1. Authorizing purchases off New Jersey State Contracts pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:11-12 for calendar year 2020 (Spectrum Communications)

As per the local public contracts law, the Township desires to purchase Radio Communication Equipment and Accessories from Spectrum Communications via a NJ State Contract.

2. Authorizing the purchase of a Pierce Fire Apparatus off the Houston-Galveston Area Council Cooperative (Fire & Safety Services)

As per the local public contracts law, The Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive does hereby authorize the issuance of a contract to Fire & Safety Services, South Plainfield, NJ. for the purchase of a Pierce Fire Apparatus base model VA09-Arrow XT 100FT Md-Mount Tower Ladder with a trade-in allowance for the Flanders Fire Department's existing E-One 95' Aerial Platform of \$100,000.00. This amount has been deducted from the quoted price of \$1,453,929.95 bringing the total cost for the new Pierce apparatus to \$1,353,929.95.

3. Authorizing the cancellation of a grant balance

The CFO recommends cancelling a grant balance that remains on the books in the amount of \$150.17 for the Y/E Driver Sober or Get Pulled Over program.

4. Authorizing the Tax Collector to prepare and mail estimated tax bills in accordance with PL 1994 Chp. 72

Since the tax rate has not yet been certified by the County and third quarter installment of taxes are due in August, the CFO and Tax Collector have computed an estimated tax levy in accordance with the law for 2020 to be \$105,871,717 which sets the estimated tax rate at \$3.30

5. Authorizing the release of various bonds and escrow posted by Bouka Associates, LLC for development of the property designated as Block 3109, Lots 5,6,7,9 and 10 (Budd Lake Diner)

Township Engineer indicated that he has visited the site, found the bonded work to be complete, and has no objection to release of the bonds and escrow conditioned upon the posting of a two-year maintenance bond in the amount of \$1,845.00 and the submittal of an "as constructed" plan in accordance with Section 550-20K of the Township Code.

6. Authorizing the award of contract to Reiner Group, Inc. for Bid #04-2020 Maintenance and Repair Services for Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditions Systems for Mount Olive Township facilities

As per the local public contracts law, the Township advertised and received two (2) bids for HVAC maintenance. The QPA recommends awarded a two year contract with the right to extend for two additional one year periods to Reiner Group, Inc. The maximum dollar amount for the two year contract is \$42,000 with a 10% discount on parts and supplies.

7. Resolution of the Township of Mount Olive, in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey, Authorizing Release of Bonds Posted by KDS Aggregates, LLC for Improvements to Waterloo Valley Road in Connection with Development of the Property Located at 46 Waterloo Valley Road. (Block 701, Lot 5)

The Township Engineer has visited the site and confirmed that the bonded work is complete and has no objection to releasing the bonds conditioned upon the posting of a two-year maintenance bond in the amount of \$9,600.00.

RESOLUTION # 2020 -147

RESOLUTION URGING THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY TO PROVIDE DIRECT STABILIZATION FUNDING TO MORRIS COUNTY FROM THE CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Township Committee of Montville Township in the County of Morris, one of the 39 municipalities within Morris County, New Jersey, supports the following:

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 Pandemic has severely impacted the population and economy of the entire world; and

WHEREAS, the County of Morris has to date been severely impacted by this virus with 309 residents who have lost their life thus far during this crisis; and

WHEREAS, due to this pandemic the County of Morris has had to undertake immediate plans of action to both identify those individuals infected with the virus and to initiate unanticipated costly yet critical strategic plans relative to the prevention of the continued spread of the virus inclusive of but not limited to:

- > Initiated the Morris County Office of Emergency Management and Public Health Response staff efforts beginning in late February.
- Established outside COVID-19 testing sites at Morristown Medical Center, Chilton Hospital, Dover General Hospital, St. Clare's Hospital, and the Zufall Clinic helping to ensure that potentially infected individuals remain outside the perimeter of those critical facilities.
- > Contracted with an Epidemiologist.
- Established a COVID-19 testing site at the County College of Morris last month with no support of personal protection equipment, testing kits, or other materials from the State of New Jersey as supplied to other Counties.
- > Supported the needs of both the Atlantic HealthCare Hospital System and the Prime HealthCare Hospital System.
- Accepted and medically treated out of County adult inmates, juvenile offenders, and Children in Crisis, in the respective Morris County facilities, resulting in the spread of the virus within the County's Correctional Facility, Juvenile Detention, and Youth Shelter operational staff, further resulting in significant staff illness, significant overtime costs, and significant sanitizing costs.
- Stretched professional resources beyond the realm of reasonability by serving as the Medical Examiner for three Counties.
- Required to accept over 60 COVID-19 positive residents of long-term care facilities from outside of Morris County as directed by the New Jersey Department of Health.
- > Established multiple temporary morgues within the various hospitals.
- Responding to the increased demand and associated costs relative to the Morris County 911 Communication Center, processing over 8,132 calls since the initial Executive Order 104.
- Processing, responding to, and incurring the related costs to over 1,937 EMS emergencies of which 901 were determined to be potential COVID-19 responses, requiring full personal protection equipment since the beginning of the pandemic.
- Established and supporting temporary housing facilities for Community Based Human Service residential providers addressing the needs of the Homeless, Division of Developmental Disabilities, and Behavioral Health populations.
- Redirected the Senior Nutrition Program from a congregate and home-delivered operation to solely home-delivered operation, significantly increasing operational costs.
- Continuing to provide life-sustaining transportation services via the County's paratransit program, placing staff at considerable risk as well as incurring significant sanitizing expenses relative to all transportation vehicles.
- Addressed the increased demand for Temporary Assistance services to increased applications for programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), while dealing with reduced staff due to COVID-19 and office closures to sanitize their space.

- Because the Federal Government's emergency stockpile of personal protective equipment was depleted and understanding that the State would not be receiving further shipments, required us to expend exorbitant funds to purchase said personal protective equipment for local healthcare and first responder disciplines.
- Provided Emergency Funding to the four local Food Pantries that operate five days per week.
- Provided Hazard Pay to first responders and front-line staff.
- Established a secure facility for homeless positive COVID-19 individuals who do not require hospitalization, to recover from the virus.
- Further, within this secure facility for homeless COVID-19 individuals, ensured the provision of medical, nutritional, transportation and social services; and

WHEREAS, \$3.44 billion has been allocated to the State of New Jersey from the Coronavirus Relief Fund, established by the CARES Act, which was signed into law by the President on March 27, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Fund provides a direct payment to the State of New Jersey, as well as provided over 1 Billion Dollars of direct payments to New Jersey counties with populations greater than 500,000 individuals; and

WHEREAS, Morris County, with a population that is just 1.6% below the threshold of 500,000, is not expected to receive a direct payment from the federal government, and thus will have to rely solely on a share of the state's allotment; and

WHEREAS, elected officials representing Morris County including Congresswoman Sherrill, Senator Codey, and Senator Bucco have expressed this inequity to the State of New Jersey.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Montville of the County of Morris, strongly urges the State of New Jersey to provide direct stabilization funding to Morris County from the Coronavirus Relief Fund in an amount consistent with the allocation made to counties that have populations slightly over 500,000, by utilizing the formula applied through the CARES Act. This funding is critical to Morris County's ability to continue its efforts to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and work to keep our constituents safe.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the federal government adopt an aid funding threshold reflecting the true impact of COVID-19 for all future allocations, based on metrics indicative of the negative effects the virus has had on jurisdiction and the level of actions taken to combat the threats.

This resolution should be shared with the President of the United States Donald J. Trump, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi, and the Leaders of the United States Senate Mitch McConnell and Chuck Schumer, United States Senators Cory A. Booker and Robert Menendez, Congresswoman Mikie Sherrill and Congressman Tom Malinowski. This resolution should also be shared with the Governor of the State of New Jersey and New Jersey legislative representatives to the County of Morris. Additionally, the resolution should be shared with the New Jersey Association of Counties for distribution to all of the counties in the State of New Jersey and all of the mayors of municipalities within Morris County.

This Resolution will take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 240 ZONING OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BYRAM CODE

Purpose Statement: Section 240-40 General requirements; driveways was repealed by Ordinance 10-2017 and requirements were placed in Section 215-30.2. Inadvertently, the change omitted any reference to residential zones for which it was previously intended. This ordinance corrects the omission by adding Section 240-40, General Requirements; residential driveways.

WHEREAS, Section 240-40 previously outlined parking requirements for all zones in Byram Township; and

WHEREAS, the revision to our Code Book made by Ordinance 10-2017, relocated the off-street parking requirements into Section 215-30.2; and

WHEREAS, Section 215-30.2 does not reflect requirements for residential driveways; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to outline general requirements for residential driveways;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of Byram, County of Sussex, State of New Jersey, that:

SECTION 1: Add the following into Chapter 240 of the Byram Township Code:

240:40. General requirements; residential driveways.

1. Driveway Regulations:

- A. Driveway location. All entrance and exit driveways shall be located to provide maximum safety with minimum disruption of traffic on the street. Where practicable, no part of any driveway entrance or exit to a public street shall be closer than 50 feet to an intersection. Where the frontage of the lot is too narrow to permit the specified distance, the driveway shall be located as far from the intersection as possible.
- B. The number of driveway openings provided from a residential dwelling on any one street shall not exceed one driveway opening for frontage of less than 200 feet and shall not exceed two driveway openings for frontage on such street of over 200 feet.
 - All driveways shall provide safe access to a residential dwelling and shall have openings onto a street that will provide adequate site distances for vehicles entering and leaving said driveway.

2. Driveway Specifications:

A. All off-street parking areas shall be constructed of a minimum of six (6) inches of compacted quarry processed stone, dense graded aggregate or other acceptable material over a compacted

subgrade. Where the grade of the driveway exceeds 5% in grade, the driveway must be paved with a minimum of two (2) inches of Hot Mix Asphalt surface course, or approved equal, over a base of a minimum of four (4) inches of compacted quarry processed stone, dense graded aggregate or other acceptable base material. Alternative pervious pavements are permitted provided that the function, safety and durability of the pavement is acceptable to the Township Zoning Officer and/or Township Engineer.

- B. No driveway shall at any point exceed 15% grade.
- C. Within 25 feet of the residential dwelling to be served, no driveway shall exceed 4% grade.
- D. Within 20 feet of the right-of-way, no driveway shall exceed 2% grade.
- E. Dimensions of driveway width shall be a minimum of 12 feet and a maximum of 13 feet. This excludes the portion of the driveway near the residential dwelling which may be increased in width to allow for proper access to garages, parking and turn around areas.
- 3. All applicants seeking to install a driveway shall obtain a zoning permit and comply with the provisions of § 240-11 of this chapter.

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY.

If any provision of this Ordinance, or the application of any such provision to any person or circumstances, shall be held invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance to the extent it can be given effect, or the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby, and to this extent the provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

SECTION 3. REPEALER.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances which are inconsistent with any provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to the extent of such inconsistencies.


SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.

TOWNSHIP OF HOPEWELL CUMBERLAND COUNTY STATE OF NEW JERSEY RESOLUTION #20-42

WHEREAS, rural areas of the State of New Jersey are serviced by service providers with respect to aerial line high-speed internet service; and

WHEREAS, having access to aerial line high-speed internet service is a necessary and vital part of living in today's society; and

WHEREAS, the recent pandemic of COVID-19 further illustrates just how vital access to aerial line high-speed internet has become to society, especially during times of crisis or emergencies and how not having access to aerial line high-speed internet has the potential to cripple a community, particularly a rural one, denying the community the capacity for remote student learning and remote working arrangements with a resident's employer;

AND FURTHERMORE, that during a time of crisis not having access to aerial line high-speed internet has the potential to shut down all functions of government by denying essential employees and elected officials from the ability to work, communicate, distribute information, conduct meetings, and perform the other requirements of a functioning government through remote capabilities; and

WHEREAS, Hopewell Township believes that the service providers of aerial line high-speed internet in the State of New Jersey are more than capable of and financially sound enough to achieve a 100% rate of aerial line high-speed internet accessibility but choose not to pursue that goal unless forced to through regulation because the providers feel it is not profitable; and

WHEREAS, not having access to aerial line high-speed internet service is a plight on students, reducing their educational opportunities and ability to learn in a modern world; and

WHEREAS, not having access to aerial line high-speed internet service could potentially have life and death consequences for the elderly or those with various health complications; and

WHEREAS, not having access to aerial line high-speed internet service causes a great burden to businesses, places them at a disadvantage, and reduces chances for economic development in rural areas; and

WHEREAS, not having access to aerial line high-speed internet service can cause rural healthcare facilities to shut down because they cannot access required networks to function, thereby further creating negative impacts on New Jersey residents' health; and

WHEREAS, Hopewell Township's successful commitment to farmland preservation has delivered to Hopewell Township the unintended penalty of being good stewards of the environment through farmland preservation while preventing Hopewell Township from ever having the population density to cost-justify a telecommunications infrastructure build out in the Township; and

WHEREAS, nearly 95% of Hopewell Township in Cumberland County is zoned for agricultural use and, 32% of the agriculturally zoned lands have already been enrolled in permanent farmland preservation with more farms in the preservation pipeline; and

WHEREAS, Hopewell Township's good stewardship of the environment by according a high priority to farmland and open space preservation should be rewarded, not penalized, with some <u>quid pro quo</u> consideration

requiring deployment of aerial line high-speed internet access to the farms, businesses and residents of Hopewell Township; and

WHEREAS, other rural municipalities experience this same burden due to their rural characteristics and environmental stewardship; and

WHEREAS, Hopewell Township is desirous of assisting and cooperating with other public entities and State officials to pursue a petition before the Board of Public Utilities to enact regulations requiring a 100% rate of aerial line high-speed internet accessibility in each individual municipality throughout the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, unless the Board of Public Utilities requires service providers of aerial line high-speed internet to provide 100% aerial line high-speed internet access in Hopewell Township and all municipalities throughout New Jersey, the State will have unintentionally subverted the public's significant investment in farmland and open space preservation by not allowing those preserved farm businesses to be economically competitive and viable over the long term.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE Township Committee of the Township of Hopewell in Cumberland County that the Board of Public Utilities is requested to order all service providers of aerial line high-speed internet to provide aerial line high-speed internet service to all municipalities throughout the State with each municipality being afforded a 100% rate of aerial line high-speed internet accessibility; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that our State representatives use their authority to require service providers of aerial line high-speed internet to achieve a 100% rate of high-speed internet access for each individual municipality throughout the State of New Jersey; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the clerk for the Township of Hopewell be directed to send a copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State of New Jersey, the Senate President of the New Jersey State Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly of the State of New Jersey, the Cumberland County Board of Chosen Freeholders, and the Board of Public Utilities; and

BE IT FURTHERMORE RESOLVED, that the clerk for the Township of Hopewell be directed to send a copy of this resolution to the clerks of all 565 municipalities in the State, encouraging them to pass similar resolutions so that during times of crisis and emergency all New Jersey residents have access to the vital resource of aerial line high-speed internet access thus allowing employees to work remotely, healthcare providers to function, governments to continue to function ensuring the health, safety, and welfare of residents, and also so that all children in the State of New Jersey have an equal opportunity to access information critical to furthering their educations.

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The Department has finalized the Clean Water and Drinking Water Intended Use Plans (IUP) for 2021 and are now available on https://www.nj.gov/dep/dwq/cwpl.htm. The New Jersey Water Bank (NJWB), which administers New Jersey's State Revolving Fund, is a partnership between the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and the New Jersey Infrastructure Bank (NJIB) to provide low-cost financing for the design, construction, and implementation of projects that help to protect, maintain and improve water quality and projects to ensure safe drinking water.

The priorities and policies of the NJWB are established through this Intended Use Plan (IUP). Examples of projects eligible for financing under the Clean Water IUP would include a wide variety of wastewater treatment works, stormwater management, land acquisition, and landfill activities. Projects eligible for financing under the Drinking Water IUP would include a variety of drinking water treatment, including projects to address lead exposure in drinking water, violations of the maximum contaminant levels, unregulated contaminants, and acute health effects (e.g. Surface Water Treatment Rule requirements).

What's New?

Clean Water IUP: One of the highlights is the set aside of approximately \$10M in principal forgiveness for projects throughout the state that will eliminate, prevent or reduce documented occurrences of shellfish bed downgrades, beach closings and advisories due to the presence of harmful algal blooms (HABs). The Department has also revised the Program's Affordability Criteria to better identify applicants that would have difficulty financing projects without additional subsidization.

Drinking Water IUP: A few changes would include, 50% principal forgiveness and 50% funding from the I-Bank at the AAA market rate for lead service line replacement for eligible water systems; 90% principal forgiveness for projects designed to address lead exposure in drinking water (ex. installation of corrosion control treatment) for eligible water systems serving a population of ≤1,000; maintaining Base Program Rates capped at \$25 million (per applicant/per year); and funding on a readiness-to-proceed basis for those projects in the fundable range based on project ranking which will ensure the high priority public health projects will be allowed to move forward on a readiness to proceed basis with the funds available.

Re: Extension of Municipal Tonnage Grant (MTG) application deadline to July 1, 2020

As you know, on March 9, 2020, Governor Philip D. Murphy issued Executive Order #103 (EO 103) declaring the COVID-19 pandemic to be both a Public Health Emergency and State of Emergency in New Jersey. EO 103 authorized and empowered the executive head of any agency or instrumentality of the State Government with authority to waive, suspend or modify any existing rule where the enforcement of which would be detrimental to the public welfare during this emergency. In accordance with EO 103, on April 13, 2020, Commissioner McCabe signed A Notice of Rule Waiver/Modification/Suspension and Administrative Order No. 2020-05 which authorized temporary amendments of certain provisions of the Recycling Rules at N.J.A.C. 7:26A provided the Department finds such action to be: (1) necessary to ensure the continued appropriate management of solid and hazardous waste and recyclable materials and the services that support the same; (2) narrowly tailored to include only those regulatory modifications necessary to address circumstances created by or directly related to the COVID-19 pandemic; (3) applied consistently to similar situated entities and individuals; (4) limited to the duration of EO 103; and (5) with notice of any regulatory modifications provided on the Department's website.

The Department is aware that the necessary COVID-19 restrictions and limitations on gathering have made it difficult or impossible to collect and submit the 2019 recycling data to submit complete, accurate MTG applications by the regulatory due date of April 30, 2020.

Therefore, in accordance with Administrative Order No. 2020-05, the Department is extending the April 30, 2020 due date under 7:26-15.5(b) for submitting the 2019 MTG applications to July 1, 2020. Complete applications, consistent with the MTG Guide, are now due to the Department no later than July 1, 2020.

This narrowly tailored extension for all eligible applicants is necessary to ensure the continued management of solid and hazardous waste because the preparation of applications requires significant effort by municipalities and relies on information from other entities, all of whom may be impacted by COVID-19, and MTGs provide much needed funding for the municipalities to manage their local recycling programs. This extension further is limited to 60 days to provide relief within the duration of EO 103 and will be posted on the Department's COVID-19 Regulatory Compliance page (https://www.nj.gov/dep/covid19regulatorycompliance/) as well as the Recycling Municipal Tonnage Grant and Reporting Forms page (https://www.nj.gov/dep/dshw/resource/Tonnage/index.htm).

Because the extended application deadline is the same as the July 1 statutory deadline for submission of recycling tonnage reports, applicants will not be afforded an opportunity to submit supplemental information updating MTG reports or data. Accordingly, all information required for a complete application, including 2019 recycling data is required to be received by the Department no later than July 1, 2020. Failure to comply with the deadline of July 1st will disqualify you for a 2019 MTG grant.

DEP is extending the grace period for submission of certain monitoring and submittal deadlines set forth in individual Air Permits to allow facilities to focus their attention on the highest priorities, without compromising any public health standards, and while continuing to meet the statutory, regulatory, and permit requirements intended to ensure the protection of public health, safety and the environment. - Our state's diverse ethnicities and faith-based organizations make New Jersey unique. To make sure **EVERYONE** in our great state is represented, it's important to complete the #2020Census.
- Census data helps determine where more than \$45 billion in annual federal funding goes in New Jersey. So having an accurate count of our diverse population can impact planning and funding for programs and services for specific groups.
- Census data informs everything from promoting equal employment opportunities to assessing racial disparities in health. Race data is critical for the basic research behind many policy decisions.
- New Jersey is one of the most diverse states in the country.
- We are a state that embraces our total diversity whether in our diverse ethnic communities, our multiple religious communities, our disabilities community, our LGBTQ community wherever it exits.
- Faith leaders play an integral role in our diverse community:
 - o In some of the hardest to reach communities, they are the most trusted voices. Faith leaders can help encourage congregants to complete the Census, so N.J. can gain greater access to federal funding for health, education, food and transportation, to ensure N.J. is represented fairly in Congress and at the state level.
 - You can help make sure the most vulnerable are counted.
- Nationally, New Jersey is one of the top 5 states for the highest percentage of immigrants in the population.
 - o More than 1 in 5 N.J. residents are immigrants, the majority of whom are naturalized U.S. citizens.
 - o 1 in 6 native-born N.J. residents have at least one parent who is an immigrant.
 - The top 5 countries for immigrants living in New Jersey are: India, Dominican Republic, Mexico, the Philippines and South Korea.
- There are over 150 languages spoken in New Jersey, with the most common (besides English) being Spanish, Chinese languages, Tagalog, Korean, Portuguese, Gujarati and Hindi.
 - Almost 1/3 of N.J. residents are bilingual, and Spanish is the most common language other than English, with 1 in 6 people speaking it.

- O There are 6 cities in New Jersey where 80% or more of the population speak another language at home Union City, West New York, Palisades Park, Guttenberg, East Newark and Perth Amboy.
- New Jersey has 3 officially recognized tribes: the Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Indians (Bridgeton), the Powhatan Renape Nation (Rancocas) and the Ramapough Lenape Indian Nation (Mahwah).
- We invite you to share our posts about the importance of accurately capturing New Jersey's diverse population. Share our video, share one of our posts, or share your own post about why residents should complete the Census.
- Complete the Census at 2020CENSUS.GOV.

On April 6, 2020, the Division of Water Quality (DWQ) noticed a public hearing announcement for the FY2020 NJDPES Annual Fee Report and Assessment of Fees in the New Jersey Register (52 N.J.R. 811(a)) and Times of Trenton. The public hearing is scheduled for 9:00 am on May 6, 2020 and the location was identified as the 3rd Floor Large Conference Room at 401 East State Street building in Trenton, NJ. However, in light of the unprecedented circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic, including the need to restrict unnecessary travel and adopt/adhere to social distancing practices, the public hearing will no longer be held in Trenton. Rather, the hearing will be conducted virtually via the NJDEP's video conferencing software (i.e. Microsoft Teams). The time and date of the hearing remain unchanged. A link to the virtual public hearing will be provided on the Department's NJPDES fees website (i.e. https://www.nj.gov/dep/dwq/njpdesfees.html) the morning of the hearing. The hearing will remain open until 10:00 AM or until all testimony has been heard.

Prior to entering the hearing, participants are strongly encouraged to read the following information and guidelines:

- Access to the public hearing is available on your computer or mobile device through either the Microsoft Teams application or the device's web browser.
- The web browsers that best support Microsoft Teams meetings are Internet Explorer 11, Microsoft Edge, Chrome, and Firefox.
- The hearing will begin promptly at the designated starting time of 9:00 am.
- The hearing will be moderated by a NJDEP representative.
- **Prior to entering the hearing**, participants will be provided a field to enter their name. In order to achieve an accurate record of attendees to the hearing, the NJDEP is requesting that, in the provided field, participants type their full name and the organization that they represent.
- As a courtesy to other people testifying, participants will be muted until they are called upon by the NJDEP hearing officer/moderator to testify. At that time, participants will be expected to unmute their microphones to provide testimony.
- If an attendee to the public hearing would like to provide testimony, they should notify the NJDEP moderator/hearing officer of their interest by typing their name and the name of the organization that they represent in the conversation box for the Microsoft Teams virtual meeting room. When called upon for testimony, participants will be asked to re-state this information.
- The hearing will be recorded for public record. Although the virtual hearing allows for video testimony, it is not required. If you do not wish to submit video testimony, please turn off your video feed during the hearing. However, please be sure that your microphone on to testify
- At the beginning of the meeting, a NJDEP representative will provide a brief demonstration on how to unmute/mute your microphones, how to turn off your video feed, and how to access the hearing's conversation box.

EXTENSIONS FOR MONITORING AND EMISSION REPORTS REQUIREMENTS FOR AIR QUALITY PERMITS

WHO IS AFFECTED BY THIS ADVISORY?

All entities with Title V Operating Permits, Preconstruction Permits, or General Permits (collectively Air Permits) issued by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) whose operations are affected or potentially affected by circumstances created by or directly related to the Public Health Emergency declared by Governor Phil Murphy in Executive Order No. 103 (EO 103) due to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic who may require additional time to meet certain monitoring or reporting requirements identified herein.

WHY IS DEP ISSUING THIS ADVISORY?

DEP acknowledges that the unprecedented circumstances of the COVID-19 outbreak, including the need to restrict unnecessary travel, adopt strict social distancing practices, and reduce staff on site to only those necessary to ensure continuity of essential operations may create limitations for regulated entities possessing Air Permits, largely due to workforce reductions. To account for these limitations, in accordance with N.J.A.C. 7:27A-3.10(q) through (t), DEP is extending the grace period for submission of certain monitoring and submittal deadlines set forth in individual Air Permits. Such extension will allow these entities to focus their attention on the highest priorities, without compromising any public health standards, and while continuing to meet the statutory, regulatory, and permit requirements intended to ensure the protection of public health, safety and the environment.

While DEP will permit an extension on submission of these documents, all underlying monitoring and data collection must continue and nothing in this advisory shall be construed to relax any monitoring or data collection requirement of any statute, regulation, permit or approval.

WHAT IS DEP DOING?

For the above stated reasons, DEP is extending the grace period for submission of State-only air permit monitoring and submittal requirements as follows:

WHEREAS, in light of the dangers posed by Coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-19"), I issued Executive Order No. 103 on March 9, 2020, the facts and circumstances of which are adopted by reference herein, which declared both a Public Health Emergency and State of Emergency; and

WHEREAS, on April 7, 2020, I issued Executive Order No. 119 (2020), the facts and circumstances of which are adopted by reference herein, which declared that the Public Health Emergency declared in Executive Order No. 103 (2020) continues to exist; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with N.J.S.A. App. A:9-34 and -51, I reserve the right to utilize and employ all available resources of State government to protect against the emergency created by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as COVID-19 continued to spread across New Jersey and an increasing number of individuals required medical care or hospitalization, I issued a series of Executive Orders pursuant to my authority under the New Jersey Civilian Defense and Disaster Control Act and the Emergency Health Powers Act, to protect the public health, safety, and welfare against the emergency created by COVID-19, including Executive Order Nos. 104-132 (2020), the facts and circumstances of which are all adopted by reference herein; and

WHEREAS, among these actions, and in recognition that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") has advised that social mitigation strategies for combatting COVID-19 require every effort to reduce the rate of community spread of the disease and that COVID-19 spreads most frequently through person-to-person contact when individuals are within six feet or less of one another, I issued Executive Order No. 107 (2020) to order steps to mitigate community spread of COVID-19; and

contact through social distancing, Executive Order No. 107 (2020) required, with limited exceptions, New Jersey residents to remain in their place of residence, cancelled all gatherings, and closed non-essential recreational businesses, including golf courses; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 108 (2020) ordered that no municipality, county, or any other agency or political subdivision of this State shall enact or enforce any order, rule, regulation, ordinance, or resolution which will or might in any way conflict with any of the provisions of Executive Order No. 107 (2020), or which will or might in any way interfere with or impede its achievement, or the achievement of Administrative Orders issued as authorized by Executive Order No. 107 (2020); and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 108 (2020) contained an exception allowing municipalities and counties to, among other things, impose additional restrictions at municipal or county parks; and

WHEREAS, due to increased public interaction and gatherings at county and State parks throughout the State, I issued Executive Order No. 118 (2020) on April 7, 2020, which closed State Parks and Forests, as well as county parks, to the public in order to further social distancing requirements; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 118 (2020) defined "State Parks and Forests" as all State parks, forests, recreation areas, historic sites, marinas, golf courses, botanical gardens, and other lands, waters, and facilities assigned to the State Park Service in the Division of Parks and Forestry of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP); and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 118 (2020) superseded Executive Order No. 108 (2020) to the extent that Executive Order No. 108 (2020) had allowed counties to impose additional restrictions at county

Order Nos. 122 and 125 (2020), respectively, which imposed additional mitigation requirements on essential businesses and transportation carriers to ensure that they are following public health guidelines regarding social distancing, cleaning, sanitizing, and hygiene practices; and

WHEREAS, after the issuance of Executive Order No. 118 (2020), the CDC issued guidance for visiting parks and recreational facilities, recognizing that parks and open spaces provide people a vital way to keep the mind and body healthy; and

WHEREAS, the CDC guidance regarding the safe access of parks advises individuals to stay six feet away from other visitors, avoid use of playgrounds, decline participation in organized sports and recreational activities, and visit parks close to home to limit travel distances; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey is no longer seeing an increase in the number of new cases of COVID-19 that are being reported on a daily basis, and the State is experiencing a decrease in the number of individuals visiting emergency departments and being admitted to hospitals for COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as New Jersey makes continued progress in its fight against COVID-19, it is appropriate to ensure that New Jerseyans can safely enjoy outdoor recreation, with reasonable restrictions that limit the spread of COVID-19, as a way to enhance physical and mental health, while maintaining the overall social distancing and mitigation requirements in place to protect the health, safety, and welfare of New Jersey residents; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 118 (2020) balanced the need to respond to the increasing new cases and hospitalizations with the need to provide people with outdoor recreation opportunities for the

outdoor recreation opportunities; and

WHEREAS, as public health experts have observed, even as the State is able to allow passive recreation outdoors with reasonable restriction, the ongoing pandemic means that other brick and mortar retail and recreation businesses, and other businesses in which it is more challenging to comply with social distancing measures, are not ready to be reopened at this time; and

WHEREAS, the Constitution and statutes of the State of New Jersey, particularly the provisions of N.J.S.A. 26:13-1 et seq., N.J.S.A. App. A: 9-33 et seq., N.J.S.A. 38A:3-6.1, and N.J.S.A. 38A:2-4 and all amendments and supplements thereto, confer upon the Governor of the State of New Jersey certain emergency powers, which I have invoked;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, PHILIP D. MURPHY, Governor of the State of New Jersey, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and by the Statutes of this State, do hereby ORDER and DIRECT:

- 1. All State Parks and Forests shall open to the public to engage in the following passive recreational activities in which social distancing can be readily achieved:
 - a. Fishing;
 - b. Hunting;
 - c. Boating;
 - d. Canoeing;
 - e. Hiking;
 - f. Walking;
 - g. Running or jogging;
 - h. Biking;
 - i. Birding; and

State Parks and Forests:

- a. Picnic areas;
- b. Playgrounds;
- c. Exercise stations and equipment;
- d. Chartered watercraft services and rentals;
- e. Swimming;
- f. Pavilions;
- g. Restrooms; and
- h. Other buildings or facilities, including, but not limited to, visitor centers, interpretive centers, and interior historical sites.
- 3. The following recommendations and policies shall apply to all State Parks and Forests:
 - a. Employees and visitors should wear cloth face coverings while in the State Park or Forest in all settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain, except where doing so would inhibit that individual's health or where the individual is under two years of age;
 - b. Available parking must be limited at all State Parks and Forests at 50% of the maximum capacity at one time, and visitors shall be prohibited from parking in undesignated areas, including in roadways and other undesignated areas;
 - c. No picnicking shall be allowed, including on picnic blankets in signed picnic areas, and no picnic blankets, chairs, coolers, and other such personal property shall be carried into any State Parks and Forests;

107 (2020), visitors must practice social distancing and stay six feet apart whenever practicable,

excluding immediate family members, caretakers,

household members, or romantic partners;

e. No organized or contact activities or sports shall be allowed; and

- f. Consistent with Paragraph 5 of Executive Order No. 107 (2020), gatherings of individuals, including in parks, are prohibited.
- 4. The operative paragraphs of Executive Order No. 118 (2020) are hereby superseded in full. Paragraph 9 of Executive Order No. 107 (2020), as clarified by paragraph 4 of New Jersey Office of Emergency Management (NJOEM) Administrative Order No. 2020-6, is hereby superseded to the extent it closes golf courses as a non-essential recreational business, but otherwise remains in full force and effect.
- 5. County parks shall open to the public with the exception of those parks closed to the public by county order prior to the effective date of Executive Order No. 118 (2020). Such parks may be reopened by order of the county of jurisdiction.
- 6. All recreational campgrounds and transient camp sites at campgrounds shall remain closed to the public. Residential campgrounds, which includes mobile home parks, condo sites, and existing/renewing 2020 yearly seasonal contract sites, may remain open.
- 7. All Counties and Municipalities shall apply, at minimum, the restrictions, policies, and recommendations provided in paragraphs two and three of this Order at any county and municipal parks that are open to the public; however, consistent with Executive

restrictions on the ability of residential campgrounds, including mobile home parks, to accept new transient guests or seasonal tenants, as that term is defined by NJEOM Administrative Order Nos. 2020-08 and 2020-09.

- 8. Golf courses shall be allowed to reopen to the public and to members associated with private golf clubs, but such businesses must adopt policies that include, at minimum, the following requirements:
 - a. Require that reservations, cancellations and pre-payments be made via electronic or telephone reservation systems to limit physical interactions. Such policies shall, wherever possible, consider populations that do not have access to internet service or credit cards;
 - b. Stagger tee times so that they are 16 minutes apart to limit the amount of people on the golf course;
 - c. Limit use of golf carts to single occupant only, excluding an individual's immediate family members, caretakers, household members, or romantic partners;
 - d. Require frequent sanitization of high-touch areas including, at minimum, the following cleaning protocols:
 - i. Clean and disinfect high-touch areas routinely, and after each use, in accordance with CDC guidelines, particularly in spaces that are accessible to staff, players, or other individuals, including, but not limited to, restroom facilities, counter tops, door knobs, other common surfaces, range buckets,

ii. Ensure that the golf course has a sufficient number of workers to perform the above protocols effectively and in a manner that ensures the safety of players and staff;

- e. Restrict players' ability to touch common surfaces when retrieving golf balls by installing pins, placing cups upside down or partly above ground, or utilizing a shallow cup;
- f. Close all golf center buildings, pro shops, and other buildings and amenities to the public;
- g. Remove bunker rakes and other on-course furniture like benches, water coolers, and ball washers;
- h. Ensure that the flagstick remains in the golf hole at all times, and instruct players to avoid touching the flagstick or hole;
- i. Discontinue club and equipment rentals;
- j. Prohibit the use of caddies;
- k. Limit tee times to two players, except for immediate family members, caretakers, household members, or romantic partners;
- Place additional restrictions on areas of the golf course, as necessary, to limit person-to-person interactions and facilitate appropriate social distancing, including but not limited to, specific holes, putting greens, FootGolf courses, and short game areas;

- 9. Miniature golf courses and driving ranges, as well as other places of public amusement, shall remain closed pursuant to Executive Order No. 107 (2020).
- 10. The State Director of Emergency Management, who is the Superintendent of State Police, shall have the discretion to make additions, amendments, clarifications, exceptions and exclusions to the terms of this Order.
- 11. It shall be the duty of every person or entity in this State or doing business in this State and of the members of the governing body and every official, employee, or agent of every political subdivision in this State and of each member of all other governmental bodies, agencies, and authorities in this State of any nature whatsoever, to cooperate fully in all matters concerning this Order, and to cooperate fully with Administrative Orders issued pursuant to this Order.
- 12. No municipality, county, or any other agency or political subdivision of this State shall enact or enforce any order, rule, regulation, ordinance, or resolution which will or might in any way conflict with any of the provisions of this Order, or which will or might in any way interfere with or impede its achievement.
- 13. Penalties for violations of this Order may be imposed under, among other statutes, N.J.S.A. App. A:9-49 and -50.

Subject: Executive Order 130 - Property Taxes Grace Period Extension - June 1, 2020

On April 28, 2020, Governor Phil Murphy issued Executive Order 130 authorizing local units to extend the second property tax payment installment grace period through June 1, 2020.

For some taxpayers, the ongoing COVID-19 related economic disruption is making it difficult to meet the May 1, 2020 due date for timely payment of real property taxes. Under N.J.S.A. 54:4-67(a), local governments may fix the rate of interest to be charged for the nonpayment of taxes, assessments, or other municipal liens or charges, on or before the date when they would become delinquent, and may provide that no interest shall be charged if payment of any installment is made within the tenth calendar day following the date upon which the same became delinquent, thereby establishing a grace period running through May 11, 2020 for second-quarter property taxes in the case of municipalities on a calendar year budget cycle, or, in the case of municipalities on a State Fiscal Year budget cycle, a grace period running through May 11, 2020 for fourth-quarter property taxes.

Executive Order 130 grants municipalities the authority to extend the ten-day grace period for property tax payments due May 1st through June 1st. This will allow property owners in towns that opt to take advantage of the Order to pay their May 1st property tax installments by no later than June 1st without incurring penalty or interest. Extension of the grace period must be effectuated prior to the expiration of the existing grace period, meaning on or before May 11, 2020. Public notice must be provided, but individual taxpayer notice is not required.

Please be aware that no extension of the deadline for levy payments to the county or school districts has been authorized, and any State Fiscal Year municipality would be unable to hold an accelerated tax sale for the fourth quarter due to the extended grace period expiring after the date upon which initial notice of the accelerated tax sale must be

provided, so cash position should be a relevant factor in any local unit?s decision whether to authorize a grace period extension for this quarter.

Any municipality that ultimately determines to authorize a grace period extension under Executive Order 130 shall notify the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs by providing a copy of the establishing resolution not later than the third business day next following the municipal governing body's adoption of the resolution.

Prior to the enactment of Executive Order 130, some municipalities have unilaterally undertaken a variety of actions absent statutory authorization to do so, including extending the statutory property tax payment installment date and grace period, as well as attempting to establish an effective grace period extension through temporary alteration of the interest rate. However well-intentioned, these extraordinary measures by municipalities create inconsistency throughout the State, which may generate individual confusion regarding property tax payment obligations and may also create or exacerbate local fiscal challenges, including but not limited to, threatening the ability to fulfill obligations. Therefore, in accordance with Executive Order 130, no municipality, county, or any agency or political subdivision of this State shall enact or enforce any order, rule, regulation, ordinance, or resolution which will or might in any way conflict with any of the provisions of Executive Order 130.
