as power plant and industrial emissions and motor vehicle emissions.

New Jersey is particularly susceptible to the impacts of rising oceans due to its long coastline, the long-term natural sinking of land through subsidence, its latitudinal position in relation to the bulging of oceans caused by the earth's rotation, ocean circulation patterns and other factors.

About the Report

The New Jersey's Rising Seas and Changing Coastal Storm report stems from work begun in 2015 by Rutgers' New Jersey Science and Technical Advisory Panel on Sea-Level Rise and Coastal Storms. This panel issued a report in 2016 to offer insights on science that can be used to guide state and local planning and decision making. The DEP commissioned Rutgers to further evaluate the most current data and scientific understanding of sea-level rise in light of the importance of this issue to the state.

Key updates include the addition of historical sea-level rise information for New Jersey, consideration of the latest information related to ice-sheet melting and its impacts on sea-level rise, and an assessment of increased tidal flooding caused by sea-level rise. It also evaluates New Jersey's specific susceptibility to the effects of sea-level rise.

The study team was comprised of leading experts and coastal researchers from DEP, Rutgers University, the U.S. Geological Survey, Columbia University, the Barnegat Bay Partnership, Rowan University, Princeton University, the Stevens Institute of Technology, Drexel University, the U.S. Geological Survey, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Jacques Cousteau Coastal Education Center, the New Jersey Association of Flood Plain Management, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the New York City Mayor's Office of Resiliency, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

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DEP ANNOUNCES GARDEN STATE PRESERVATION TRUST SUPPORT OF NEARLY \$87 MILLION FOR GREEN ACRES PROJECTS ACROSS STATE; COMMISSIONER ANNOUNCES RECOMMENDATION AT ONE OF THE PROPOSED GRANTEE SITES

(19/P99) TRENTON – The Garden State Preservation Trust has approved and recommended to the New Jersey State Legislature nearly \$87 million in funding for projects to develop or update parks, playgrounds and fields, including \$1 million for Vista Park in the City of Paterson, to help enhance quality of life statewide, Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner

Catherine R. McCabe announced today. The Vista Park site in Paterson – one of many in the state that benefit from the grants -- would add 40,000 square feet of green space, among other amenities.



Governor Phil Murphy and Commissioner McCabe have recommended the projects for approval through the DEP's Green Acres Program.

“Each of the projects recommended for funding by the independent Garden State Preservation Trust helps build New Jersey’s outstanding parks, recreation and open space inventories,” Governor Murphy said. “These grants and loans will benefit urban and suburban communities across the state by giving people opportunities to engage in healthy activities, appreciate the outdoors and enjoy time with their families.”

“Green Acres funding is a powerful tool that helps New Jersey improve the quality of life for residents by improving parks, acquiring land and creating multiple opportunities for active and passive recreation,” Commissioner McCabe said.

“We are thankful to the DEP for awarding the City of Paterson the Green Acres grant,” said Mayor Andre Sayegh. “I have made parks a priority, and this grant will further help us in the continued effort to revitalize Vista Park, which will be the largest park space added in Paterson in decades.”

The Garden State Preservation Trust approved \$26.4 million for municipal and county land acquisition projects, \$46.3 million for local development of parks and recreation facilities, \$5 million for local stewardship projects, \$6.1 million for acquisition projects by nonprofit organizations, \$1.9 million for recreational development and \$800,000 for nonprofit stewardship projects. The Legislature must now approve legislation to formally appropriate the funds for the projects.



The Garden State Preservation Trust-approved projects will establish new parks and expand existing ones, develop athletic fields and playgrounds, improve access to waterways, create open space, and enhance stewardship by restoring lands for nature and public enjoyment.

Green Acres funding allows governments and nonprofits to leverage millions of additional preservation dollars through matching federal, state, county and local funds, as well as from private sources.

Among land acquisition projects across the state proposed for funding:

- **Bound Brook** in Somerset County will acquire a half-acre riverfront property on Talmage Avenue to create new recreation open space along the Raritan River and to improve connections to Rock Machine Park.
- **Downe Township** in Cumberland County proposes acquiring a 1.3-acre property at Main Street and Baptist Road in Newport to be a gateway for the community's bicycle trail network.
- **East Rutherford** in Bergen County will acquire a 3.82-acre parcel for a passive park, with long-term plans to connect multiple green spaces and parks.
- **Fairview** in Bergen County intends to acquire a half-acre of property at 102-108 Bergen Blvd. to create a community dog park.
- **Pitman** in Gloucester County proposes acquiring land next to Alcyon Lake Park to offer an additional 20 acres of land for passive recreation while increasing the natural buffer between development of land to the southwest owned by Rowan University.

- **Mountainside** in Union County proposes collaborating with a nonprofit partner to buy and preserve land at New Providence Road and Mountain Avenue for a pocket park that would connect to municipal facilities and nearby Echo Lake Park.

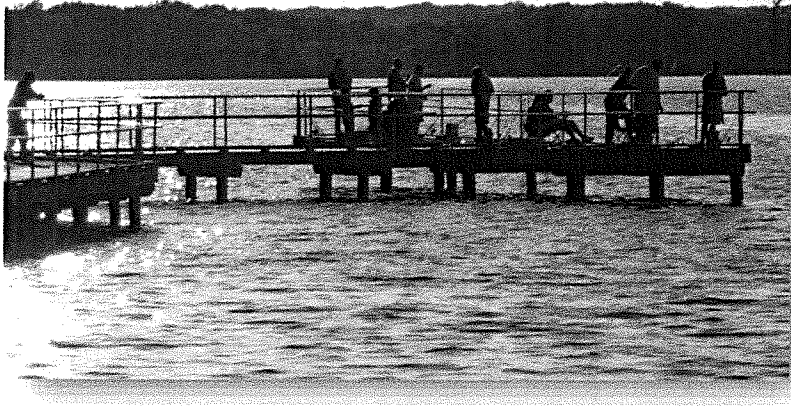
Major local projects approved for matching grants of \$1 million or more include:

- A multi-phase project in **Saddle River** to restore Wild Duck Pond by creating a wetland and upland habitat, removing invasive species and revegetating the site with native species.
- Improvements to Twin Boro Field Park in **Bergenfield** including synthetic turf baseball/softball fields and soccer/football fields, sports lighting, field amenities, fencing and stormwater management upgrades.
- Multiple additions and improvements to Mill Dam Park in **Mount Holly Township** such as basketball and tennis courts, parking improvements, spray park and a pavilion with a cooking area. A comfort station/concession stand, fitness trail, shade structures, lighting, picnic tables, landscaping and utility improvements are also planned.
- **Camden County** plans plazas, pavilions, decks, baseball fields, landscaping, fencing, gabion walls, lighting, signage, parking improvements, walkways and riparian buffers for Cooper River Park in **Cherry Hill Township, Pennsauken Township, Camden** and **Collingswood Borough**.
- Construction or rehabilitation of basketball courts and baseball fields, a multi-purpose synthetic turf field and a new concession/restroom building at Whitman Park in **Camden**. New playground equipment and a safety surface, as well as park furnishings and landscaping will be installed. Irrigation, lighting and fencing upgrades are also planned.
- Significant upgrades to existing baseball and softball fields at Brookdale County Park in **Montclair Township**.
- Removal of two ballfields and installation of a multisport facility with a synthetic track-and-field event area and a synthetic turf field for softball, football and soccer are proposed for Belleville Municipal Stadium in **Belleville Township**. Other upgrades include installing a track drainage system, new fencing, new and relocated lighting, and landscaping enhancements.



- Acquisition of a 12.7-acre land parcel along the Third River and Spring Brook in **Bloomfield Township**. The town will restore the floodplain and wetlands to create a flood storage area and wildlife habitat.

- Numerous improvements for Columbian Playground in **East Orange**, such as a rubberized walking track, multipurpose sports field, expanded pool deck, new entrance landscaping and fencing, new volleyball court and outdoor exercise equipment. The city also will repave the basketball court and rebuild the field house.



- Multiple improvements for Essex Park and Nishuane Park in **Montclair Township**. Improvements at Essex Park include pathway reconstruction, a new playground surface and equipment, lighting, drainage, restroom renovations and park amenities. Pathway reconstruction is also planned at Nishuane Park, as well as a refurbished basketball court, resurfaced tennis courts and parking lot, benches, tables and other amenities.
- Addition of two basketball courts, six tennis courts, two volleyball courts and an upgraded playground at Laurel Hill Park in **Secaucus**.
- Upgrades in **Hoboken** to transform Harborside Park into Cove Park by incorporating a bermed and terraced design, pathways, playground areas, active recreation space, dog park and waterfront viewing areas.
- The second phase of a three-phase project at South Park in **Weehawken**. Work will include an ice rink with an interchangeable surface allowing for basketball in the summer, a pavilion and support building, great lawn, basketball court and a tennis half-court.
- Completion of Hetzel Field Park in **Trenton** including development of two adjacent properties. The project included renovating a historic pool house, including a picnic pavilion and picnic area, repairing the pool and installing a new spray pool with fountains. The completed park includes three fenced basketball courts, reconfigured softball fields, a trail system, lighting, benches and bleachers.
- Middlesex County plans to redevelop a brownfield site in **Perth Amboy** to install a synthetic turf football/soccer field, synthetic turf baseball field, playground and public

access walkway along the shoreline of the Arthur Kill. The county also proposes a parking lot and restroom/storage building, as well as lighting, fencing, landscaping, utilities and stormwater management improvements.

- Conversion of an existing unimproved and undersized sports field at Bishop Andrews Park in **Carteret** to a multi-purpose synthetic turf field for football, soccer, baseball and softball. Existing basketball courts will be relocated and reconstructed. New lighting, landscaping, bleachers, fencing, picnic areas, ADA-accessible picnic tables, water fountains, shade trees and other plantings are also proposed.



- Replacement of the softball field with a synthetic turf soccer field at Jerry Morgan Park in **Long Branch**. The tennis and handball courts will be replaced with several basketball courts and the paved walking/bicycle trails will be repaved.
- Restoration of Bayside Park in **Brick Township** with playground equipment and safety surfacing, two shade structures, boardwalk decking, a paver patio area, fish bait cleaning station, walkways, lighting, utilities, irrigation, security improvements, landscaping, picnic tables, benches and bike racks.
- Drainage, accessibility, landscape and parking lot improvements for Veterans Memorial Park and Pulaski Park in **Passaic**. An outdoor fitness station, baseball field and a multipurpose field for soccer, lacrosse and football also will be added.
- Development of Vista Park near Great Falls National Historic Park in **Paterson** by adding 40,000 square feet of green space, pathways, a loop trail, amphitheater, picnic areas, meadows, playgrounds, observation decks, timber steps, an outdoor classroom, lighting, comfort amenities and parking.
- Phased improvements to Rushmore Playground in **Plainfield**. The first phase will include replacing existing soccer and football fields with a synthetic turf field and improving the gravel parking lot. Plans call for improvements to the basketball courts, playgrounds, swimming pools and perimeter fencing.
- Continued rehabilitation of field facilities at Madden Field Park in **Rahway**, including a synthetic multi-sport surface for a regulation-size football/soccer field, small practice

football fields, baseball fields with dugouts, bullpen and baseball batting cages, fencing, new and relocated facility lighting, bleachers on concrete pads, site drainage and landscaping.

- A new fieldhouse and storage buildings for Arminio Field Park in **Roselle**. The existing football field was reoriented, along with a synthetic turf field, a synthetic outdoor regulation track, new pole vault and shotput facilities, new lighting and security cameras, a public announcement system, seating, restrooms, tables, bleachers, landscaping and drainage improvements.

New Jersey has long been a leader in preserving open space. The Green Acres Program, the oldest of its kind in the nation, was created in 1961 as the result of an innovative bond referendum. The Green Acres Program has protected more than 700,000 acres of open space and provided hundreds of recreational facilities around the state.

The DEP is a partner in the Governor's Population Health Challenge, which calls on state agencies to promote health through their policies. Studies have found that investments in parks and recreational amenities positively impact health and fitness, resulting in less strain on the health-care system. Studies also demonstrate that people are likely to be more physically active if they live close to parks and recreational facilities.

Green Acres projects create jobs and stimulate economic development by making communities more attractive places to live and work, consequently boosting civic pride. They also improve air and water quality.

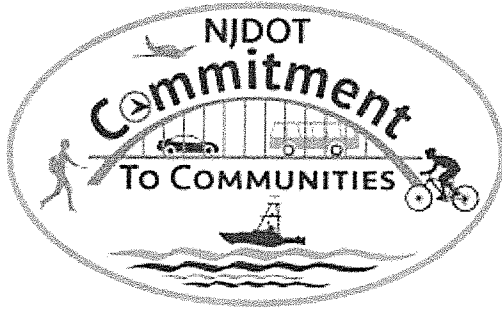

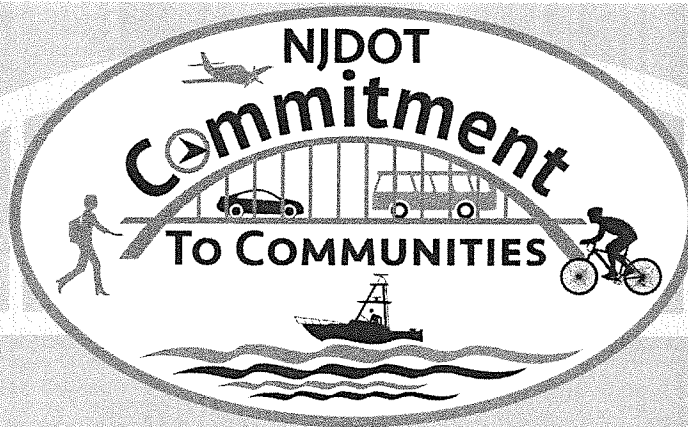

\$160+ Million in FY 2020 Municipal Grant Recipients Announced at NJ League of Municipalities

I enjoyed seeing some of you at the 104th Annual New Jersey League of Municipalities (League) at the Atlantic City Convention Center. The League brings together elected officials, legislators, contractors, constituents and government agencies for a three day networking and educational event each year.

I hope those who attended enjoyed their time and had an opportunity to visit the New Jersey Department of Transportation's (NJDOT) two booths.

Representatives from both our Office of Government and Community Relations and our Local Aid Resource Center were there answering questions and addressing comments and concerns.

Governor Phil Murphy made an exciting announcement at the League – **96 percent of New Jersey Municipalities** are receiving Municipal Aid grant awards from NJDOT, totaling **\$161.25 million** for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020—benefiting **542 municipalities** throughout the state! These are the first awards being made under NJDOT's new Municipal Aid grant cycle, which now better aligns with the state's construction season and municipal budget cycles. Accelerating the FY 2020 Municipal Aid grant cycle will help municipalities and counties better plan and execute important infrastructure projects—fulfilling another **commitment to our communities**.

Next year marks the beginning of the Decennial Census, a constitutionally-mandated enumeration of the population of the United States. Enumeration activities will begin in March 2020 and are scheduled to be completed by the end of April 2020. A New Jersey Complete Count Commission has been established to develop, recommend, administer a census outreach strategy to encourage full participation in the 2020 Census. The Commission needs your help to ensure that everyone in your community is counted in 2020.

The decennial census count informs how the federal government distributes about \$600 billion in funds annually for infrastructure, programs, and services. Census data determine how federal and state funding is allocated to communities, and decisions are made on matters of national and local importance based, in part, on census data and housing.

Census data also help determine how many seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives and is necessary for an accurate and fair redistricting of state legislative seats, county and municipal councils, and voting districts.

The 2020 count will be the first one to allow all households to respond online. Paper forms will still be available, and, for the first time, 1-800 numbers will be available to give responses over the phone.

To make sure that New Jersey is completely and accurately counted in 2020, all municipalities are strongly encouraged to:

- 1) Issue a governing body resolution or proclamation in support of Census 2020 complete count efforts. A sample resolution is available in the attachment
- 2) Engage with neighborhood and community development organizations to spread the word about the Census, especially in hard-to-count areas
- 3) Actively encourage residents to complete and mail back their census questionnaires
- 4) Post information about Census 2020 on their municipal websites and on social media (if applicable). Information and materials can be found at the following sites:

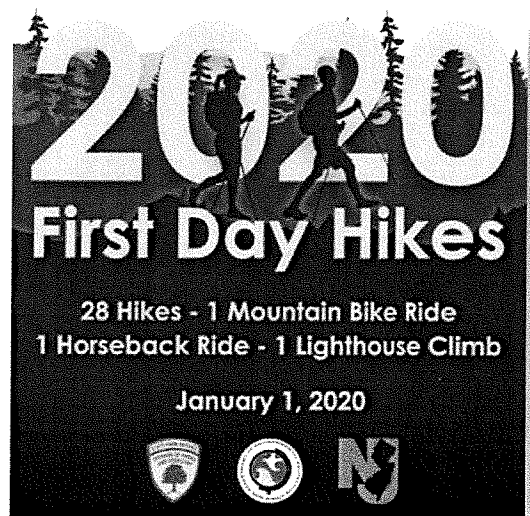

Good afternoon Mayors and Municipal Officials,

Thank you for taking time from your schedules to read this week's update from DEP. As many of us will be out of the office next week, this will be the last edition of the NJDEP Weekly Update for 2019.

Local governments will share \$14.3 million in grants to further enhance recycling efforts, based on 2016 recycling performance in their communities. The recycling tonnage grants are awarded through the state's Recycling Enhancement Act and are funded through a \$3 per-ton surcharge on trash disposed at solid waste facilities statewide. The DEP then allocates that money back to municipalities based on how much recycling each community reports accomplishing during a particular calendar year. Please see the attached for information on the **2017** Municipal Recycling Tonnage grants. To see what your municipality has been awarded, please visit <https://www.nj.gov/dep/dshw/recycling/stats.htm>.

This week, Commissioner McCabe announced that the DEP is making \$13.5 million in funding available for local projects that will improve water quality and help prevent, mitigate and manage harmful algal blooms (HABs) in New Jersey's lakes and ponds, building upon the state's HAB response strategy announced by Governor Murphy on Nov. 18. See the attached article for more information.

To ring in 2020, the Division of Parks and Forestry will host a variety of activities as part of the annual America's State Parks First Day hikes program. For more information on the January 1st events, including hikes, mountain biking, a horseback ride and a lighthouse climb, please see the attached. All events are free, though some require registration. Please feel free to share with your residents. For more details, visit www.njparksandforests.org/parks/first_day_hikes.html.

This week, Commissioner McCabe and Attorney General Grewal announced the filing of two new Natural Resource Damage (NRD) lawsuits, one against the Sherwin Williams Company and another against Handy and Harman Electronic Materials Corp. "Enforcing our state's laws against past abuses helps put us on track toward a cleaner, healthier future for all New Jerseyans", said Commissioner McCabe. As the year draws to a close, I reflect warmly on the opportunities I have had to meet and work with you all this year. I wish you the happiest of holidays with your constituents and families, as well as health and happiness in the new year. 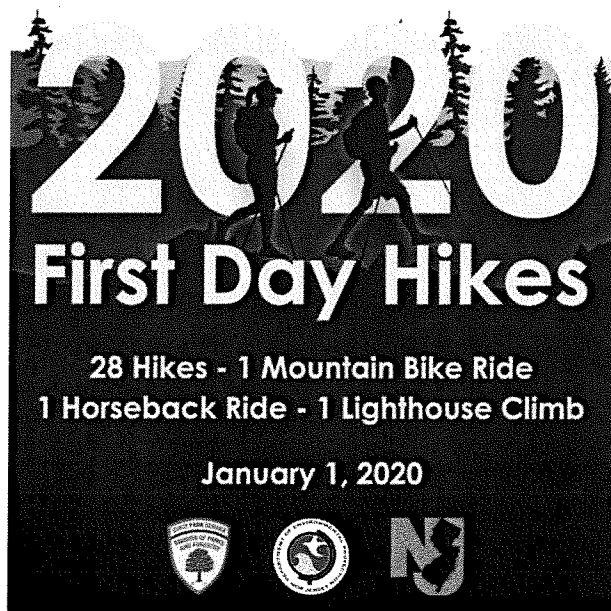

RING IN THE NEW YEAR WITH FIRST DAY HIKES IN NEW JERSEY'S STATE PARKS, FORESTS AND HISTORIC SITES ON JANUARY 1

(19/P100) TRENTON – The Division of Parks and Forestry will kick off 2020 with a variety of recreational opportunities on New Year's Day as a part of the annual America's State Parks' First Day Hikes program, the Department of Environmental Protection announced.



"New Jersey has much to offer at our parks, forests and historic sites," DEP Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe said. "Hiking is a great way to appreciate our natural resources, whether it is the trees that clean our air, the rare plant species that dot the landscape, or the beauty of birds and other wildlife that call our state home."

"There is no better way to step into the new year than in one of our state parks or forests on a first day hike," said Director of Parks and Forestry Olivia Glenn. "Whether you climb a lighthouse, go for a horseback ride, or hike six strenuous miles on the Appalachian Trail, there is a first day hike for every skillset and interest."

In total, the State Park Service is offering 28 hikes, a mountain bike ride, lighthouse climb and horseback ride.

In 2019, 1,795 hikers traveled 5,030 miles on First Day Hikes throughout New Jersey's vast system of trails in state parks, forests and historic sites.

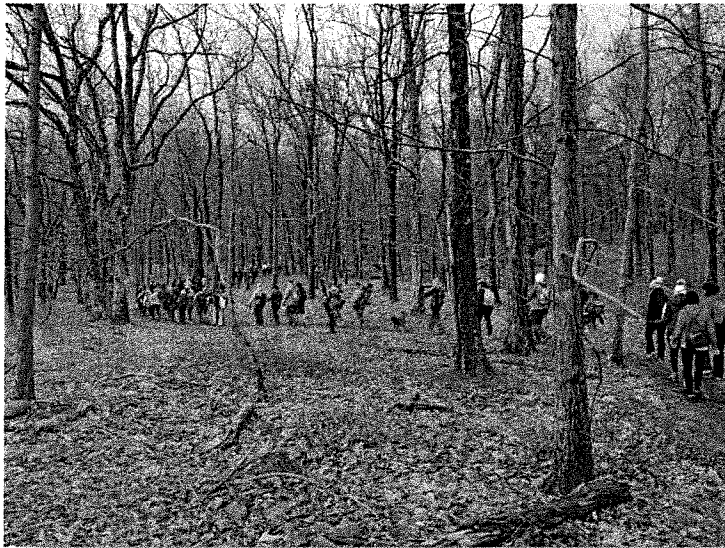
Hikes are scheduled at Liberty State Park in Jersey City, Hudson County; Ringwood State Park in Ringwood, Passaic County; High Point State Park in Sussex, Kittatinny Valley State Park in Newton, Stokes State Forest in Branchville, all in Sussex County; and Kittatinny Valley State Park in Blirstown, Warren County.

CENTRAL/COASTAL

Hikes are planned at Round Valley Recreation Area in Clinton Township and Spruce Run Recreation Area in Lebanon Township, both in Hunterdon County; Washington Crossing State Park in Washington's Crossing/Hopewell in Mercer County; Cheesequake State Park in Old Bridge, Middlesex County; Monmouth Battlefield State Park in Manalapan and Twin Lights Historic site in Highlands, both in Monmouth County; and Island Beach State Park in Berkeley, Bass River State Forest in Stafford and the Forest Resource Education Center in Jackson, all in Ocean County.

SOUTH

Hikes are set at Wharton State Forest in Mullica, Atlantic County; Rancocas State Park in Westampton and Wharton State Forest in Shamong and Washington townships, all in Burlington County; Belleplain State Forest in Woodbine Township, Cape May County; and Parvin State Park in Pittsgrove, Salem County.



All events are free. Some require preregistration, others do not. Some events also are weather-dependent. Attorney General, DEP Commissioner Announce the Filing of Two New NRD Lawsuits, Marking 12 NRD Lawsuits Filed Since January 2018

The State Filed Eight NRD Lawsuits in 2019, Twice the Number Filed in 2018

TRENTON – Continuing to hold New Jersey’s polluters accountable, Attorney General Gurbir S. Grewal and Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe today announced the filing of two new Natural Resource Damage (NRD) lawsuits, one against The Sherwin Williams Company and the other against Handy & Harman Electronic Materials Corp.

The complaint against Sherwin Williams arises out of the company’s operations at sites in Gibbsboro, Voorhees Township and Lindenwold in Camden County. The State alleges that Sherwin Williams manufactured oil-based paints, lacquers and varnishes, and in the process discharged industrial wastes into the ground, into nearby Hilliards Creek and into other surrounding creeks and lakes.

The complaint against Handy & Harman arises out of its operations of an etching and surfacing facility in Montvale, Bergen County in the 1980s. During Handy & Harman’s ownership, the complaint alleges, hazardous substances – including the chemical TCE (trichloroethylene) – were discharged on the property, resulting in the contamination of groundwater and the closure of nearby drinking water wells.

Today’s NRD lawsuits mark another step in Attorney General Grewal and Commissioner McCabe’s efforts to revitalize New Jersey’s environmental enforcement program. After eight years in which the State did not file any new NRD actions, the State has now filed 12 NRD actions in two years. In 2019 alone, the State filed eight such actions, including the two filed today.

“As Attorney General, I have been committed to holding polluters accountable for the legacy of contamination they left in our state,” said Attorney General Grewal. “Too many companies have treated the public’s natural resources like private dumping grounds, despite the health risks to our residents and the harms to our environment. That is why we’ve spent the past two years making polluters pay for the damage they caused, efforts that continue with today’s lawsuits. I am proud of the twelve natural resource damage actions that we filed in just two years, and I know that we are only getting started.”

"Today's two lawsuits continue DEP's unwavering commitment to go beyond the cleanup of contaminated sites to requiring the restoration or compensation for the damage to our precious natural resources," said DEP Commissioner McCabe. "Enforcing our state's laws against past abuses helps put us on track toward a cleaner, healthier future for all New Jerseyans."

Sherwin Williams

The Sherwin Williams Company for decades operated a paint manufacturing plant and conducted related operations at multiple sites across Gibbsboro, Voorhees Township and Lindenwold. From the mid-1800s until the 1970s, Sherwin Williams and its predecessors manufactured a variety of paint products, including dry colorants, lacquers, varnishes, resins and both oil-based and water-based paints. As part of its operations, the company used and stored thousands of gallons of hazardous materials such as lead oxide, zinc oxide, lead chromate, and sulfuric acid.

According to today's lawsuit, Sherwin Williams for many years discharged a "substantial amount of hazardous substances and industrial chemicals" into the ground and surface water. According to the complaint, the contaminants discharged include lead, arsenic and other heavy metals, as well as a variety of potentially harmful chemical compounds and waste paints. At one point in the plant's history, the complaint notes, locals in and around Gibbsboro, Voorhees and Lindenwold rechristened Hilliards Creek as "Rainbow Creek," because the water would take on different colors "depending on the color of the paint that Sherwin Williams was manufacturing and/or disposing of on a given day."

The complaint alleges that Sherwin Williams spent decades knowingly contaminating the environment, and consistently "ignored orders" from DEP to address the pollution it had created. The complaint also asserts that the company "repeatedly issued misleading or inaccurate statements ... to downplay its responsibility for the contamination."

Given the company's noncompliance with DEP orders, the complaint continues, DEP was forced to refer the sites over to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, which placed two of the sites on the National Priorities List as Superfund sites decades ago. The EPA, working with DEP, is overseeing that remediation. DEP is now seeking damages for that prior pollution. The State's seven-count complaint alleges violations of New Jersey's Spill Act, Water Pollution Control Act, and Solid Waste Management Act, as well as common law claims involving public nuisance, trespass and negligence. As part of this filing, the State is seeking punitive damages.

Handy & Harman

From 1970 until 1986, Handy & Harman Electronic Materials Corp. and its predecessor conducted metal etching and surfacing operations at a three-acre property located at 20 Craig Road in Montvale, Bergen County. Operations included the cleaning of electrical components through a degreasing process that relied on the solvent TCE.

According to the complaint, TCE was stored in a pair of 500-gallon, above-ground storage tanks located behind the facility, with waste TCE stored in drums located throughout the property.

According to the lawsuit, “numerous” discharges of TCE occurred both inside and outside the plant during its operating years. As a result of the contamination, several drinking water wells operated by the Borough of Park Ridge were impacted, which led to these drinking wells’ closure decades ago.

In December 1986, Handy & Harman entered into an Administrative Consent Order with DEP requiring that the company investigate and remediate environmental contamination at the site. Since then, investigation and remediation activities have taken place both on the property and at impacted drinking water wells surrounding the property.

Through today’s action, DEP seeks to recover damages for the prior injuries to natural resources, as well as for the cleanup and removal costs that have been incurred by the State in the past and that are likely to be incurred going forward.

The six-count complaint alleges violations of the Spill Act, Water Pollution Control Act, and Solid Waste Management Act, and common law claims involving public nuisance, trespass and negligence. (The complaint names other defendants as well, including Steel Partners Holdings, which acquired all outstanding shares of Handy & Harman.)

Environmental Enforcement Program

Under the leadership of Attorney General Grewal and Commissioner McCabe, the State has significantly strengthened its environmental enforcement program. In particular:

- The State filed 12 NRD lawsuits in the past two years, including its first such actions in a decade, and including eight in 2019 alone. The cases involved:
 - Exxon-Mobil, for pollution at its Lail facility in Gloucester County
 - The manufacturers and distributors of a toxic family of chemicals known as “PFAS” (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances); and
 - E.I. DuPont de Nemours, including for pollution in Pompton Lakes and at its Chambers Works site.
- Filed fourteen environmental justice lawsuits, encompassing a range of urban and rural communities across New Jersey, in December 2018 and November 2019.
- Filed other enforcement actions against polluters, including those responsible for:
 - A solid waste dump in Vernon Township, Sussex County (Feb. 2019);
 - A solid waste dump in Plumsted Township, Ocean County (Aug. 2019); and
 - Odor pollution in the Ironbound section of Newark (Sept. 2019).
- Filed lawsuits against the federal government to:
 - Successfully prevent offshore drilling off the New Jersey coast;
 - Prevent the Trump Administration from rolling back critical federal rules that address climate change, clean air, and clean water; and
 - Ensure that the federal government takes steps required by law to reduce the ozone pollution entering New Jersey.

DEP MOVES FORWARD ON PROGRAMS PROVIDING \$13.5 MILLION FOR LOCAL PROJECTS TO ADDRESS HARMFUL ALGAL BLOOMS

(19/P101) TRENTON – The Department of Environmental Protection is making \$13.5 million in funding available for local projects that will improve water quality and help prevent, mitigate and manage harmful algal blooms (HABs) in New Jersey’s lakes and ponds, Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe announced today, building upon the state’s HAB response strategy announced by Governor Murphy on Nov. 18.

The DEP has formally issued requests for proposals for \$3.5 million in grants for planning and projects that will help local management, response and mitigation of harmful algal blooms through proven and innovative projects. This program is open to a wide variety of potential applicants, including local government agencies, academic institutions and nonprofits.



In addition, the DEP has issued a draft Intended Use Plan for public comment that earmarks \$10 million in Clean Water State Revolving Fund money as principal-forgiveness (grant-like) funding for projects that address HABs by improving water quality. The DEP is encouraging interested potential applicants, primarily local and county government agencies, to apply for funding available through this program as soon as possible.

“Harmful algal blooms are creating real hardships for the people of New Jersey, affecting livelihoods, local economies and tourism,” Commissioner McCabe said. “The Murphy Administration is committed to moving forward quickly to make financial resources available for local projects that will reduce the occurrence of harmful algal blooms, improving our quality of life and better protecting public health and the environment.”

“I’m very grateful for the State of New Jersey’s partnership and investment to help prevent another summer of algae that wreaked havoc on our lakes, our businesses, our families, and the broader community,” said 5th District U.S. Representative Josh Gottheimer. “This effort will help tackle everything from preventing runoff and improving sewer systems to prevention and treatment projects. This is good for our environment, good for our economy, good for our eco-tourism, and good for the health and safety of our families. It’s a win-win-win.”

Last month, Governor Murphy announced the funding as part of a comprehensive effort to address an increasing number of harmful algal blooms that occurred across the state this year. This effort also includes an enhanced program of science-based prevention, mitigation, study and response.

In all, more than 70 suspected blooms were reported, with 39 confirmed. These blooms resulted in health and water-contact advisories, closures of bathing beaches and, in some cases, had direct impacts on tourism-related businesses.

Specifically, the DEP has issued a request for proposals for harmful algal bloom management matching grants totaling \$2.5 million to fund the implementation of innovative or proven projects to manage HABs through prevention and mitigation. Through this 2:1 matching grant, the DEP will enhance its local partners’ investments in HAB prevention and mitigation projects by providing \$2 in funding for every \$1 invested by a grant applicant.

The DEP has also set aside \$1 million from a \$3.5 million nonpoint source pollution grant program for watershed or lakeshed planning to address harmful algal blooms by reducing nutrients in stormwater. No local match would be required for an applicant to be eligible for these planning funds.

These grant programs are open to government agencies and organizations, including local, regional, or state government agencies or units; county planning departments or boards; health departments; designated water quality management planning agencies; state universities and colleges; interstate agencies of which New Jersey is a member; and local nonprofit organizations, including watershed and water resource associations.

Wednesday, Jan. 15, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. in the DEP Public Hearing Room, 401 E. State St., Trenton, 08625.

In addition, the \$10 million that the DEP has proposed to make available as principal-forgiveness funding through the Clean Water State Revolving Fund provides potential applicants with a cost-effective way to implement projects, such as wastewater and stormwater improvements, that will reduce pollutants that help fuel harmful algal blooms.

The principal-forgiveness funding (capped at \$2 million per project) could cover as much as half the cost of these projects. The DEP and the New Jersey Water Bank will provide the balance through a blend of zero-interest and market-rate funding that results in low-interest loans for applicants. “We strongly encourage interested parties to reach out to us as soon as possible to take advantage of this unique funding opportunity,” said Michele Putnam, Assistant Commissioner for Water Resources Management. “At this stage, all applicants need is an idea. We will assign a project manager for each project to help guide applicants through design, permitting and program requirements.”

Harmful algal blooms, also known as HABs, are not true algal blooms. Rather, they are caused by naturally occurring cyanobacteria that can reproduce to unhealthful levels under certain conditions, including sunlight, nutrients from sources such as fertilizers and improperly operating septic systems, warm weather and stagnant water. They frequently form dense mats, resembling pea soup or spilled paint.

Exposure to blooms can result in a range of health effects, including rashes, allergy-like reactions, flu-like symptoms, gastroenteritis, respiratory irritation and eye irritation. Exposure to a bloom that is actively producing cyanotoxins may result in more serious health effects, including liver toxicity and neurological effects. People, pets and wildlife are susceptible to adverse health effects if they come into contact with or ingest water that is experiencing a bloom. DEP AWARDS MORE THAN \$14 MILLION IN GRANTS TO LOCAL AND COUNTY GOVERNMENTS TO ENHANCE RECYCLING EFFORTS

(18/P102) TRENTON – The Department of Environmental Protection is awarding more than \$14 million in grants to municipal and county governments to enhance recycling efforts, Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe announced today.

The annual recycling tonnage grants are awarded through the state's Recycling Enhancement Act, which authorizes a \$3 per-ton surcharge on trash disposed at solid waste facilities to fund recycling efforts. The DEP allocates this money back to municipalities and counties based on their recycling accomplishments. This year's grants are based on recycling performance in 2017.



"Recycling remains an important way for residents to help protect the environment," Commissioner McCabe said. "Recycling conserves resources, reduces the amount of trash that is sent to solid waste facilities, and helps reduce emissions of greenhouse gases. These grants will fund efforts that have become even more important as we look for ways to address changes and challenges in recycling markets that are occurring across the nation."

Each year, recipients use these grants to improve recycling rates through a variety of initiatives, including funding recycling coordinator positions, providing recycling receptacles and pickup in public places, upgrading recycling drop-off centers, conducting education and outreach, and implementing curbside recycling pickup programs.

In 2017, New Jersey generated 9.6 million tons of municipal solid waste, with 3.85 million tons recycled, for a 40-percent municipal solid waste recycling rate, compared to 44 percent in 2016. Overall, New Jersey in 2017 generated 23.4 million tons of solid waste, which includes municipal waste plus construction debris and other types of non-municipal waste. Of this, 14.1 million tons were recycled, for an overall recycling rate of 60 percent, compared to 61 percent in 2016.

The DEP attributes the 4-percent decline in the 2017 municipal solid waste recycling rate to manufacturers of consumer products, such as drink bottles, continuing to shift to lighter materials such as plastic over glass. Manufacturers are also using thinner and lighter weight plastics. In addition, the volume of newspaper recycled continues to shrink as consumers increasingly rely on smartphones, tablets, and other electronic devices for information.

The 2017 recycling rate does not fully reflect challenges recycling programs in New Jersey and across the nation have been facing since mid-2017 as China and other nations started rejecting recycling shipments that contain non-recyclable materials, an issue known as recycling contamination. Beginning in early 2018, China began banning the importation of most recyclable materials and other nations have followed.

Some examples of recycling contaminants are plastic bags, syringes, auto parts, non-recyclable types of plastic, Styrofoam cups, improperly rinsed and cleaned food containers, food packaging that can't be cleaned such as soiled pizza boxes, and trash.

To help municipal and county governments address these contamination challenges, the DEP has launched programs to help local governments educate the public on which materials can be recycled and those that cannot. These efforts include [Recycle Right NJ](#), which provides social media and education materials to recycling programs, and the free [RecycleCoach](#) app, which provides convenient access to municipal recycling program information, spelling out what can be recycled on the local level.

The DEP is also making available up to [\\$1 million in grants](#) for New Jersey's higher-education institutions to conduct research and demonstration projects to strengthen recycling in the state. Specifically, the new grants will provide funds for projects in each of four categories to:

- Research recycling markets and identify the role government can plan in encouraging recycling while identifying impediments to recycling markets and programs;
- Study the composition of the state's waste stream – including the amount of the waste stream that is comprised of food waste – to better inform recycling and source-reduction efforts in the state;
- Research, design and implement a solid waste and/or food waste recycling-exchange-reduction-reuse project or demonstration at an institution, and;
- Create a public outreach campaign to educate and motivate residents to reduce the amount of food they waste.

“New Jersey is proud to be the first state to require recycling,” said DEP Assistant Commissioner for Site Remediation and Waste Management Mark Pedersen. “We expect that these grants will further ongoing recycling efforts in our communities and educate the public about the importance of proper recycling.”

Also, Paramus, Bergen County, \$144,982; Secaucus, Hudson County, \$144,738; Logan, Gloucester County, \$143,023; Lakewood, Ocean County, \$140,559; Raritan, Hunterdon County, \$137,008; Fair Lawn, Bergen County, \$135,480; Clifton, Passaic County, \$127,762; Middletown, Monmouth County, \$122,861; Florence, Burlington County, \$119,553; North Bergen, Hudson County, \$116,714; Monroe, Middlesex County, \$114,965; Cherry Hill, Camden County, \$114,682; Brick, Ocean County, \$112,023; and East Orange, Essex County, \$106,334.

Thank you so much to everyone who donated and to the organizations that serve their communities every day.

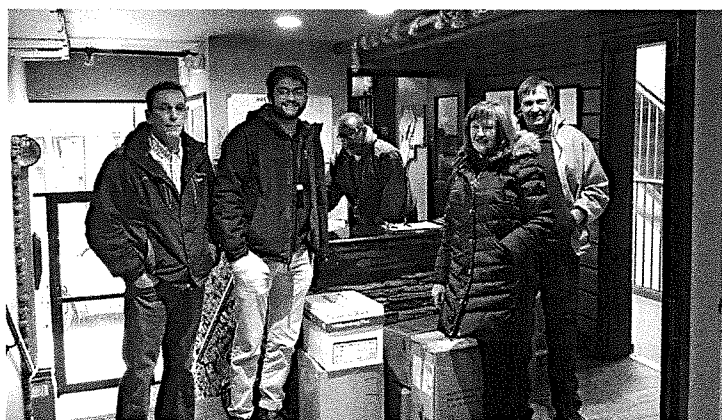

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE, IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING CHAPTER 318, SEWER AND WATER, OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE TO PERMIT INSTALLATION OF IRRIGATION SYSTEMS IN DEVELOPMENTS IN THE MORRIS CHASE WATER SYSTEM SERVICE AREA

WHEREAS, due to a limited water supply and potential for additional development, the Township of Mount Olive ("Township") had previously prohibited the installation of irrigation systems within the Morris Chase Water System service area, in accordance with Section 318-32 of the Township Code; and

WHEREAS, the Township is now in a position to permit installation of irrigation systems within the Morris Chase Water System service area, with certain restrictions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 318, Sewers and Water, Part 1, General Provisions, Article V, Conservation of Water, is hereby amended to add new § 318-35, Irrigation Systems, to read as follows:

"§ 318-35 Irrigation Systems.

Irrigation systems may be installed in any development serviced by the Morris Chase Water System, including, but not limited to, Morris Chase, Morris Hunt, Goldmine, and Lynwood developments. However, irrigation systems may operate only on an every-other-day basis, with odd-numbered houses watering on odd-numbered days and even-numbered houses operating on even-numbered days."

SECTION 2. This Ordinance may be renumbered for the purposes of Codification.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of the Ordinance.

SECTION 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the Township of Mount Olive that are inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days following final passage, approval, and publication as required by law.
