1. Commending and congratulating Lieutenant Craig Austenberg on his retirement from the Mount Olive Township Police Department

Congratulating Lt. Craig Austenberg on his retirement and 30 year service career with the Mount Olive Police Department.

2. Supporting the celebration of the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage.

The New Jersey League of Municipality recommends approving the resolution in honor of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment, guaranteeing and protecting women's right to vote. The Township is encouraged to light the municipal building in purple for the week of February 10.

3. Authorizing the execution of a grant agreement with the Morris County Open Space and Farmland Trust regarding Turkey Brook Extension

The Township was awarded \$275,000 to pay for the cost of acquiring the property known as the Charles Court Sub Division for the purposes of extending Turkey Brook Park. The Township will match the grant with \$25,000 from the Municipal Open Space Trust Fund.

4. Authorizing the execution of a grant agreement with the New Jersey Historic Trust for the historic preservation of the Seward House

The Township was awarded \$504,675 to further preserve the Seward House. The Township will match the grant with prior grant awards from the Morris County Historic Preservation Trust.

5. Authorizing the assignment of an agreement of sale to Gold Mine Road Solar, LLC The original assignee of the Comb Fill tax certificate has entered into a Memorandum of Assignment, under which it assigned the Agreement of Sale, including all of its terms to Gold Mine Road Solar, LLC.

6. Appointing Andrew Tatarenko and Claudia Tomasello as Designated Employer Representatives for controlled substance and alcohol use and testing policies for commercial driver's licenses as per 49 CFR Part 382

The United States Department of Transportation and the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration requires that every entity who employs employees with CDLs appoint a Designated Employer Representative who will make formal decisions regarding the approved drug and alcohol testing policy. Andrew Tatarenko and Claudia Tomasello have received the proper training.

7. Authorizing a lease agreement with the County of Morris for the rental space known as The Nutrition Site at the Mount Olive Senior Center for the year 2020.

Annual lease agreement for the County of Morris to operate a Nutrition Site out of the Senior Center on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 8:30 am – 2:30 pm.

8. Authorizing the execution of a general release with Robert Hill

There was a water leak caused at the water shut off valve which the Township did not initially think was our responsibility. The owner moved forward with repairs and it was discovered that the shut off valve was indeed Township property and should have been repaired by the Public Works Department. The agreement reimburses the homeowner \$1,143.21 and his water bill has been adjusted.





Court puts new medical cannabis licenses on hold after N.J. denied some on technical issue



The state Department of Health must halt its review of nearly 150 applicants to operate new medical marijuana businesses after denying some licenses due to a technical application issue.

A two-judge panel granted the a motion for a stay in the review process Monday, after attorney Joshua Bauchner filed on behalf of five groups last week. He has said a glitch that rendered the Health Department unable to open all the file attachments with their applications may have affected as many as two dozen rejected applicants.

## N.J. farmers can grow hemp in 2020



The start of the new year will bring a new cash crop to New Jersey after the U.S. Department of Agriculture approved the state's plan to grow hemp.

As of Friday, the USDA has given three states and three Native American tribes the green light to grow the plant, a mild cousin of marijuana. In addition to New Jersey, Louisiana and Ohio's proposals received approval.

Grown legally, hemp has only small amounts of the compound THC, the active ingredient in marijuana that causes a high. The plant can be used to make plastics, clothing, food and legal CBD products. Industry analysts predict hemp production could top \$22 billion in coming years.

## N.J. company must pay for employee's medical cannabis



In a ruling that could have far-reaching effects, an appeals court in New Jersey ruled this week that a contractor must reimburse a former employee for the cost of the medical marijuana that he uses to treat his incessant pain from a work-related injury.

"This is huge. And the significance of this court decision cannot be overstated," said Steve Schain, a lawyer with the Hoban Law Group, which specializes in

cannabis law. "It sets a precedent for other state's workers' comp programs and national private health insurers."

Vincent Hager was a 28-year-old laborer in 2001 when a truck delivering concrete dumped its load onto him, according to court documents. The resulting nerve damage, and the spinal surgery Hager underwent to relieve the pain, left him unable to work. His employer, M&K Construction, denied his workers' compensation claim for 15 years, according to court documents.

# Phillipsburg medical cannabis dispensary targets spring opening as DOH approves grow operation



A medical marijuana facility in Phillipsburg is closer to reality.

The New Jersey Department of Health on Thursday announced it has approved a Morris County marijuana-growing operation for TerrAscend, which will provide marijuana for the company's eventual treatment center in Warren County.

TerrAscend owns The Apothecarium, a posh dispensary chain with storefronts in San Francisco and Las Vegas, and anticipates the Phillipsburg location will open in 2020's second quarter. It will be the first Apothecarium on the East Coast.

## \$20 Million Spent On Recreational cannabis In Illinois In 12 Days




Pot purchasers spent nearly \$20 million on recreational weed in the first 12 days of sales in Illinois, state regulators said. Despite widespread supply shortages, long lines and a limited number of locations, almost a half-million cannabis transactions were completed at adult-use dispensaries from Jan. 1 to Jan. 12, the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation announced Monday.

"Illinois had a far more successful launch of cannabis than many of the other states that have legalized, but this is about more than money, it's about starting a new industry in a way that includes communities left behind for far too long," said Toi Hutchinson, the governor's senior adviser for cannabis control.

# Analysis of the cannabinoid content of strains available in the New Jersey Medicinal Marijuana Program



Our very own **Tom Coogan** recently featured in the **Journal of Cannabis Research** for his analysis of the cannabinoid content of strains available in the New Jersey Medicinal Marijuana Program.

The six licensed operators in the New Jersey Medicinal Marijuana Program submit their strains of cannabis flower to a single laboratory, administered by

the state's Department of Health, for testing. The results of these tests are made available by the State on a web page for patients, allowing a study of the range of cannabinoid profiles available in the program.

Reports on cannabinoid concentrations were collected from 245 test reports released by the State lab; the relative quantities of cannabinoids on all strains was evaluated, as well as trends in the strain types being tested.

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States of America is the supreme law of our nation, and

**WHEREAS**, the Second Amendment to the Constitution states, "A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in the District of Columbia v. Heller, 554 U.S. 570 (2008) affirmed that the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms is not connected in any way to the service of the militia; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme court in United States v. Miller, 307 U.S. 174 (1939) stated firearms that are part of ordinary military use (Weapons of common use) that can contribute to the common defense and are protected by the Second Amendment; and

**WHEREAS**, there are an estimated 12 million Americans who lawfully carry concealed firearms; and

WHEREAS, abridging the rights of lawful gun owners does not reduce the criminal use of firearms by violent offenders; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Second Amendment Society and Mark Cheeseman v. Christopher S Porrino U.S District court 3rd, stated "The Second Amendment extends, prima facie to all instruments that constitute bearable arms, even those not in existence at the time of the founding"

WHEREAS, New Jersey Attorney General Burton Sills, who "close[ly] participated[ed] in the drafting and presentation of the [1966] Gun Control Law," and whose views the New Jersey has relied upon to decide close interpretive questions concerning that legislation. See Service Armament Co. v. Hyland, 362 A.2d 13, 18, 70 N.J. 550, 560 (1976). In the lead-up to the 1966 Gun Control Law, Attorney General Sills had publicly explained that there was presently "no law against walking down the street with a weapon in your hand or on your body so long as it isn't concealed," and that individuals without concealed-carry permits were free to carry guns "in plain view".

WHEREAS, In the A-165 Debates of 1966, Attorney General Sills explained that under the new law, "standards are set forth to determine if the issuance of a permit to ... carry a pistol or

revolver would be in the interest of public health safety, or welfare," and "(f) or those who wish to carry a pistol or revolver, permits will be required as they are under present New Jersey law: and WHEREAS, violations of existing laws, statutes and regulations are already criminal offenses, many being felonies; and

WHEREAS, gun control laws, including a plethora of current proposed legislation, are not evidence-based; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey's Gun Control Law is highly purposed and conscientiously designed toward preventing criminal and other unfit elements from acquiring firearms while enabling the fit elements of society to obtain them with minimal burdens and inconveniences." [Burton v Sills 53 N.J. 86 (1968) 248 A.2d 521 at 105.

WHEREAS, A law abiding citizen of the State of New Jersey who possess a N.J. Firearms Purchaser Identification card has met the burden of proof to be a law-abiding citizen. And is immune from further legislation and laws that are in violation of the constitution of the United States of America.

To the attention of Mount Olive Town Council and Mount Olive Township Clerk, Michelle Masser,

I have become aware from a posting in the Mt. Olive Community Forum by Martin B. Welzmuller that there is a group proposing to ask our town council to pass a resolution in support of something called the NJ 2A Sanctuary movement. Their proposal is available on the internet at <a href="https://www.nj2asanctuary.com/resolutions">https://www.nj2asanctuary.com/resolutions</a>.

I am writing to support Mayor Robert Greenbaum's stand as reported in the Mt. Olive Chronicle article of January 20 by Phil Garber and to request that the Mount Olive Township Council members vote NO on any submission of this resolution or any worded similarly. I oppose any resolution to designate Mount Olive Township as a "2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment Sanctuary Municipality".

Specifically, I strongly object to some of the wording in the proposed resolution (below).

I do not feel that Mt. Olive Township should go on record backing such a one-sided view of the Second Amendment with language almost literally from an NRA opinion. Gun owners have recently gained a high degree of legal protection for their stated desire to have protective firearms in their homes for strictly defensive purposes under the SCOTUS decision <u>DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA ET AL. v. HELLER</u> Decided June 26, 2008 and further clarified under <u>McDonald v. Chicago, 561 U.S. 742 (2010)</u>.

Unfortunately, a number of people don't think that this is enough for them and many seem to be heavily opposed to any laws at the local, State or Federal level that would limit their perceived "absolute right" to bear any sort of arms of any type anywhere at any time – something even Justice Scalia recognized was NOT guaranteed by the Second Amendment. Specifically, they oppose limiting clip size on semi-automatic weapons and as they state – any form of gun control, "gun safety" legislation, or "red flag laws"

As a law abiding citizen of Mt Olive for over 40 years, a municipality with one of the lowest crime rates in the State or Nation, I see NO LEGITIMATE NEED for us to take sides in matters that are ultimately decided by the legislatures and the courts. I am willing to bet that the majority of Mt. Olive residents would agree with me that "we don't have a dog in that fight". People with those views have ample opportunity to petition the courts for redress of any perceived impositions on their "right to bear arms".



## Resolution

A resolution of the County of Morris Declaring Morris County a Second Amendment county.

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States of America is the supreme law of our nation, and

WHEREAS, the Second Amendment to the Constitution states, "A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in the District of Columbia v. Heller, 554 U.S. 570 (2008) affirmed that the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms is not connected in any way to the service of the militia; and

Whereas, the U.S. Supreme court in McDonald v, City of Chicago, 561 U.S. 742 (2010), affirmed that a person's Second Amendment right to "Keep and bear arms" is further secured by the 'Due process" and the "privileges and immunities" clauses of the fourteenth amendment. This decision also protects the rights closely related to the Second amendment, namely the right to manufacture, transfer, and sell firearms, accessorizes, and ammunition; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme court in United States v. Miller, 307 U.S. 174 (1939) stated firearms that are part of ordinary military use (Weapons of common use) that can contribute to the common defense and are protected by the Second Amendment; and

WHEREAS, there are an estimated 12 million Americans who lawfully carry concealed firearms; and

Whereas, presently twenty-seven states issue firearms carry permits on a shall issue basis (Permit required) Sixteen states are no permit required (Constitutional Carry); and

WHEREAS, abridging the rights of lawful gun owners does not reduce the criminal use of firearms by violent offenders; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Second Amendment Society and Mark Cheeseman v. Christopher S Porrino N.J. Honorable Judge Shipp U.S District court 3rd, stated "The Second Amendment extends, prima facie to all instruments that constitute bearable arms, even those not in existence at the time of the founding "and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Attorney General Burton Sills, who "close[ly] participant[ed] in the drafting and presentation of the [1966] Gun Control Law," and whose views the New Jersey has relied upon to decide close interpretive questions concerning that legislation. See Service Armament Co. v. Hyland, 362 A.2d 13, 18, 70 N.J. 550, 560 (1976). In the lead-up to the 1966 Gun Control Law, Attorney General Sills had publicly explained that there was presently "no law against walking down the street with a weapon in your hand or on your body so long as it isn't concealed," and that individuals without concealed-carry permits were free to carry guns "in plain view". and

WHEREAS, In the A-165 Debates of 1966, Attorney General Sills explained that under the new law, "standards are set forth to determine if the issuance of a permit to ... carry a pistol or revolver would be in the interest of public

health safety, or welfare," and "(f)or those who wish to carry a pistol or revolver, permits will be required as they are under present New Jersey law: and

WHEREAS, violations of existing laws, statutes and regulations are already criminal offenses, many being felonies; and

WHEREAS, gun control laws, including a plethora of current proposed legislation, are not evidence-based; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey's Gun Control Law is highly purposed and conscientiously designed toward preventing criminal and other unfit elements from acquiring firearms while enabling the fit elements of society to obtain them with minimal burdens and inconveniences." [Burton v Sills 53 N.J. 86 (1968) 248 A.2d 521 at 105.and

WHEREAS, A law abiding citizen of the State of New Jersey who possess a N.J. Firearms Purchaser Identification card has met the burden of proof to be a law-abiding citizen and is immune from further legislation and laws that violate the constitution of the United States of America.

#### DEP MODIFIES HARMFUL ALGAL BLOOM GRANT PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS, EXTENDS DEADLINE TO PROVIDE MORE FLEXIBILITY TO APPLICANTS

(20/P01) TRENTON – The Department of Environmental Protection has extended by 15 days the deadline for submission of applications for a \$2.5 million grant program to fund projects to help reduce the occurrence of harmful algal blooms in the state.

The decision to extend the deadline for the harmful algal bloom management grant program to Jan. 27 follows a meeting last month with potential applicants who were looking for more financial flexibility and improved guidance in order to quickly implement projects to mitigate and/or control harmful algal blooms, also known as HABs.

As a result of this meeting, the DEP has published an <u>updated notice</u> that now allows in-kind services provided by applicants to be credited toward the program's matching-fund grant



eligibility requirement, thus helping local governments that are working on finalizing operating budgets for this year. The DEP has also provided examples for clarity on what constitutes an eligible match, including short-term operation and maintenance of the demonstration project.

"Reducing the impacts these blooms have on public health, the environment and our economy is of utmost importance to the state," Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe said. "We fully understand the current budget planning needs of municipalities and counties that are interested in applying for grants and are committed to working closely with them to get these projects launched as soon as possible."

In November, Governor Murphy announced a comprehensive harmful algal bloom strategy that includes \$13.5 million in funding for local projects that will improve water quality and help prevent, mitigate and manage harmful algal blooms in lakes and ponds.

This effort earmarks \$10 million in Clean Water State Revolving Fund money as principal-forgiveness (grant-like) funding for projects that address HABs by improving water quality. The administration is also providing \$3.5 million from two grant programs for projects addressing harmful algal blooms.

Specifically, the modifications apply to the \$2.5 million harmful algal bloom management grant program, in which the state provides \$2 in funding for every \$1 invested by the applicant.

In-kind services directly related to the proposed project may now be used to count toward the local match for these projects, but applicants are advised that this may change in possible future grant opportunities and that they should begin budgetary planning accordingly.


Harmful algal blooms, also known as HABs, are not true algal blooms. Rather, they are caused by naturally occurring cyanobacteria that can reproduce to unhealthful levels under certain conditions, including sunlight, nutrients from sources such as fertilizers and improperly operating septic systems, warm weather and stagnant water. They frequently form dense mats, resembling pea soup or spilled paint.

Exposure to blooms can result in a range of health effects, including rashes, allergy-like reactions, flu-like symptoms, gastroenteritis, respiratory irritation and eye irritation. Exposure to a bloom that is actively producing cyanotoxins may result in more serious health effects, including liver toxicity and neurological effects.

People, pets and wildlife are susceptible to adverse health effects if they come into contact with or ingest water that is experiencing a bloom. For more information on harmful algal blooms, visit <a href="https://www.state.nj.us/dep/hab">www.state.nj.us/dep/hab</a>

In all, more than 70 suspected blooms were reported last year, with 39 confirmed. These blooms resulted in health and water-contact advisories, closures of bathing beaches and, in some cases, had direct impacts on tourism-related businesses.

In April 1971, DEP had been running for one year, and we were six months into the operation of our "Environmental Action Hotline". The Hotline was established so the public could report instances of environmental

WARN-DEP provides residents the ability to directly report environmental concerns, much as the hotline did 50 years ago. Today, residents can also download and use the "WARN DEP" app for smart devices to report concerns.



This letter is to inform you that the Entire Site Response Action Outcome (RAO), dated September 2, 2016, issued by Thomas J Brady IV, License # 573653, is invalid.

This invalidation is necessary because the RAO issued in September 2, 2016 is not protective of public health, safety and the environment in accordance with the Administrative Requirements for the Remediation of Contaminated Sites (ARRCS) section 7:26C-6.4(a)9 which states that a remedial action is not protective if "mistakes or errors in the final remediation document may result in detrimental reliance on the final remediation document by a third party". Specifically, the RAO includes block 4100, lot 83 and block 4100, lot 84. These two lots were not part of the final remediation that is addressed via the RAO. Because of this error the RAO is deemed to be not protective of the public health, safety and the environment.

As of November 7, 2019, the Site Remediation Professional Licensing Board has terminated Thomas J. Brady's license pursuant to its authority under the Site Remediation Reform Act (SRRA) at N.J.S.A 58:10C-8 and 17b. Furthermore, Thomas J Brady IV has passed away. Since the Licensed Site Remediation Professional that issued Remediation Reform Act (SRRA) at N.J.S.A 58:10C-8 and 17b. Furthermore, Thomas J Brady IV has passed away. Since the Licensed Site Remediation Professional that issued the RAO can no longer rectify the issues identified in the above referenced RAO, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has therefore determined pursuant to its authority under SRRA at N.J.S.A. 58:10C-22 that the RAO issued by Thomas J. Brady IV is invalid.





- 1. The track is owned by Morris County, maintained and operated by Chesapeake and Delaware Railroad.
- 2. Main Street (CR 613) and N Road/Hillside Avenue (CR 619) are crossed at-grade by one track of Morris County's Highbridge Branch.
- 3. Main Street (CR 613) intersects the track at an obtuse angle of 110 degrees and N Road/Hillside Avenue (CR 619) both intersects the track at an acute angle of 70 degrees.
- 4. Main Street (CR 613) and N Road/Hillside Avenue (CR 619) are running in a north/south direction and the railroad track is running east/west direction.
- 5. The NJDOT Bureau of Structural & Railroad Engineering Services Unit Diagnostic Team held Diagnostic Meetings on Thursday, October 19<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at the **Main Street (CR 613)** and N. Road/Hillside Avenue (CR 619) Highway-Rail At-Grade Crossings. Subsequent to notice and issuance of a Memorandum of Record, the NJDOT Commissioner issued an effective ORDER on June 1, 2018 that depicted all the proposed At-Grade Crossing Upgrades.
- 6. Vehicular traffic over the rail crossings are comprised of a mixed variety including passenger vehicles, trucks, busses and hazardous material cargo carriers.
- 7. The New Jersey Traffic Law governing this action is Tile 39:4-128 "Full Stop at-Grade Crossing". Currently, vehicles containing hazardous material, an omnibus or school bus are required to stop between 15 feet to 50 feet in advance of a railroad-at-grade crossings.
- 8. The railroad crossings are considered for "EXEMPT" status when the potential for damage and injury from accidents between motor vehicles required to stop at the at-grade crossings and other motor vehicles traveling in the same direction exceeds the potential for damage and injury from accidents between a train and the vehicle required to stop by law.

The prudent motorist would be better served with revisions to the railroad warning devices by inserting "EXEMPT" signs below the railroad crossing sign (R15-1) and below the railroad advance warning signs (W10-1) to the right of each approach to the at-grade crossings. The installation of these signs would take place following the acceptance of a formal process which would including a public hearing in concert with New Jersey State Statute Title 39:4-128 "Full Stop at-grade crossing".

The parties on notice herein are advised that proposals concerning highway-rail at-grade crossings require prior approval by the Commissioner of Transportation as provided through the Diagnostic Team process carried out by the Department's Railroad Engineering & Services.

Accordingly, a PUBLIC HEARING will be convened to allow you and the interested public the opportunity to review and discuss the Departments' determination that designating this location as an "EXEMPT Crossing" is consistent with maintaining a safe public crossing of the railroad tracks at this site. Comments and input relating to the captioned matter will be used to formulate RECOMMENDATIONS, which will be submitted to the Commissioner for use in rendering a decision.

The motion was approved.

Chairman Rattner welcomed new staff member Mike DiGiulio. Mr. DiGiulio provided his educational and employment background. Ms. Marion noted that Mike DiGiulio is working in Development Review, reporting to Greg Perry, and is reaching out into other areas, including Preservation Trust. He has been working with Principal Environmental Planner Virginia Michelin and has already been out in the field with Assistant Planning Director Joe Barilla to conduct farmland preservation monitoring.

#### DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Planning Director Christine Marion noted that the County is waiting for the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) to publish the Mine Hill Chapter of the Wastewater Management Plan in the New Jersey Register. She stated that Ms. Michelin has been working with Mr. DiGiulio on an interactive map showing sewer service areas by parcel. Mr. DiGiulio stated that the map will allow the public to search their properties and determine their sewer service area status and that this interactive map provides the means to find a particular property without knowing the Parcel ID Number. Ms. Marion added that one can also browse the map to determine the status of any parcel.

The Board accepted the Director's Report for October - November 2019 and it will be placed on file.

#### REPORT OF FUNDS RECEIVED

Funds received for October 2019 totaled \$9,850. Funds received for November 2019 totaled \$10,785.

#### **FUTURE MEETINGS**

Ms. Marion informed the Board that she would be attending the County Planners Meeting on December 6, 2019, with Senior Planner Kevin Sitlick. Ms. Olcott noted that this meeting would be a good opportunity for Ms. Marion to discuss the Complete County Committee to elicit ideas the Committee may consider regarding communication strategies. Ms. Marion reported that the Complete Count Committee received a grant for just over \$100,000 to assist with the program. Ms. Olcott reported that the next meeting of the Committee is on December 16, 2019.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

### **Environmental and Watershed**

County Wastewater Management Plan – Ms. Marion had nothing further to report.

Watershed Activities – Ms. Marion reported on the meeting of the Rockaway River Watershed Cabinet (RRWC) held earlier in the day, and stated that the year is ending well with potential new projects. She reported that new watershed signage has arrived and is available to any municipality that would like to replace their existing signage. The Cabinet is also moving ahead with a potential project for stream assessments with the assistance of high school and college students.

Ms. Marion also reported that the Whippany River Watershed Action Committee is looking for a new facilitator and wants to collaborate with other watershed groups.

# Land Subdivision and Zoning

Developments Reviewed - Ms. Olcott reported on the Land Development Review Committee meeting on December 5, 2019. Ms. Olcott noted the following applications:

Montville, Alpine Development, 2019-21-5-M-0 (County Route 202) - This minor subdivision is for a lot line transfer to create two single-family residential lots from two existing vacant lots. The two lots will access a municipal road and each new home will have drywells to infiltrate rooftop stormwater runoff. Ms. Olcott noted that a sight triangle will be requested.

Parsippany, 1209 Littleton Road, 2019-29-10-SP-0 (County Route 202) - This site plan is for the redevelopment of an existing single-family residential lot into a mixed-use structure with 2,304 square feet of retail on the first floor and four apartment units (two on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, two beneath the first floor) along with 19 parking spaces on a .8 acre parcel. A single full access driveway connection to Littleton Road is proposed. Stormwater management entails the use of a subsurface infiltration system with an overflow outfall directed to the rear of the property. County Engineering will review the proposed driveway connection to Littleton Road and the proposed stormwater management.

**Developments Reviewed** – Ms. Olcott then reported on the Land Development Review Committee meeting held on December 5, 2019. Ms. Olcott noted the following applications:

East Hanover, Quick Chek East Hanover, 2019-10-9-SP-0 (County Route 610) - This site plan is for the redevelopment of a multi-tenant commercial property into a Quick Chek convenience store with motor fueling facilities on a 2.3 acre property. All existing site improvements will be removed and a 5,869 square foot convenience store will be constructed in addition to eight fuel dispensers and 64 parking spaces. The site will have a stormwater collection system with a manufactured water quality structure prior to its connection to the Mount Pleasant Avenue stormwater collection system. Proposed access for this site includes a full access driveway connection to Mount Pleasant Avenue and this proposed driveway will be situated across from the existing Hanover Park High School driveway. Dedicated left turn lanes will be provided. Ms. Olcott noted that bus stops are provided on three of the adjacent road frontages. County Engineering will review stormwater management.

East Hanover, 500 Ridgedale Avenue, 2019-10-8-SP-0 (County Route 632) - This site plan application is for the conversion of a single-family residence with home occupation into a dental office. The existing driveway will be expanded to accommodate parking for employees and patients. Five parking spaces are proposed, including one ADA accessible spot. Additional external improvements as well as internal structural improvements are included. Due to the low volume commercial use of a home dental office, the expansion of the driveway to conform to the required minimum 24' for a commercial structure will not be required; the applicant will request a waiver from County standards and increase the width to 18 feet.

Jefferson, Jefferson Market, 2019-14-6-SP-0 (County Route 615) - This site plan application is for the redevelopment of the Jefferson Market property on Espanong Road (CR 615). The

existing 1,711 sq. ft. convenience store will be demolished to allow for the construction of a new 4,147 sq. ft. convenience store, associated parking, and a drainage collection and conveyance system. The site plan includes 23 parking spaces, including a required van accessible ADA parking space. Four employee parking spaces are provided atop reinforced turf behind the eastern wall of the proposed structure. The curb line needs to be extended out towards the existing stormwater inlets along Espanong Road (CR 615). There is an existing County drainage easement across the property. A new drainage pipe will need to be constructed. County Engineering will need to review for stormwater management and site frontage improvements. More intensive development and rearrangement of this site plan is needed so that construction is not blocking the County drainage easement. County approval is being withheld pending rearrangement of the site plan to address this issue.

Madison, Central Avenue School Minor, 2019-17-10-M-0 (County Route 608) - This minor subdivision will create two lots from the Central Avenue School property (Block 1601, Lot 1) along Central Avenue (CR 608). The proposed 0.55-acre lot will be located at the western corner of the lot, adjacent to lots 20, 21, and 23 at the end of Community Place. The Borough of Madison will retain ownership of the proposed lot and will use the vacant land to build affordable housing as part of the Green Village Road School Land Transfer Contract dated May 2014. The proposed lot will be deed restricted to limit the number of units on the land. The applicant must clearly show the existing half width right-of-way for Central Avenue. There is no impact upon County structures or facilities.

Montville, Modera Montville, 2019-21-7-SP-0 (County Route 621) - This site plan application is for the redevelopment of Lots 5.01 and 5.02 of Block 159. The existing structure on Lot 5.01 will be demolished, while the existing structure on Lot 5.02 will remain in place. Major site improvements for Lot 5.01 consist of a 4-story multi-family residential apartment building (three stories residential, one story for under building parking) containing a total of 295 residential units, of which 47 will be designated as affordable housing. Parking for this site, which will include 296 parking spots in the garage below the primary structure, 264 exterior parking spots, and an additional 53 parking spots located on Lot 5.02 shared between both property owners. Of the 556 parking spots located on Lot 5.01, 13 will be designated as ADA accessible. Additional site amenities include three courtyards with mixed outdoor uses for the residents and a fenced dog park. There will be no significant change in impervious coverage. Stormwater runoff from the rooftop and parking lots will be conveyed to a drainage basin to the south of the structure with an outflow to an existing pipe that flows northeast towards Hook Mountain Road. County Engineering will review stormwater management, the existing signalized intersection of Changebridge Road and the site access driveway. Sidewalk extensions are recommended due to the presence of schoolchildren.

Parsippany, The Morrison, 2019-29-11-SP-0 (County Route 654) - This site plan is for the redevelopment of a former BASF office building site with two 4-story apartment buildings with a lower level for under-building parking with 268 spaces. An additional 340 surface spaces and 31 surface banked spaces are proposed for a project total of 639 spaces. There will be a total of 325 residential units of which 65 will be low and moderate income. A subsurface detention facility and several rain gardens are proposed. An outdoor pool will be associated with one building. Access for the site will be to an existing common access road known as Upper Pond Road that serves the Morris Corporate Center. Upper Pond Road intersects Cherry Hill Road (County Route 654) at a recently improved signalized intersection. County Engineering will review the stormwater management report and the submitted traffic impact assessment.

Ms. Olcott made a motion to approve the Report of Actions Taken on Development Plans for October and November 2019. Mr. Eppel seconded the motion and it was approved by roll call vote:

# Legislative and Municipal

Recent Legislation - Mr. Soriano reported that several new bills have been introduced. He noted that the current legislative session will end by January 14, 2020 so the new bills may require reintroduction if they are not passed by then. Mr. Soriano highlighted the following bills:

A5790 "Adopt a Stormwater Management Basin Act" would permit nonprofits and business entities to adopt responsibilities related to stormwater management basins by entering into agreement with the stormwater management agency that owns or controls the basin. Qualified watersheds in Morris County include Lake Hopatcong, Budd Lake, and Lake Musconetcong. All participating entities must demonstrate the ability to maintain basins in accordance with agreed upon terms. Benefits to the participating entity include advertising rights and tax credits.

A5794 would amend the Municipal Land Use Law to designate an authorized medical cannabis dispensary as a permitted use in any commercial or business district within which a pharmacy, drugstore or retail business is a permitted or conditional use.

S606 was signed into law as P.L.2019, c.267 and amends the Municipal Land Use Law to make consideration of public electric vehicle charging infrastructure a part of any Green Building and Environmental Sustainability Element of a local master plan. Consideration of public electric vehicle charging infrastructure would also be included in all Reexamination Reports. Mr. Scott noted issues associated with the different commercial and residential charging station tariffs.

# Master Plan Report

Mr. Soriano stated that seven items were received, which included:

Hanover 2019 Reexamination Report - This report outlines issues and recommendations from the previous reexamination report and the status of those recommendations. The report addresses the decommissioned Route 24 extension, and recommends an update of the stormwater management plan element and the housing element and fair share plan.

Hanover 2019 Housing Element and Fair Share Plan - This plan addresses the Third Round affordable housing settlement with the Court and Fair Share Housing Center.

Hanover Land Use Plan. The primary focus of this plan are the proposed land use changes related to the 2019 housing element and fair share plan.

Morris Plains Land Use Plan amendment - This amendment proposes a land use change associated with a single 35-acre lot with frontage on Route 10 and Route 202, the Briarcliff Common Shopping Center, currently split between business and residential zoning. The amendment recommends the entire parcel be zoned for business.

Rockaway Twp. Reexamination Report - This report addresses changes in local demographic, housing and economic conditions. Recommendations include, but are not limited to, the expansion of permitted uses in nonresidential zones to promote economic development and revitalization.

Parsippany Troy Hills 2019 Master Plan - This is a comprehensive master plan update including an assessment of existing conditions, goals and strategies and a new land use plan. Proposals include, but are not limited to: adoption of the latest NJDEP stormwater regulations, taking steps to conform with the Highlands Regional Master Plan, development a new Circulation Plan Element, development a Community Facilities Plan, update the Historic Preservation Plan Element and development of a digital zoning map.

East Hanover -2019 Housing Element and Fair Share Plan - This plan addresses the Third Round affordable housing settlement with the Court and Fair Share Housing Center.

#### Land Use Ordinance Report

Mr. Soriano reported on the October and November Zoning Reports:

October Report - This report includes 18 proposed, 32 adopted and one defeated ordinance. Approximately half of the proposed ordinances were from Hanover Township, most for implementation of recent Housing Element and Fair Share Plan requirements. Of the 32 adopted ordinances, 18 were from Parsippany, all to implement their new Housing Element and Fair Share Plan.

November Report – This report includes 13 proposed, 11 adopted and two withdrawn ordinance of which more than half address affordable housing. Mr. Soriano noted that Hanover adopted an ordinance for the redevelopment of the former Whippany Paper Board Company site. The redevelopment includes a parcel owned by the Morris County Park Commission that Hanover wants to purchase.

#### Long Range Planning – Land Use Plan Element

Ms. Galate stated that the Long Range Committee members received draft copies of the revised Summary of Trends and of the new Housing and Population sections of the draft Land Use Plan from Mr. Soriano, Mr. Soriano reported that work continues on the section addressing existing land use and regulatory conditions. Ms. Galate stated that the Committee will meet next in the new year to review this section.

#### LIAISON REPORTS

## Lake Musconetcong Regional Planning Board

Chairman Rattner provided minutes of the LMRPB meeting of October 16, 2019. He anticipates minutes of the most recent meeting to be forthcoming and will pass them along to the Morris County Planning Board.

## Musconetcong River Management Council

Chairman Rattner stated that the most recent meeting of Council was attended by the alternate representative, and that information on this meeting will be forthcoming.

## Lake Hopatcong Commission

Ms. Marion reported on the minutes of the Lake Hopatcong Commission. She stated that the Commission has a drafted their Watershed Implementation Plan, funded by the Highlands Council, which identifies 27 project sites. The Commission is focused on shovel-ready projects, and is working with their consultant to identify and prioritize these projects. She reported that a presentation by Louise Davis of the Morris County Soil Conservation Service was given at the Commission's meeting, which focused on the Lake Management Plan of Lake George. The Lake George Fund is willing to fund 50% of a Boat Washing Station at Lake Hopatcong to help mitigate contamination from entering Lake George from Lake Hopatcong.

Ms. Marion reported that Lake Hopatcong has applied for a 22-inch draw-down this year, which Mr. Rattner stated has been approved. She also reported that Governor Murphy's visit was discussed, at which he announced that \$10.5 million dollars has been made available to address water issues. Ms. Galate noted that correcting the problem of Harmful Algae Blooms (HABs) is a priority.

#### Morris County Open Space Trust Fund

Ms. Galate reported that the Board of Chosen Freeholders approved the 2019 grant recommendations for six applications and that the combined applications totaled \$1,963,150 to preserve 164.08 acres in six municipalities. Ms. Marion informed the Board that the Committee met for its end-of-year assessment on December 4, 2019 to review suggested program and rule revisions for 2020. One proposal would be to replace the Historic Preservation liaison with the Trail Committee liaison. Ms. Marion reported that there had been a discussion of properties acquired through tax liens, also an issue of interest for flood mitigation.

# **Trail Construction Trust Fund Committee**

Ms. Olcott reported that the Committee sent its funding recommendations to the Board of Chosen Freeholders at their work session of November 25, 2019. These recommendations concern the request by six municipalities to construct 2.6 miles of trails at a cost of \$827,412. Ms. Olcott noted that the press is already publicizing these proposed recommendations as formalized, but the County Freeholders will not be voting on the recommendations until their meeting of December 11, 2019.

Ms. Marion also noted that everyone is getting the same short form Census Survey for the decennial census. The long form will only be provided as part of the American Community Survey, and is being sent out to a sample population.

Ms. Marion noted that Mike DiGiulio is working in Development Review, reporting to Greg Perry, and is reaching out into other areas, including Preservation Trust. He has been working with Principal Environmental Planner Virginia Michelin and has already been out in the field with Assistant Planning Director Joe Barilla to conduct farmland preservation monitoring.

#### **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Planning Director Christine Marion noted that the County is waiting for the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) to publish the Mine Hill Chapter of the Wastewater Management Plan in the New Jersey Register. She stated that Ms. Michelin has been working with Mr. DiGiulio on an interactive map showing sewer service areas by parcel. Mr. DiGiulio stated that the map will allow the public to search their properties and determine their sewer service area status and that this interactive map provides the means to find a particular property without knowing the Parcel ID Number. #### **FUTURE MEETINGS**

Ms. Marion informed the Board that she would be attending the County Planners Meeting on December 6, 2019, with Senior Planner Kevin Sitlick. She reported that new watershed signage has arrived and is available to any municipality that would like to replace their existing signage. ## **Land Subdivision and Zoning**

Developments Reviewed - Ms. Olcott reported on the Land Development Review Committee meeting on December 5, 2019. Ms. Olcott noted the following applications:

Montville, Alpine Development, 2019-21-5-M-0 (County Route 202) - This minor subdivision is for a lot line transfer to create two single-family residential lots from two existing vacant lots. The two lots will access a municipal road and each new home will have drywells to infiltrate rooftop stormwater runoff. Ms. Olcott noted that a sight triangle will be requested.

Parsippany, 1209 Littleton Road, 2019-29-10-SP-0 (County Route 202) - This site plan is for the redevelopment of an existing single-family residential lot into a mixed-use structure with 2,304 square feet of retail on the first floor and four apartment units (two on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, two beneath the first floor) along with 19 parking spaces on a .8 acre parcel. A single full access driveway connection to Littleton Road is proposed. Stormwater management entails the use of a subsurface infiltration system with an overflow outfall directed to the rear of the property. County Engineering will review the proposed driveway connection to Littleton Road and the proposed stormwater management.

Developments Reviewed - Ms. Olcott then reported on the Land Development Review Committee meeting held on December 5, 2019. Ms. Olcott noted the following applications:

East Hanover, Quick Chek East Hanover, 2019-10-9-SP-0 (County Route 610) - This site plan is for the redevelopment of a multi-tenant commercial property into a Quick Chek convenience store with motor fueling facilities on a 2.3 acre property. All existing site improvements will be removed and a 5,869 square foot convenience store will be constructed in addition to eight fuel dispensers and 64 parking spaces. The site will have a stormwater collection system with a manufactured water quality structure prior to its connection to the Mount Pleasant Avenue stormwater collection system. Proposed access for this site includes a full access driveway connection to Mount Pleasant Avenue and this proposed driveway will be situated across from the existing Hanover Park High School driveway. Dedicated left turn lanes will be provided. Ms. Olcott noted that bus stops are provided on three of the adjacent road frontages. County Engineering will review stormwater management.

East Hanover, 500 Ridgedale Avenue, 2019-10-8-SP-0 (County Route 632) - This site plan application is for the conversion of a single-family residence with home occupation into a dental office. The existing driveway will be expanded to accommodate parking for employees and patients. Five parking spaces are proposed, including one ADA accessible spot. Additional external improvements as well as internal structural improvements are included. Parsippany, The Morrison, 2019-29-11-SP-0 (County Route 654) - This site plan is for the redevelopment of a former BASF office building site with two 4-story apartment buildings with a lower level for under-building parking with 268 spaces. An additional 340 surface spaces and 31 surface banked spaces are proposed for a project total of 639 spaces. There will be a total of 325 residential units of which 65 will be low and moderate income. A subsurface detention facility and several rain gardens are proposed. An outdoor pool will be associated with one building. Access for the site will be to an existing common access road known as Upper Pond Road that serves the Morris Corporate Center. Upper Pond Road intersects Cherry Hill Road (County Route 654) at a

recently improved signalized intersection. County Engineering will review the stormwater management report and the submitted traffic impact assessment.

Ms. Olcott made a motion to approve the <u>Report of Actions Taken on Development Plans for October and November 2019</u>. Mr. Eppel seconded the motion and it was approved by roll call vote:

# Legislative and Municipal

Recent Legislation – Mr. Soriano reported that several new bills have been introduced. He noted that the current legislative session will end by January 14, 2020 so the new bills may require reintroduction if they are not passed by then. Mr. Soriano highlighted the following bills:

A5790 "Adopt a Stormwater Management Basin Act" would permit nonprofits and business entities to adopt responsibilities related to stormwater management basins by entering into agreement with the stormwater management agency that owns or controls the basin. Qualified watersheds in Morris County include Lake Hopatcong, Budd Lake, and Lake Musconetcong. All participating entities must demonstrate the ability to maintain basins in accordance with agreed upon terms. Benefits to the participating entity include advertising rights and tax credits.

A5794 would amend the Municipal Land Use Law to designate an authorized medical cannabis dispensary as a permitted use in any commercial or business district within which a pharmacy, drugstore or retail business is a permitted or conditional use.

**S606** was signed into law as P.L.2019, c.267 and amends the Municipal Land Use Law to make consideration of public electric vehicle charging infrastructure a part of any Green Building and Environmental Sustainability Element of a local master plan. Consideration of public electric vehicle charging infrastructure would also be included in all Reexamination Reports. Mr. Scott noted issues associated with the different commercial and residential charging station tariffs.

# Master Plan Report

Mr. Soriano stated that seven items were received, which included:

Hanover 2019 Reexamination Report - This report outlines issues and recommendations from the previous reexamination report and the status of those recommendations. The report addresses the decommissioned Route 24 extension, and recommends an update of the stormwater management plan element and the housing element and fair share plan.

Hanover 2019 Housing Element and Fair Share Plan - This plan addresses the Third Round affordable housing settlement with the Court and Fair Share Housing Center.

**Hanover Land Use Plan.** The primary focus of this plan are the proposed land use changes related to the 2019 housing element and fair share plan.

Morris Plains Land Use Plan amendment - This amendment proposes a land use change associated with a single 35-acre lot with frontage on Route 10 and Route 202, the Briarcliff Common Shopping Center, currently split between business and residential zoning. The amendment recommends the entire parcel be zoned for business.

**Rockaway Twp. Reexamination Report** - This report addresses changes in local demographic, housing and economic conditions. Recommendations include, but are not limited to, the expansion of permitted uses in nonresidential zones to promote economic development and revitalization.

Parsippany Troy Hills 2019 Master Plan - This is a comprehensive master plan update including an assessment of existing conditions, goals and strategies and a new land use plan. Proposals include, but are not limited to: adoption of the latest NJDEP stormwater regulations, taking steps to conform with the Highlands Regional Master Plan, development a new Circulation Plan Element, development a Community Facilities Plan, update the Historic Preservation Plan Element and development of a digital zoning map.

East Hanover -2019 Housing Element and Fair Share Plan - This plan addresses the Third Round affordable housing settlement with the Court and Fair Share Housing Center.

#### Land Use Ordinance Report

Mr. Soriano reported on the October and November Zoning Reports:

October Report - This report includes 18 proposed, 32 adopted and one defeated ordinance. Approximately half of the proposed ordinances were from Hanover Township, most for implementation of recent Housing Element and Fair Share Plan requirements. Of the 32 adopted ordinances, 18 were from Parsippany, all to implement their new Housing Element and Fair Share Plan.

November Report – This report includes 13 proposed, 11 adopted and two withdrawn ordinance of which more than half address affordable housing. Mr. Soriano noted that Hanover adopted an ordinance for the redevelopment of the former Whippany Paper Board Company site. The redevelopment includes a parcel owned by the Morris County Park Commission that Hanover wants to purchase.

# Long Range Planning - Land Use Plan Element

Ms. Galate stated that the Long Range Committee members received draft copies of the revised Summary of Trends and of the new Housing and Population sections of the draft Land Use Plan from Mr. Soriano. Mr. Soriano reported that work continues on the section addressing existing

land use and regulatory conditions. Ms. Galate stated that the Committee will meet next in the new year to review this section.

#### LIAISON REPORTS

## Lake Musconetcong Regional Planning Board

Chairman Rattner provided minutes of the LMRPB meeting of October 16, 2019. He anticipates minutes of the most recent meeting to be forthcoming and will pass them along to the Morris County Planning Board.

# Musconetcong River Management Council

Chairman Rattner stated that the most recent meeting of Council was attended by the alternate representative, and that information on this meeting will be forthcoming.

#### Lake Hopatcong Commission

Ms. Marion reported on the minutes of the Lake Hopatcong Commission. She stated that the Commission has a drafted their Watershed Implementation Plan, funded by the Highlands Council, which identifies 27 project sites. The Commission is focused on shovel-ready projects, and is working with their consultant to identify and prioritize these projects. She reported that a presentation by Louise Davis of the Morris County Soil Conservation Service was given at the Commission's meeting, which focused on the Lake Management Plan of Lake George. The Lake George Fund is willing to fund 50% of a Boat Washing Station at Lake Hopatcong to help mitigate contamination from entering Lake George from Lake Hopatcong.

Ms. Marion reported that Lake Hopatcong has applied for a 22-inch draw-down this year, which Mr. Rattner stated has been approved. She also reported that Governor Murphy's visit was discussed, at which he announced that \$10.5 million dollars has been made available to address water issues. Ms. Galate noted that correcting the problem of Harmful Algae Blooms (HABs) is a priority.

#### Morris County Open Space Trust Fund

Ms. Galate reported that the Board of Chosen Freeholders approved the 2019 grant recommendations for six applications and that the combined applications totaled \$1,963,150 to preserve 164.08 acres in six municipalities. Ms. Marion informed the Board that the Committee met for its end-of-year assessment on December 4, 2019 to review suggested program and rule revisions for 2020. One proposal would be to replace the Historic Preservation liaison with the Trail Committee liaison. Ms. Marion reported that there had been a discussion of properties acquired through tax liens, also an issue of interest for flood mitigation.

#### **Trail Construction Trust Fund Committee**

Ms. Olcott reported that the Committee sent its funding recommendations to the Board of Chosen Freeholders at their work session of November 25, 2019. These recommendations concern the request by six municipalities to construct 2.6 miles of trails at a cost of \$827,412. Ms. Olcott noted that the press is already publicizing these proposed recommendations as formalized, but the County Freeholders will not be voting on the recommendations until their meeting of December 11, 2019.

<u>Draft of 2019 Meeting Dates</u> – Ms. Marion stated that proposed meeting dates have been provided for Board review and that these will be voted on at the January Board meeting.

Morris County Complete Count Committee — Ms. Olcott reported that the Committee reviewed a sample copy of the 2020 Census questionnaire at its October meeting. Ms. Marion announced that the Morris County Complete Count Committee was awarded a grant in the amount of \$100,774 to assist with this initiative. She stated that the Committee is in the process of preparing paperwork to execute the grant agreement and that she anticipates that it will be formalized at the Freeholder Meeting of December 11, 2019. Ms. Marion also noted that everyone is getting the same short form Census Survey for the decennial census. The long form will only be provided as part of the American Community Survey, and is being sent out to a sample population.







# MORRIS COUNTY REPLACING NETCONG-MT.OLIVE-STANHOPE BRIDGE

WORK TO START WEEK OF FEB. 3 ON WATERLOO ROAD BRIDGE

Work is scheduled to start next week (week of Monday, Feb. 3) to replace the bi-county Waterloo Road bridge, which spans Netcong and Mount Olive in Morris County and connects with Stanhope in Sussex County.



Waterloo Bridge

The bridge replacement will require a 2.5-mile detour for about nine months. The detour will utilize Continental Drive, Route 46, Ledgewood Avenue, Main Street, and Kelly Place.

Replacement is needed because the bridge is structurally deficient and functionally obsolete.

The superstructure is in poor condition due to severe rust and there has been some loss of the bottom cord of the truss as well as in the floor beams and interior stringers.

Currently, the bridge has a posted four-ton weight limit.

The contractor on the \$2.3 million bid project is Marbro Inc. of Long Branch. This project is state funded.

Waterloo Road bridge, or county bridge number 1401-038, is a single span steel truss originally built in 1894. It carries about 1,100 vehicles per day. Currently, it is 18-feet wide and 43-feet long and carries two lanes of traffic –one in each direction.



There is a steel open-grid sidewalk on the north fascia of the bridge, with an ornamental pedestrian railing.


The project will require careful removal and storage of the existing trusses and pedestrian railing, followed by the removal of the remaining bridge.


The new structure then will be installed – pre-stressed concrete box beams supported on stone faced concrete abutments and wing walls, with a concrete deck, curbs, and bridge railings -- and approach roadway work also will be done.

**To maintain some of the historic character** of the original bridge, the original trusses will be restored and re-installed. The new 37-foot wide by 40-foot long span also will get a new and wider and new ornamental pedestrian rail on the south side of the bridge.


Advance warning signs about the project have been installed on roads near the bridge to warn motorists about the closure and pending detour.





The changes proposed in the Petition will result in the changes indicated in the chart below.

On December 16, 2019, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 48:2-21 and N.J.A.C. 14:1-5.12, New Jersey-American Water Company ("Company" or "Petitioner"), a public utility of the State of New Jersey subject to the jurisdiction of the Board of Public Utilities ("Board"), filed a petition for authority to increase its base tariff rates and charges for water and wastewater service amounting to approximately \$87.8 million or 12.3% in additional annual revenues. The increase in rates is proposed to become effective on January 15, 2020.1

The Company provides water service to approximately 652,000 customers and provides wastewater service to approximately 50,000 customers in portions of the following counties, Atlantic, Bergen, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Essex, Gloucester, Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, Monmouth, Morris, Ocean, Passaic, Salem, Somerset, Union, and Warren.

According to the petition, the proposed rate increase is necessary for the following reasons: (1) to establish an income level which will permit the Company to finance essential and continuing plant investment; (2) to permit Petitioner to earn a fair and adequate rate of return on its net investment in used and useful property; (3) to establish rates which will be sufficient to enable the



PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on September 20, 2019, New Jersey Natural Gas Company ("NJNG" or the "Company") filed its annual Societal Benefits Charge ("SBC") petition with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities ("Board") for a price adjustment for all applicable service customers. Pursuant to its filing, NJNG requested that the Board permit NJNG to increase its overall SBC rate which would include increases to the Remediation Adjustment ("RA") and the New Jersey Clean Energy Program ("NJCEP") factors effective April 1, 2020.

The RA rate provides recovery of actual costs incurred by NJNG for the clean-up of former manufactured gas plant sites. The NJCEP rate is designed to recover costs incurred for NJNG's share of statewide energy efficiency and renewable energy expenditures.

If the Board approves the requested price adjustment, the impact will result in an overall increase of approximately \$0.69 per month or 0.68 percent for a residential heating customer using 100 therms per month. The above-referenced proposal will not result in any profit for NJNG.

If approved by the Board, the impact of the proposed changes to the RA and NJCEP factors on typical natural gas bills is illustrated below:



# New Jersey American Water Files for Rate Adjustment

On December 16, New Jersey American Water has <u>filed a petition</u> with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (BPU) for new rates based on the significant investment the company has made or will make into its water and wastewater infrastructure since its last rate case.

"Since our last rate case, we have invested or will invest more than \$1 billion in infrastructure upgrades, including over 95 miles, more than 510,000 feet, of water main, to ensure continued water quality, service reliability and fire protection for the more than 2.7 million people in 18 counties who depend on us every day," said Cheryl Norton, president of New Jersey American Water. "Not only are these investments critical to the public's health and safety, but they also support the economic health of the communities we serve.

This level of investment contributes to the creation of approximately 16,000 jobs across the state."

If the company's proposed rates are approved as requested, the monthly water bill for the average residential customer using 5,400 gallons per month, would increase from the current charge of \$55.89 to \$62.35, an increase of \$6.46 per month, or 21 cents per day. The average monthly residential sewer bill would increase between \$0.00 and \$12.79, depending on the service area. Even with these increases, the cost of high-quality, reliable, 24-hour water service would continue to be about a penny per gallon and remain among the lowest household utility bills.


# Township of Long Hill Signs Agreement to Sell Sewer System to New Jersey American Water

New Jersey American Water recently <u>signed an agreement</u> to acquire the wastewater assets of Long Hill Township for \$12.7 million. This municipally owned sewer system serves approximately 2,800 customers, most of whom already receive water service from New Jersey American Water. The agreement follows a voter referendum that took place in November, in which voters approved the sale of the system to New Jersey American Water by a two to one margin.

As part of the acquisition agreement, New Jersey American Water will invest more than \$13 million in critical sewer system improvements in the next five years, while freezing current sewer rates for residents for two years and increasing rates no more than 3 percent annually for the three years after that.

"I am grateful to the voters for recognizing that selling the system to New Jersey American Water is the best solution for our town," said Matthew Dorsi, Mayor, Long Hill Township. "The proceeds from the sale will eliminate our debt, freeing up over \$1 million in our annual budget; and, as experts, New Jersey American Water can fix our troubled sewer system in a responsible, cost-effective manner without putting the entire financial burden on our residents."

# A RESOLUTON OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE DECLARING MOUNT OLIVE TOWNSHIP A SECOND AMENDMENT TOWNSHIP

WHEREAS, The Constitution of the United States of America is the supreme law of our nation; and

WHEREAS, the Second Amendment to the Constitution states, "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed"; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in <u>District of Columbia v. Heller</u>, 554 U.S. 570 (2008) affirmed that the Second Amendment conferred an individual right to keep and bear arms not connected to the service of the militia; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in the <u>United States v. Miller</u>, 307 U.S. 174 (1939) acknowledged firearms that are part of ordinary military equipment or that contribute to the common defense are protected by the Second Amendment; and

WHEREAS, there are an estimated 12 million Americans who lawfully carry concealed firearms; and

WHEREAS, abridging the rights of lawful gun owners does not reduce the criminal use of firearms by violent offenders; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in <u>District of Columbia v. Heller</u>, 554 U.S. 570 (2008) stated that "The Second Amendment extends, prima facie to all instruments that constitute bearable arms, even those not in existence as the time of the founding"; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Attorney General Burton Sills, as reflected in <u>Service Armament Co. v. Hyland</u>, 70 N.J. 550 (1976), had "close[ly] participat[ed] in the drafting and presentation of the [New Jersey] Gun Control Law [of 1966]; and

WHEREAS, in the A-165 Debates of 1966, Attorney General Sills explained that under the new law, "standards are set forth to determine if the issuance of a permit to . . . carry a pistol or revolver would be in the interest of public health, safety or welfare," and "(f)or those who wish to carry a pistol or revolver, permits will be required as they are under present New Jersey law"; and

WHEREAS, violations of existing laws, statutes and regulations are already criminal offenses, many being felonies; and

WHEREAS, gun control laws, including a plethora of current proposed legislation, are not evidence-based; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Supreme Court in <u>Burton v. Sills</u>, 53 N.J. 86, opined that "New Jersey's Gun Control Law is highly purposed and conscientiously designed toward preventing criminal and other unfit elements from acquiring firearms while enabling the fit elements of society to obtain them with minimal burdens and inconveniences"; and

WHEREAS, a law-abiding citizen of the State of New Jersey who possess a New Jersey Firearms Purchaser Identification card has met the burden of proof to be a law-abiding citizen and is immune from further legislation and laws that are in violation of the Constitution of the United States.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, Morris County, State of New Jersey, as follows:

The Township of Mount Olive Council declares to be a 2nd Amendment/Lawful Gun Owner Township as defined herein:

- a. The Mount Olive Township Council supports the rights of lawful gun owners to lawfully use firearms; to defend themselves, their loved ones and other innocents; to lawfully hunt to provide sustenance for their families; and to lawfully participate in shooting sports up to and including Olympic sports.
- b. The Mount Olive Township Council opposes further interference with, or abridging of, the rights of lawful gun owners.
- c. The Mount Olive Township Council opposes gun control, "gun safety" legislation, or "red flag laws," State, Federal or local.
- d. The Mount Olive Township Council espouses holding accountable the violent criminal offenders, rather than irrational and/or disproven attempts to control lawful tools of selfdefense, hunting and sport.

# SUPPORT FOR THE CELEBRATION OF THE 100<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE

WHEREAS, the year 2020 marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the United States Constitution, guaranteeing and protecting women's right to vote; and

WHEREAS, this centennial offers an opportunity to commemorate a milestone of democracy; that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the federal or state governments on account of gender; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey has had a long, storied history in the suffrage movement with New Jersey women playing a crucial role in pursing the rights of women to vote; and

WHEREAS, in 1776 women property owners were enfranchised under the New Jersey State Constitution, which was unique in the nation at the time. However, in 1807, the New Jersey Legislature eliminated the property requirement for voting rights and limited the ballot to white males; and

WHEREAS, in 1867 New Jersey residents Lucy Stone and Harry Blackwell organized the New Jersey Women Suffrage Association (NJWSA), devoted to gaining women's suffrage; and

WHEREAS, in 1909 New Jersey's First open air suffrage rallies were held in Orange and Newark, led by Dr. Emma O. Gantz and Martha Klatshchken with NJWSA collecting 5,000 signatures for a petition in support of the federal amendment guaranteeing and protecting women's constitutional right to vote; and

WHEREAS, although the 1912 state referendum on woman's suffrage was soundly defeated in the New Jersey Legislature a corner was turned for the New Jersey suffrage movement; and

**WHEREAS**, in 1913 an automobile rally led by "General" Rosalie Jones traveled through New Jersey on the way to Washington, D.C., in a Suffrage Parade of over 8,000 marchers with many New Jersey women including event organizer Alice Paul;

WHEREAS, in 1915 a second suffrage constitutional referendum was pursued in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts with active campaigns by many suffrage organizations, including the "Passing of the Torch of Liberty" via tug boats on the Hudson River from New York to New Jersey, but was defeated in all four states October 1915; and

WHEREAS, in 1917 New Jersey suffragists Allison Turnbull Hopkins, Julia Hulburt, Beatrice Reynolds Kinkead, and Minnie D. Abbott picketed in front of the White House as part of the Silent Sentinels and subsequently were arrested and imprisoned; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 1919 Congress passed the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment guaranteeing all American women the right to vote; and

**WHEREAS**, on February 9, 1920, New Jersey became the 29<sup>th</sup> state to ratify the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment granting women the right to vote; and

**WHEREAS**, shortly after the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment Margaret Laird and Jennie Van Ness were the first two women elected to the New Jersey Assembly in 1921 and in 1925 Rebecca Estelle Bourgeois Winston of Estell Manor was New Jersey's first woman mayor;

#### LEASE AGREEMENT

1. Term: Beginning: January 1, 2020

2. <u>Rental Space:</u> Mount Olive Senior Center

204 Flanders-Drakestown Road Mount Olive, New Jersey 07828

Non-exclusive use of approximately 2,000 square feet, commonly known as the Senior Center, plus associated kitchen space and equipment, rest rooms, office space, and storage closets as may be assigned by the Landlord.

- 3. <u>Frequency of Use:</u> Hours of 8:30 a.m. 2:30 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Upon prior written consent, which shall not be unreasonably withheld, Tenant will be allowed to use the rental space on special holidays at no additional cost.
- 4. <u>Permitted Use:</u> Nutrition Site operated by the Morris County Department of Human Services.
- 5. <u>Fixed Rent:</u> No rent payable in this lease. Includes utilities of electricity, heat, water, sewer, septic, snow removal, garbage removal. Landlord agrees that the Nutrition Site will be maintained to assure compliance with State and Local health regulations.
- 6. Security: None.
- 7. <u>Parking Spaces</u>: A minimum of two (2) Handicapped parking spaces must be made available in compliance with the Federal Section 504 Barrier Free Access Code.
- 8. No Assignment or Subletting: A one (1) year option to renew this lease may be made by joint agreement of Tenant and Landlord. In the event that either party wishes not to renew the lease, ninety (90) day intent to vacate will be forwarded to the other party in writing.

The parties hereby agree that either party will have the right to terminate this Lease Agreement, including any further renewals, upon sixty (60) days notice without further liability to either party. At the expiration of the sixty (60) day notice period, tenant agrees to vacate the premises and leave said premises in the same or better condition as when tenant first occupied said premises.

- 9. No Assignment or Subletting: The Tenant may not assign this lease nor sublet any part of the rental space without the Landlord's prior written consent.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>: The Tenant is self-insured, and will submit a Certificate of Insurance to Landlord.
- 11. Repair(s) to Facility: The Landlord is responsible for all interior and/or exterior facility repair costs. The Tenant will share repair cost(s) only where it can be shown that the repair has been caused by the neglect or willful act of the Tenant or on behalf of the tenant or where the Tenant has consented, in writing, to share in the repair costs.
- 12. <u>Condition of Rental Space</u>: The Tenant has inspected the space and accepts it as is. Tenant covenants that it will:
  - a. Maintain the space and all equipment in good repair and appearance.
  - b. Make all repairs necessary to space where it can be demonstrated the Tenant has caused damage through willful destruction or neglect.
  - c. Maintain the space in a neat, clean, safe, and sanitary order daily.
  - d. Do nothing to destroy, deface or damage any part of the space.
  - e. Promptly notify the Landlord when there are conditions which need repair.
  - f. Do nothing to change or alter the space without the Landlord's written consent.

#### 13. Landlord's Repair, Maintenance and Services

- a. The Landlord will maintain the building and rental space to ensure safe access ` of Nutrition Program participants to the facility.
- b. Where the space is shared with Landlord and used by someone other than Tenant, maintain and clean the space so that it is ready for use by Tenant.
- c. Make necessary repair and replacement of the plumbing, heating, electrical and other utility systems at its own expense, except when it can be demonstrated that the damage is caused by the neglect or willful act of Tenant.
- d. Provide heat, when and as required by law, during normal occupied hours.
- e. Provide cold and hot water at standard building temperatures.
- f. Provide electric current for lighting fixtures and electric outlets.
- g. Landlord is responsible for removing snow and ice and salting all common areas and walkways leading up to Nutrition Site entrance prior to hours of operation.
- 14. <u>Not a Joint Venture</u>: It is expressly understood and agreed that this Agreement shall not be construed as an Agreement of partnership, affiliation or a joint venture between the parties hereto.

- 15. <u>Governing Law:</u> This Agreement shall be governed by the Laws of the State of New Jersey.
- 16. <u>Supersedes Prior Leases</u>: This agreement cancels and supersedes all prior Agreements and understandings, oral and written, between the parties. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. It may be modified or amended only by written agreement, specifically referring hereto, and signed by the parties.

#### 17. Indemnification:

- A. In addition to the other rights and remedies of the parties herein, the Township of Mount Olive agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the County of Morris, including its employees and agents, from any and all liability and claims for damage or injury caused by, or resulting from, the negligent acts or omissions by the Township of Mount Olive personnel arising out of this Agreement or any of the obligation assumed by the Township of Mount Olive hereunder, provided it is determined by a Court having the appropriate jurisdiction that the Township of Mount Olive is solely responsible for such liability. In the event it is determined by a Court that the Township of Mount Olive is not solely responsible for said liability, then the Township of Mount Olive's liability shall be limited to that degree of liability determined by said Court to be the proportionate liability of the Township of Mount Olive. The Township of Mount Olive, upon notice from the County of Morris, shall resist and defend, at the expense of the Township of Mount Olive, such action or proceeding with counsel reasonably satisfactory to the County of Morris. In addition, at its option, the County of Morris may engage separate counsel to appear on its behalf in such action or proceeding without waiving its rights or the Township of Mount Olive's obligation under this paragraph.
- B. In addition to the other rights and remedies of the parties herein, the County of Morris agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Township of Mount Olive, including its officer, trustee, employees and agents, from any and all liability and claims for damages or injury caused by, or resulting from, the negligent acts or omissions by the County of Morris arising out of this Agreement or any of the obligations assumed by the County of Morris hereunder, provided it is determined by a Court having the appropriate jurisdiction that the County of Morris is solely responsible for such liability. In the event it is determined by Court that the County of Morris is not solely responsible for said liability. then the County of Morris's liability shall be limited to that degree of liability determined by said Court to be the proportionate liability of the County of Morris. THIS GENERAL RELEASE (the "Release") is made between Robert Hill and any legal representatives and agents (the "Releasor") and the Township of Mount Olive, including its agents, employees and representatives (the "Township") in connection with damage caused by a leak in the water service line to Releasor's residence located at 15 Hatakawana Terrace, Budd Lake, New Jersey 07828 on or about December 11, 2019, as set forth in a Notice of Tort Claim filed by Releasor with the Township on or about January 10, 2020. Releasor and the Township (collectively, the "Parties") desire to make a full and final settlement of any and all of Releasor's claims and potential claims against the Township, known or unknown, asserted or unasserted, based on any facts, events, acts or omissions, whether now known or unknown, occurring on or before the effective date of this Release, without any judicial, administrative, or arbitral resolution of them and without any admission with respect to any issues presented or capable of being presented.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, and intending to be legally bound, the undersigned Parties agree as follows:

1. <u>Non-Admission</u>. This Release is not, and shall not in any way be considered or construed as, an admission by the Township of any tortious conduct, or of any violation of any law, common law, or federal, state or local statute or regulation, or of any alleged duty owed by the Township to Releasor, or of any unlawful or wrongful acts whatsoever by the Township. The payment hereunder is made solely to avoid the inconvenience and cost of litigation and to resolve completely all of Releasor's claims

against the Township, known or unknown, asserted or unasserted, as more fully detailed in Paragraph 6, below.

- 2. <u>Cooperation</u>. Releasor agrees to cooperate fully in connection with any steps required to be taken as part of his obligations under this Release.
- 3. Promise Not to Sue. Releasor understands that this Release extinguishes any claims or potential claims as to the Township, and agrees not to file or revive any claims, or open a lawsuit in any way. Releasor further agrees not to file any other charges seeking damages with any state or federal agency against the Township and/or any of its current or former employees, agents or administrators. Releasor further agrees that neither he, nor any person, organization, agency, or other entity on his behalf, will file, charge, claim or sue, or cause to be filed, charged, claimed or sued, any lawsuit, legal proceeding, action, or claim of any nature with any court or agency (including any action for damages, attorneys fees, injunction, declaratory, monetary, equitable or other relief) against the Township, based on any matter, fact or event occurring prior to the effective date of this Release, whether now known or unknown, or involving any continuing effects of any acts or practices which may have arisen or occurred prior to the effective date of this Release, whether now known or unknown. Releasor understands and agrees that he will not be considered a prevailing party under any statute, common law, or otherwise as a result of this Release.
- 4. <u>Payments</u>. In exchange for the promises, Releases, and legal releases stated herein, and other good and valuable consideration, Releasor will be paid a lump sum of **One Thousand One Hundred Forty-Three Dollars and Twenty-One**Cents (\$1,143.21) within thirty (30) days from the Effective Date of this Release. The

Effective Date of this Release shall be the date upon which the Township receives Releasor's signed and notarized Release.

- 5. <u>Full and Complete Settlement</u>. Releasor agrees that the payment described in paragraph 4 will be received by Releasor in full and complete settlement, as more fully detailed in paragraph 6, below, of all known or unknown claims, asserted or unasserted, of Releasor allegedly arising out of any and all conduct or actions of the Township and/or relationship with the Township, as more fully detailed in Paragraph 6, below.
- 6. General Release and Waiver of all Claims by Releasor. In consideration for the payment and promises described in paragraph 4, and elsewhere in this Agreement, Releasor fully releases and forever discharges the Township and all of the Township's former or current directors, officers, administrators, trustees, shareholders, agents, supervisors, employees, attorneys, legal representatives, servants, insurers, any and all benefit plans, and successors and assigns, and each of them (collectively "the Township" and/or "Released Parties") of and from any and all claims, actions, causes of action, back pay, front pay, contracts, agreements, compensation, pay, promises, charges, judgments, grievances, obligations, rights, demands, debts, sums of money, salaries, wages, benefits, physical injury, pain, suffering, emotional distress, compensatory damages, punitive damages, attorneys' fees, expenses, costs, losses liabilities, damages, or accountings of whatever nature, whether known or unknown, disclosed or undisclosed, asserted or unasserted, in law or equity, contract or tort or otherwise (collectively, "Claim" or "Claims"), through the effective date of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, and all tort Claims or contract Claims or Claims for general damages, and any and all Claims

arising under, made, regarding, or involving: any federal, state or local laws or under the common law; violations of any federal, state or local laws or ordinances; any and all grievances, or demands for mediation or arbitration, or Claims or demands under the Township's policies and procedures; and any and all Claims asserted, or which could have been asserted, in a state court Lawsuit referenced above, including any Claims against any current or former agents or employees of the Township.

Releasor hereby specifically waives, releases and gives up all Claims and rights, as described in the preceding paragraph, whether now known or unknown, which he has or may have, against the Township and the Released Parties, based on any fact, act, event, or omission, whether now known or unknown, occurring before the Effective Date of this Agreement. Releasor specifically waives all claims to attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses from the Township, including all claims for reimbursement to the Township or their attorneys, agents, or family members, of any attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses he has incurred or paid, or which were paid on his behalf.
- 8. <u>Applicable Law and Severability</u>. This Release shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of New Jersey, except where federal law controls. Should any provision of this Release be declared or determined by any Court to be illegal

or invalid, the validity of the remaining parts, terms or provisions shall not be affected thereby and said illegal or invalid part, term, or provision shall be deemed not to be a part of this Release.

### CALENDAR YEAR 2020 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE

#### AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK

(N.J.S.A. 40A-4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive in the County of Morris finds its advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2020 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Council hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget of said year, amounting to \$228,746 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED**, by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, in the County of Morris, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2020 budget year, the final appropriations of the Township of Mount Olive shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 1.0%, amounting to \$228,746, and that the CY 2020 municipal budget for the Township of Mount Olive be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED**, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

#### ORDINANCE # - 2020

## AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE AMENDING ORDINANCE #25-19 WHICH ESTABLISHED SALARIES FOR THE MAYOR, COUNCIL, DEPARTMENT HEADS AND OTHER EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Faulkner Act, under which the Township of Mount Olive operates, the Township Council is required to adopt, pursuant to NJSA 40a:9-165, an ordinance annually to establish the salaries for all employees; and

WHEREAS, under the Faulkner form of government the Mayor has the right to establish the salaries for those who are designated as exempt employees and, therefore, this ordinance memorializes the salaries for exempt employees as specified by the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council wishes to establish equitable salaries, subject of course to the discretion of the Township Council to establish salaries to be paid in any given year, to those municipal employees.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris, as follows:

#### Section 1:

There is hereby established the following salaries for the positions listed below for the year 2020 retroactive to 1/1/2020:

Mayor	\$20,000
Council President	\$11,000
Council Members	\$10,000

#### Section 2:

The salaries set forth in this ordinance have been arrived at after careful consideration and have been selected for those individuals who presently hold the specific positions listed. The Township Council reserves the right to fix the salary for replacement personnel or new hires in the following positions: Department Heads, Township Clerk and Statutory Employees.

#### Section 3:

This ordinance shall supersede all prior ordinances which have been adopted by the Township Council establishing salaries and salary ranges for the above listed employees.

#### Section 4:

All employees covered by this ordinance enrolled in the insurance plan offered by the Township will be required to make a medical contribution. Effective January 1, 2020, the health insurance contribution shall be calculated depending on the NJ State Health Benefits Plan chosen by the employee. NJ Direct Horizon 2030 plan will require an employee contribution of 1.5% of their base salary. If an employee chooses a NJ Direct Horizon plan other than the NJ Direct Horizon 2030 plan the employee will only make a contribution equal to the difference between the cost of the NJ Direct Horizon 2030 plan and the chosen Horizon plan.

#### Section 5:

This ordinance shall take affect in accordance with law.
